As your District Governor I am challenging all 6670 Clubs to work towards becoming Peacebuilder Clubs.

Peace and Conflict Resolution is one of the 7 Areas of Focus for Rotary. Want to learn more? Here are some resources below to get your started.



RAGFP Peacebuilder Club Standards

Purposes

The purposes of qualifying your Rotary club as a Peacebuilder Club are to:

- More powerfully implement RI's Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution area of focus in your club,
- Address the growing problem and danger of divisiveness and polarization that fractionalizes and stagnates societies, disrupts peaceful relations, and increases the potential for violence,
- iii. Build stronger, more harmonious communities and a more peaceful world,
- iv. Help Rotarians maximize the peacebuilding impact of every Rotary project in all six areas of focus, and
- Assist in the accomplishment of Rotary's mission to "enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace."

Organization and Training - Peacebuilder Committee.

Every Rotary Peacebuilder Club shall have a Peacebuilding Committee made up of at least two club members.

Each member of the Committee is encouraged take 20-30 minutes to read *Your Piece of Peace — A Peacebuilding Primer for Rotarians*. (Go to www.rotarianactiongroupforpeace.org and click on "Peacebuilder") Members of the Committee are also encouraged to:

- Help build momentum and impact of peacebuilding in Rotary by joining and/or supporting the Rotarian Action Group For Peace.
- ii. Complete online training in the 8 Pillars of Positive Peace available through The Rotary Peace Academy (www.rotarypeaceacademy.org) and become familiar with other resources available on the Rotarian Action Group For Peace (RAGFP) website. (www.rotarianactiongroupforpeace.org Click on "Resources")
- iii. If your Rotary District has a District Peacebuilding Committee, at least one member of your club peacebuilding committee is encouraged to serve on the district committee, if possible. This connection is especially helpful in facilitating district and multi-district peacebuilding projects which are highly encouraged by RI, often have substantially greater impact, and can qualify for TRF Global Grants. If your District does not have a Peacebuilder Committee, help create one.

Peacebuilder Committee - Basic Responsibilities.

Educate and empower Rotarians, Interactors, Rotaractors, and others in your area regarding peacebuilding principles and strategies and individual opportunities and responsibilities for peacebuilding by:

- i. Encouraging them to read the Primer,
- ii. Conducting brief trainings in club meetings at least twice per year regarding principles of peacebuilding utilizing principles from the Primer, The Rotary Peace Academy, and other sources.
- iii. Helping Rotarians to recognize that every Club project in all six areas of focus contributes to building community and peace and giving them the tools to maximize the community-building and peacebuilding impact of every project. (Some guidelines are in the Primer.)
- iv. Peace education conversations with individual Rotarians and/or
- Providing other training. (Like coordinating with your Rotary District's officers and other
 peacebuilder committees in your District to provide peacebuilder training at your
 District Conference.)

Engage Rotarians, Rotary Peace Fellows, Interactors, Rotaractors, and others in your area in peacebuilding action by:

- i. Sponsoring at least one club peacebuilding activity per year. RAGFP encourages projects that introduce peace curricula in local schools, clubs, and other child and/or youth groups. (Several examples are listed under "Resources" on RAGFP website). Other possibilities are projects to address (i) division and polarization and build civility and community, (ii) human trafficking, (iii) bullying, (iv) domestic violence, and (v) gang issues in your community. (The Primer has details and other suggestions.) To find Rotary Peace Fellows and other resources in your area see the RAGFP Peace Map. TRF Funding Guidelines for peace projects can be found at this link.
- ii. Clubs are strongly encouraged to help plan and implement district and multi-district projects in the peace and conflict prevention/resolution area of focus. RAGFP stands ready to assist.

Raise the Profile by:

i. At least once a year doing something to increase public awareness of Rotary's peacebuilding power and activities. (Such as planting a Peace Pole, sponsoring a student peace art or peace video competition, or sponsoring a community peace conference. See Primer for details and other suggestions.)

Support Rotary Peace Centers by:

- Increasing club awareness of Rotary Peace Centers and the Peace Fellow Program by making a presentation in a club meeting prior to the program application deadline each year. https://my.rotary.org/en/document/rotary-peace-centers-program-guide-rotarians
- ii. Becoming aware of Rotary Peace Fellows residing in your area by checking the Peace Map at www.rotariansforpeace.org and engaging them in Club presentations and projects. Encourage them to get involved with Rotary if they are not.
- iii. Engaging Club members in helping to find qualified candidates to nominate for a Rotary Peace Fellowship. Support candidates your club selects for nomination through the nomination process. Stay in touch with them.
- iv. If your Rotary District has made a commitment to financially support Rotary Peace Centers as a Peacebuilder District, help raise the funds to satisfy the District's commitment. Financially support TRF plans for new Rotary Peace Centers.

Empowering Girls Ideas for your Club - from District 6670

Empowering Girls Ideas for your Club - from District 6670
As I am touring our District and visiting your clubs, one topic I am talking about a lot is RI President Shekhar Mehta's Empowering Girls Initiative. He spends a lot of time talking about literacy, and how two-thirds of the world's 795 million illiterate population is female, setting them up for a life lacking in education, and keeping them in a life of poverty. Shekhar challenges us all to look at ways to improve the lives of girls and young women in our communities. As I have visited your clubs and also had conversations with other District Governors in the mid-west, I have heard about some really good projects that clubs are undertaking. Here is a sample of some of them:

- 1. Recognize Female Business Owners in your community
- Offer a program for girls whose parent(s) are in jail
- Develop a Girl Scout Badge
- 4. Hold a health screening day for teenage girls and young women
- 5. Prepare hygiene packs for your local homeless shelter or abuse shelter
- 6. Hold a menstrual poverty drive
- Reach out to your school district to see what the greatest need is for girls
- Sponsor self-defense classes for girls in your community
- Reach out to your local Girls Scout groups to find out how you can support them
- 10. Reach out to your local shelters to find out what young women need as they leave the shelter to become independent.
- 11. Reach out to your local YWCA to see how you can support their work
- 12. Sponsor a hygiene product drive

WHERE The location is Camp Kern YMCA Leadership & Conference Center in Oregonia OH. (5291 St. Rt. 350, Oregonia, OH 45054)
HOW MUCH \$250 Rotary Club sponsorship per student covers all program, food and

lodging for the weekend.

This Camp is part of Rotary's New Generations initiative to engage Rotarians in the lives of developing youth. The Leadership Camp will feature several outdoor challenges, critical thinking exercises, and motivational speakers. Students will need to come prepared for physical activity and be dressed appropriately (May weather can be challenging). They are also required to attend the **ENTIRE** camp. Please note: 100% of the cost of the camp is covered by your sponsoring Rotary Club. It is a special honor and opportunity for students who receive this RYLA award. We want to to make the most of this opportunity, for an extremely low cost to your club. Use it to promote your club! Use it to engage club members in working with youth!

We have 52 Rotary Clubs within our District 6670 in southwest Ohio, so this program pulls a cross section of students from many school districts.

The students have to commit to attend the **ENTIRE** camp
Students can be transported to and from Camp Kern by Rotarians, or family members, but are not permitted to drive themselves. **No** student cars are allowed at Camp Kern for safety purposes and liability reasons

The students need to dress appropriate for outdoor activities

Cabins are separated by male/female and are supervised at all times by male and female volunteer Rotary Advisors



2023 Rotary Peace Fellow Application

The 2023 Rotary Peace Fellowship application is now available, and we need your help finding the next cohort of global peace and development leaders.

As a district leader, you play a critical role in promoting the Rotary Peace Centers programs to potential candidates. These resources can help you, and others, recruit candidates:

- Take the All About the Rotary Peace Fellowship course to learn about qualification requirements, eligibility restrictions, the application process, and more
- Send emails to your contacts with the fellowship announcement attached.
- Use our referral form to tell us about potential candidates, and we'll follow up with them.



Candidates have until 15 May to submit applications to The Rotary Foundation.

This year we are expanding our endorsement process to ensure an equitable process for districts and candidates. District Rotary Peace Fellowship Subcommittee Chairs who complete the required endorser training will be assigned up to 5 candidates to interview for endorsement consideration. Any additional applications from your district will be assigned to Rotarians your district identifies to become trained Rotary endorsers or they will be redirected to trained endorsers in another district. The endorser training will be available in the Rotary Learning Center in mid-March. Trained Rotary endorsers have until 1 July to submit endorsed applications to The Rotary Foundation.

DISTRICT POINTS AVAILABLE FOR MATCHING DONATIONS TO ROTARY FOUNDATION

We have used almost 25,000 points this Rotary Year in our District Points Program.

We still have 50,000 points available to be used by Rotarians in our District 6670.

It is quite simple to get District Matching Points. Donate to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund Share or to Polio Plus. Bring your total to 1000 (a combination of dollars and points) and get a Paul Harris Fellowship (PHF).

Example: Your last donation was for \$200. You need \$800 for your next or your first Paul Harris Fellowship. Donate \$400 as described above and the District will match with 400 points. You now have your next or your first PHF. Based on Rotary rules we can match a minimum of \$100 and the District has set the maximum at \$500. The maximum was set to give everyone a chance to receive some points when they donate.






Fruit Bowl Project
