

## **Empowering Girls Ideas for your Club - from District 6670**

#### Empowering Girls Ideas for your Club - from District 6670

As I am touring our District and visiting your clubs, one topic I am talking about a lot is RI President Shekhar Mehta s Empowering Girls Initiative. He spends a lot of time talking about literacy, and how two-thirds of the world s 795 million illiterate population is female, setting them up for a life lacking in education, and keeping them in a life of poverty. Shekhar challenges us all to look at ways to improve the lives of girls and young women in our communities. As I have visited your clubs and also had conversations with other District Governors in the mid-west, I have heard about some really good projects that clubs are undertaking. Here is a sample of some of them:

- 1. Recognize Female Business Owners in your community 2. Offer a program for girls whose parent(s) are in jail
- 3. Develop a Girl Scout Badge
- Hold a health screening day for teenage girls and young women 4
- 5. Prepare hygiene packs for your local homeless shelter or abuse shelter
- Hold a menstrual poverty drive 6.
- 7. Reach out to your school district to see what the greatest need is for girls
- 8. Sponsor self-defense classes for girls in your community
- Reach out to your local Girls Scout groups to find out how you can support them 9
- 10. Reach out to your local shelters to find out what young women need as they leave the shelter to become independent.
- 11. Reach out to your local YWCA to see how you can support their work

This Camp is part of Rotary s New Generations initiative to engage Rotarians in the lives of developing youth. The Leadership Camp will feature several outdoor challenges, critical thinking exercises, and motivational speakers. Students will need to come prepared for physical activity and be dressed appropriately (May weather can be challenging). They are also required to attend the ENTIRE camp. Please note: 100% of the cost of the camp is covered by your sponsoring Rotary Club. It is a special honor and opportunity for students who receive this RYLA award. We want to to make the most of this opportunity, for an extremely low cost to your club. Use it to promote your club! Use it to engage club members in working with youth!

We have 52 Rotary Clubs within our District 6670 in southwest Ohio, so this program pulls a cross section of students from many school districts. The important items to remember are:

We only have and will award 100 spots.

Students must arrive between 12:30 and 1:00pm on March 18 and should be picked up at

- 12 noon on March 20. (Closing Ceremony starts at 11:15am) Registration is due by February 25, 2022
- The students have to commit to attend the ENTIRE camp
- Students can be transported to and from Camp Kern by Rotarians, or family members, but are not permitted to drive themselves. No students cars are allowed at Camp Kern for safety purposes and liability reasons The students need to dress appropriate for outdoor activities
- Cabins are separated by male/female and are supervised at all times by male and female volunteer Rotary Advisors

#### Dear district Youth Exchange leaders,

It's hard to believe ito's been almost 2 years since in-person exchanges were suspended because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Boardo's heartbreaking and difficult decision to suspend travel and the collective impact on our hardworking volunteers like you and the students and families you serve is only tempered by the knowledge that putting the safety of our communities first was the right decision amid the uncertainty. In many districts preparations are well underway to resume in-person exchange for the upcoming 2022-23 Rotary year and weo're here to support you to re-launch your programs stronger than ever!

#### Frequently asked questions

- Are in-person exchanges really going to resume on 1 July 2022? Yes. Until the Board takes a different decision, districts are permitted to begin planning for in-person exchanges. Of course, if the situation changes dramatically the Board could take a different decision, but not before carefully considering the situation and the impact of any decision.
- Will Rotary require students, members, and host families to be vaccinated? No. Rotary doesn&t require vaccination to participate in Rotary Youth Exchange, but the host or sponsor country may require proof of vaccination to travel, enroll in school, or to obtain medical insurance. Be sure to confirm all the local requirements and fully comply with any local or national requirements.
- Does Rotary s insurance program for US clubs and districts (or our insurance policy) cover COVID-19? Coverage can vary
  depending on your activity and the type of claim submitted. US districts should email <u>insurance@rotary.org</u> for full policy
  and coverage limits and districts outside the US should consult their insurer to find out what is and isn t covered.
- Should we get COVID-19 waivers for students? Unfortunately, there is no definitive answer. Depending on your insurance policy and coverage limits and legal limits and rights in the host and sponsor country, a waiver may not eliminate the districters risk exposure if a student becomes ill. Consult with your insurer and discuss with a local legal expert the possibility of a separate COVID-19 waiver as part of your screening and application process. Most importantly, have an open discussion with students, parents, and volunteers about the possible risks. If all parties cannot accept the risks, the best choice may be to forego an in-person exchange for now.

#### If you@re planning in-person exchanges

- Check your certification status. Your district � and your partners � must have maintained its certification status to fully participate in one-way or reciprocal exchanges.
- Have a plan. Make sure to have a Crisis Management Plan approved and in-place for your district. Download our <u>Developing</u> <u>a Crisis Management Plan guide</u> and watch our <u>on-demand webinar</u> to learn how to get started.
- Get connected! Join us for a <u>discussion and virtual networking session on 2 February 2022</u> to discuss how you re preparing for the upcoming Rotary year and find potential exchange partners.
- Download the latest Youth Exchange Officers Directory.

If you ve decided to wait, are not sure, or unable to resume in-person exchanges Not every district will be ready or have conditions (including travel restrictions, school closures, vaccination requirements, etc.) that permit in-person exchanges. There are still options to stay engaged until you ready and it's safe to resume.

- Connect online. Join our <u>virtual exchange learning topic</u> in the Rotary Learning Center to find partners and download resources like our <u>Electronic and Online Safety Considerations</u> guide and the <u>virtual exchange promotional video</u>.
- Explore Rotary@s other programs for young leaders. Learn more about how to engage young people through <u>Interact</u> or explore our brand new <u>RYLA Handbook</u> for tips on how to create virtual RYLA events and activities that celebrate diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- Engage younger professionals. Did students miss their opportunity for a Rotary Youth Exchange or youtre thinking about trying something new? Create a customized <u>New Generations Service Exchange</u> for young adults and connect them with a local ROTEX or Rotaract club.

Kettering Rotarians continue their Senior Care project. Each month the club will bring an experience, needed items or fellowship to at need seniors in their community.


In December & January the club helped with the support of a local business to donated over \$6,000.00 in PPE supplies to 15 different facilities.
