Greetings Rotarians!

Yes, I know this newsletter is late, I did that on purpose so I could report on the results from RYLA and our District Day of Service. I am happy to report that the Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) program is alive and well! We had 60 teenagers for the weekend at Camp Kern in Warren County. Under the leadership of Rotarian Shannon Graham, we had a very successful two-day program. I got to speak with and have dinner with them on Saturday, what a terrific group of young people! Many friendships were formed across the district. One of the things I noticed was how urban kids and rural kids bonded together and learned about each other in asfe and friendly environment. I strongly encourage every Rotary Club in our district send at least 2 teens (Sophomore or Junior years preferred) to RYLA next year, you wonâ€[™]t regret it.

Our bed build was a HUGE success!! Over 200 volunteers (Rotarians, their families and their friends) came together and built 150 beds for children in need. There Our dea built us a node success: Over zoo volunteers (votarans, ther ramiles and ther rineras) came together and built 150 beds for children in need. Ther are over 1,700 kids on waiting lists throughout our district, which is an incredibly sad fact. I want to personally thank Steve Silverberg, President of the West Chester/Liberty Rotary Club, for spearheading this effort. Well done to Steve and his committee! To the eight Clubs that raised funds and got matching grants, thank you! The clubs of Dayton, Fairfield, Franklin-Carlisle, Hamilton, Mason-Deerfield, Middetown, Springboro, and West Chester/Liberty, thank you for raising \$22,000! We had Rotarians from 20 of our clubs, from as far north as Urbana, to the east from London, to the southeast from Batavia, and to the southwest from Greater Harrison. Special shout out to the Northmont (Englewood) Club who delivered snacks and water for the volunteers and to the Oakwood club for buying a whole bunch of bedding and pillows!

This month in the Rotary calendar is the Environment. We have another District Day of Service on April 27th, that is focused on cleaning up an area in Dayton. Please go to DACdb to signup to volunteer. Coupled with the District Day of

Service is our District Gala Dinner on April 26th. It is not too late to sign up for the Gala dinner. Bellefontaine's 48th Annual Rotary Honors Night

The 48th Annual Rotary Honors Night took place at Bellefontaine High School on Monday evening, celebrating the academic excellence of high school seniors with a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 and above.

Brian Hogan, a distinguished 1999 BHS graduate and the current Superintendent at Ridgemont Local Schools, served as the guest speaker for the event. Hogan delivered insightful words of wisdom to both students and parents in attendance. He emphasized the unpredictable nature of life's journey, comparing t to a box of chocolates where one never knows what to expect. Encouraging perseverance, he advised, "Egith through and keep moving forward in a positive direction," while urging the audience to appreciate the journey and the people encountered along the way.

"Appreciate and learn from every opportunity you have, and invest in yourself," Hogan emphasized. He suggested considering a return to the home community to share talents and time, becoming a positive influence. Closing with a quote from Franklin D. Roosevelt, Hogan reminded everyone, 'We cannot always build a future for our youth, but we can always build our youth for the future.'

A highlight of the evening was the awarding of a record number of ten scholarships, each valued at \$1,000, to deserving local seniors. 
