

Past President Tom Johnson Introduced Marshall Ramsey.





Within three years, in his early 20s, Marshall Ramsey went from working as a high school janitor to having his cartoons published in the New York Times.

Today, Marshall is still creating cartoons daily in Mississippi for a statewide audience that sees them online or on social media, rather than the newsprint of old.

Following more than two decades at The Clarion-Ledger, Marshall has spent the last six years working as editor-at-large at Mississippi Today, the Pulitzer Prize-winning,

non-profit, and nonpartisan news website that boasts the largest news operation in the state.

"In a week, I'll draw about seven to eight cartoons, create a weekly newsletter, do an interview show, and hit the road to events spreading the gospel of Mississippi Today all over the state.

I have been so blessed to work at Mississippi Today. I get to work with an extremely talented staff of journalists at a place dedicated to making Mississippi a better place through impactful journalism," Marshall said.

In his early Clarion Ledger days, Marshall sat in his office, crouched over a drawing table with a pen. Today, he draws his cartoons on an iPad using Procreate. Although the tools may differ, the ideas, the process, and the outcome are the same.

"Living in Mississippi is a paradise for an editorial cartoonist," Marshall said.

Marshall had many opportunities to leave Mississippi for other jobs. But he said the state's people, artistic legacy, and active artist culture are why he stayed to raise his family — Amy and their three sons — here.

"I first thought I might be here two years. But I just fell in love with the people. The people here are so gracious and welcoming," Marshall said.

Whether he's creating cartoons that go viral — like his 2018 Barbara Bush obit cartoon where she's reunited in heaven with her daughter Robin, whom she and President George H. W. Bush lost to leukemia in 1953 — or drawing cartoons of linemen as heroes restoring power in Mississippi after disasters, Marshall is proud to call Mississippi home.

"Mississippi has been incredibly kind to my family and me — it has given us so much. I hope that I've been able to give a little back. I know I'm a better person because I've lived here."

He's a two-time Pulitzer Finalist (2002 and 2006), a 2022 Southeastern Emmy winner, and his work is nationally syndicated by Creators Syndicate. His cartoons have appeared in The New York Times, USA Today, and The (Jackson, Miss.) Clarion-Ledger. He's also the author of several successful books, including three cartoon collections, two short story collections (Fried Chicken and Wine and Chainsaws and Casseroles), and the delightful children's book Banjo's Dream.

Marshall's cartoons, photos, stories, and posts are frequently shared on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. He also hosts the weekly statewide radio program Now You're Talking with Marshall Ramsey and the television program Conversations on Mississippi Public Broadcasting. He has appeared on Fox & Friends, Inside Edition, CBSN, and

CNN New Day.

Marshall's also a cancer survivor. Diagnosed with malignant melanoma in 2001, he has been honored by both the Melanoma Research Foundation and the American Cancer Society for paying his survival forward. He promotes skin cancer awareness and sun safety through cartoons, speeches, screenings, and a 5K race. He even ran the Marine Corps Marathon to raise funds for melanoma research. (He completed the race, raised \$13,000, and developed wicked leg cramps).

Marshall, his wife Amy, their three sons, and their precocious dog Pip live in Mississippi, the best state for politics, storytellers, sweet tea, and raising a family.
