Several weeks ago AUSTAL presented its shipyard to ROTARY SUNRISE and also invited our club to visit their utmost interesting production facilities.




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Central Baldwin Sunset Rotary

DISASTER RESPONSE AND RELIEF DONATION INFORMATION

QUESTION: What are our current assets?

Response Assets managed by our Clubs participating in cooperation with District Disaster Response. While each team and asset can operate independently, ideally they are prepared to come together and work a larger location and cooperate with our other assets as well as those from other charitable organizations.

Cook trailer team South,	Existing, over 5years	Capable of Estimated 600 clamshell meals per day
Cook trailer team North,	Gearing up for next season	Aim is to supplement or equal Team South's
Chain Saw & Muck out team South	Existing, over 5years	Team has worked multiple post storm recovery missions to clear debris at locations overlooked by initial first efforts

QUESTION: What are the "Wish List" Items you or your company can donate to make happen and get the end of year tax benefit?

Portable Shower Trailer	Existing, deployed in SC	Trailer is in need of routine maintenance including exterior signage and interior deep cleaning after this year's deployment but is serving over 80 people a day at a community disaster distribution center.
ESTIMATED DONATION \$2,000.00		

Portable Shower/Laundry Trailer Existing, Needs significant repairs

The Trailer was poorly designed although could be a tremendous asset. It has weight & balance issues that are beyond the scope of routine maintenance including reengineering the axel to weight areas distribution that may require expertise of a commercial truck trailer company. Exterior signage and skin need deep cleaning and replacement or rewrap. Interior will also need a deep cleaning and routine maintenance after having been in storage. It is capable of estimated 40 people a day for showers and loads of laundry when connected to needed water supply at a community disaster distribution center.

EXAMPLES OF ADDITIONAL SPECIFIC DONATION NEEDS TO PREPARE FOR THE NEXT SEASON

4ea CPR AED Machines 1 for each rolling asset.

AEDs are now common many places but unfortunately not so at many disaster sites despite the fact many volunteers and community victims not used to extended stress or hours of labor are there performing under conditions that are prone to create cardiac stress

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,500 per AED or \$ 6,000.00

4ea BLS/ALS Trauma Bags 1 for each rolling asset.

Many local medical facilities and EMS assets have been drained by the initial incident and care for victims leaving no guarantee that a volunteer cut by a chain saw or cuts and broken or sprained limbs from heavy work have the needed equipment even if the site has a volunteer nurse, EMT or other person familiar with field trauma care. Many volunteers and community victims not used to extended stress or hours of labor are there performing under conditions that are prone to create injuries beyond what a \$10 home first aid kit can supply.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$550.00 per Ambulance level kit or \$ 3,000.00

	Part of being self-sufficient volunteers is to have the needed safety supplies for your own activities. Working around cooking areas, or fuel for generators and saws dictates the ability to suppress a minor fire with onboard you bring to the site.
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ESTIMATED DONATION of \$200.00 per Commercial grade extinguisher or \$ 1,000.00

4ea	HD Extended Ice Chests	1 for each rolling asset.	To avoid cross contamination of ice and
			food each asset should have a minimum of
			one modern multiple day ice chest to hold
			team water and sports drinks to maintain the
			health of volunteers while deployed.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$200.00 per Commercial grade chest or \$ 1,000.00

Bulk Hotel shower kits and shampoo ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to resupply and restock

Small use packages of Laundry supplies ESTIMATED DONATION of \$500.00 to resupply and restock

Cleaning and disinfectant supplies to maintain equipment ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to resupply and restock

Updated Microsoft Office software to track and document time, materials and volunteer hours **ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to resupply and restock**

Inventory control supplies to mark, catalog and track items donated and better facilitate sharing of small items between teams as needed

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to obtain tags, set-up controls and inventory lists

Subscription to portable MiFi boxes from a major carrier to gain signals in areas where coverage is maxed following disaster allowing volunteers to reach out for resupply and victims to contact loved ones. **ESTIMATED DONATION of \$500.00 to obtain subscriptions and set-up system**

Tarps, and cleaning supplies for muck out or locations to mitigate roof damage until more can be done by insurance contractors or larger disaster recovery teams.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to obtain items for assembly of on time use kits to be left with victims

Disposable meal distribution supplies and non-perishable items to support cook teams to deploy on short notice with a supply run prior to departure.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to replenish supplies for two cook trailers

Funds for District purchase of dedicated PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) standardized with Rotary logo but specific to each team's mission (ie chain saw hard hats, aprons for food handlers)

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,500.00 to obtain adequate safety supplies and have items screened or embroidered

Funds for training volunteers (ie SafeServe requirements for food handlers, wildland fire saw operation certification for saw operators, first aid training, chaplaincy guidelines for volunteers who can provide emotional support to victims) ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to secure seats in regional training and cover volunteer's out of pocket costs for registration and testing

Funds for practical exercises where volunteer personnel, equipment and supplies are challenged for mission readiness by table top exercises and equipment inspections.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to set-up regional tabletop training exercises in coordination with other NGOs

ID Creation and management for Rotary volunteers and especially documentation of advanced equipment training or special skills that meet FEMA NGO skill levels.

ESTIMATED DONATION of \$1,000.00 to obtain ID Cards and lamination or printing and set-up controls and maintain personnel training records
