




A Message from DG Sam

May is Youth Services month for the Rotary World. Our District is in the process of expanding the area by activating our Youth Exchange Program, growing new Interact and Rotaract Clubs and making sure the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy continues to provide high school students with an opportunity to develop leadership skills in a wholesome and friendly environment at Rotary's Camp ASCCA. Our YS Director is Gena Richardson from the Montgomery Rotary Club. Gena hails from Jackson which has one of the best Interact programs in our State.





This year our District has formed at least two new Interact and two new Rotaract programs which reflects our commitment to the youth of this area by providing great experiences underpinned by our 4 Way Test principles.

The RYLA Camp held earlier this year was a resounding success due to Kayleigh Hudson (Prattville-Millbrook) and her devoted staff. This past April, Rotary International's Council of Legislation voted to elevate Rotaract to a Rotary partner, not just a program of Rotary. This paved the way for easier access to Rotary and service for the next generation of leaders.

May has been full of Rotary activity as well. But, before we move too far down that road, let us take a brief look back at a terrific District 6880 Annual Conference held in Birmingham with our sister district in north Alabama, District 6860.

District Governor Carol Argo and DG Sam hosted a fun filled weekend which included great speakers, compelling service projects, laps around the Talladega 500, a spelunking expedition from the owner of DeSoto Caverns, a tour of the Birmingham Museum, a trip to the Birmingham Zoo, some wonderful music from the "Blue Cats" band and even a .05 mile Polio Fun Run which raised quite a bit of money.

The Friday morning session opened with the students at Lyman Ward Military Academy presenting the colors and a moment of reflection given by P Jerria Martin (Selma RC). PDG Michael Angelo Caruso (D 6380) was our morning speaker. He had the crowd in stitches. Michael provided some great advise on communication skills and improving our clubs. RIP Barry Rassin's representative PDG Wade Namura (Carpinteria RC, CA) spoke to our group several times updating us on the most recent activities affecting our clubs and the Rotary world.

Over 200 Rotarians joined the celebration at lunch as local clubs were invited to participate in the festivities. DGN Bruce McNeal (Dothan) provided valuable insight into the coordination and execution that goes into Disaster Relief Planning since our District has had its share of storms and tornados culminating in the tragic events in Lee County resulting in 23 deaths and massive physical destruction. In our District break

out session, the body voted to place a DRAFT plan into the District's permanent record as a memorial to those who perished and as a guide for our clubs and district to develop their own version for future occurrences.

One of the highlights of the conference was the impersonation by Al Mathis of his grandfather, Herbert J. Taylor, the author of Rotary's 4 WAY TEST. Al is past president of the nearby Sylacauga RC and owner of DeSoto Caverns, noted for being one of the largest continuing accumulations of marble stalagmites and stalactites in the world. Al played the role of his grandfather exceedingly well and explained how the 4WT came into being. At the end of his presentation, he surprised the audience with some tickets to the Talladega 500 and a ride around the track in the famed pace car prior to the race.

Polio awareness and eradication was a central theme of this conference. Past Rotary International President John Germ, a crusader for the Polio Plus campaign, has worked tirelessly through these many years to reach the finish line where one day soon we can declare victory over this dread disease.

PRIP John even auctioned off some great art and some fine sippin' stuff for the cause, produced you might say under his personal label. Polio survivors Dr Susan Barfoot and Dr. Isabel Scarinci shared their personal stories of struggle and success. DG Sam's brother, Ralph (Palo Alto RC), also a polio survivor, sent a video not only explaining his experiences as a young child with polio but challenged the audience to match his donation to the Polio Plus campaign. Ralph is a past president of his club, a Major Donor and a USMA graduate. Ralph has reached the summits of Mt Kilimanjaro in Tanzania and Mt Machu Picchu in Peru.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Ken Schuppert (Gadsden RC) updated the Rotarians on the latest news and changes occurring at the Foundation. One significant development hot off the press PDG Ken shared was from the Council of Legislation where there was the move to make Rotary International a 501(c)(3) entity. The motion passed and, subject to regulatory approval, the change will improve RI's bottom line and give added flexibility in the future without impacting the Rotary Foundation's purpose or income.

This program is one of the best opportunities for emerging District leaders to become immersed in the inner workings of how the district conducts activities and aids the clubs throughout the year.

Second, this weekend also celebrated the Talladega 500 race car event. Two lucky Rotarians won exclusive access to the race track by riding in the pace car and enjoying one of the most exciting races in years.



Harry P. Hall Meritorious Award



Jim Golson was the recipient of the coveted Harry P. Hall Meritorious Award, the highest award given by the District.

Jim began his Rotary journey in January of 1999 in the Auburn Rotary Club. He immersed himself at the club level serving as Treasurer, Secretary, Board Member, foundation chair and president. He also developed the Rotary International award-winning program, "Babies Love Books" service project.

Jim's District 6880 work includes chair for Rotaract and Interact, Foundation Audit Chair, and Visioning Team Leader. He was District Treasurer in 2005, District Governor Nominee in 2010, District Governor Elect in 2011 and District Governor in 2012. He was a MS-PETS facilitator, RLI facilitator and Strategic Planning facilitator multiple years for District 6880. The district won the Strategic Planning Award under his leadership.

He served the Zone as DG Hospitality Suite Co-

ordinator and Strategic Planning facilitator multiple years.

Jim, an avid traveler, has attended Zone Institutes in Nashville, St. Louis, Huntsville, Baton Rouge, and Lexington as well as Rotary International Conferences in Chicago, Salt Lake City, Birmingham (England), New Orleans, Bangkok (Thailand), Sydney (Australia), and Atlanta. Although is on the road a lot, he has perfect attendance since 2002, visiting Rotary Clubs in San Francisco, Hawaii, South Carolina, China, and Japan.

With as a deep passion for polio eradication and education, Jim served at the District 6880 Polio Plus Chair and submitted a polio related article to the district newsletter each month. He traveled to Egypt in 2004 and Ghana in 2006 to participate in immunization efforts. Rotary International awarded his work with the Rotary Foundation's Regional Service Award for a Polio Free World in 2017.

Living the "service above self" motto even outside of his rotary life, he and his wife, Nancy, sponsored an International Scholar student from Japan for 3 years. They also volunteered to purchase over two dozen mattresses and covers for the non-profit HERO (Hale Empowerment & Revitalization Organization) which is working to provide economic development, resources, housing, education and construction for the Greensboro (Hale County, Alabama) area.

Jim is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, Benefactor, Major Donor and Bequest Society Member of the Rotary Foundation.

The Rotary bell was tolled for each individual who passed from July 1 to June 30, from year to year on this memorial day.






OUR SPEAKERS

Lieutenant General Willie J. Williams, USMC , Huntsville, AL Photo By: DMCS

Lt Gen Williams spent nearly 40 years in uniform. As director of the Marine Corps Staff since 2009, Lt. Gen. Willie J. Williams has served as the top adviser to two commandants and worked alongside some of the military's most senior leaders. To date, he's one of only four African-American Marines to wear three stars, according to the Montford Point Marine Association, which promotes the legacy of black Marines.

In February, Alabama House Minority Leader Anthony Daniels made history twice when he became the first black person and the youngest official to hold the state legislative position. Out of 105 representatives in the state legislature, the 34-year-old Democrat is one of 27 black representatives — and his election to the post reflects the state's changing political landscape



District Governor Laquita Stribling, District 6760 Nashville, TN

As the Rotary International continues to recognize its 30th year of Women in The Rotary, Laquita R. Stribling, became the first African American installed as 6760 District Governor for Rotary International 2018-2019. Laquita is a past president of the Rotary Club of Nashville (2014-2015), the 3rd largest Rotary Club in the world with nearly 600 members. In 1996, she joined Randstad USA in an entry level position and is now Senior Area Vice President responsible for 4 districts, 9 offices across 3 states, over 1,300 employees and over \$40,000,000 in revenue.



District Governor Carol Argo, District 6860, Shades Valley, Alabama

Carol was born in Montgomery, Alabama and graduated from Autauga County High School. She received a B.A. in history from Auburn University at Montgomery, M.A. in anthropology from The University of Alabama and a Masters of Science in Public Health from UAB. Carol worked for the University of Alabama at Birmingham in student affairs and served as Director of International Scholar and Student Services until her retirement in June 2011. After leaving UAB, Carol served as Executive Director of the Alabama Wildlife Center, a nonprofit organization focused on returning orphaned and injured native birds to the wild. Carol is currently retired.

Does your club reflect this statement? Assessing the culture of your club requires a willingness to talk openly about diversity and inclusion. Here are some ideas to help you get started:


- Discuss your club's culture and whether it's welcoming to all
- Look for biases in your club's membership criteria

Evaluate your community's perception of Rotary as well. Members who see their club as a safe space for jokes or comments that target a specific gender, race, or religion contradict Rotary's values and create a public image liability.

The Rotary Revolution continues as we reach our neighbors to the south in the beautiful island of Cuba with a humanitarian outreach in the form of America's pastime, BASEBALL!

Our point person in this effort is Maria Mendez of the Fairhope Sunset RC. Maria is Cuban born and came to the United States as a small child. Maria currently works for and is Director of Latin American trade for the Alabama State Port Authority, a key economic driver for Alabama. She has taken scores of Rotarians with her to Cuba over the years and will do so again this year in September, 2019. District 6880 has entered into a partnership with the Sunset Club to supply Little League baseball uniforms and equipment to four teams across the country. All uniforms will carry the Rotary logo and the District 6880 designation.

Voluntary donations have funded this effort to build a common bridge between the two cultures. This action has been blessed by Rotary International with the hope that further efforts will lead to improved relations.

One might ask why our District would pursue this approach? It traces its roots back to the mid 1800's when students, brothers Nemesio and Ernesto Guillot attended Spring Hill College in Mobile, Alabama. They loved this new sport and picked up the game. The two returned to Cuba, and in 1868 they founded the first baseball team in Cuba, the Habana Base Ball Club. And as they say the rest is history. Now baseball, not bullfighting, has become the national pastime for this island country to the south of us a brief 90 miles away.

District 6880 has many other connections with Cuba but one of the most important is its Rotary connection. Rotary District 5, the pre curser to our current District 6880, included all of Alabama, Georgia and Florida. Ralph D. Quisenberry of Montgomery, Alabama, served as District Governor for District 5 and oversaw the new club expansion of the Rotary Club of Havana in 1916 during the National Convention in Cincinnati, Ohio. At one time Rotary enjoyed over 80 Rotary Clubs located throughout the Cuban island!

Additionally, our Club was recognized recently from the Demopolis City School Foundation for our support and contribution to the Foundation.




