- 3. The application of ideal of service by every Rotarian to his personal, business and community life;
- 4. The advance of international understanding, good will and peace through a world

Principles – The Four Way Test



What We Do

We are an international service organization that brings together business and professional leaders in order to provide humanitarian services, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and to advance goodwill and peace around the world.



We Implement Objectives Through Five Avenues of Service

Community Service: Every Rotarian is encouraged to participate in activities which make our area a better place to live. These include fundraisers and club social events and many community sponsored programs.

Youth Service: Recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities as Rotary Youth Leadership Academy, Rotaract, and Interact, service projects, and creating international understanding with Rotary Youth Exchange.

International Service: Encourage and foster the advancement of understanding and goodwill among peoples of the world. The Rotary assists with disaster relief, international assistance, Polio Plus Partners, AIDS clinics, Pure Water Programs and other activities. We encourage members to attend international club meetings when they travel abroad.

Vocational Service: The promoting of the idea of "service above self" throughout our business and professional world.

Club Service: Those duties that Rotarians do to help the successful running of the Club. This includes the following activities: publicity, speakers, membership, club bulletin, fellowship activities, chair duties as assigned.

Your Obligations in Rotary

Participation:

To be a Rotarian you must give of your time and talents:

- in community work
- in international work
- in social functions
- in club activities

Attendance:

Developing meaningful social connections builds a stronger Club. 100% attendance is encouraged in Rotary, 50% attendance is the preferred minimum target.

Three consecutive meetings missed without communication with the President or makeups are cause for concern. It is up to the President of the club and the board to decide how to handle consecutive absences.

HOW ROTARY IS STRUCTURED

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL – THE OVERALL ORGANIZATION

There are over 46,000 Rotary clubs globally encompassing 530 districts in over 200 countries, totaling over 1.2 million members. The first Rotary Club was founded in Chicago on February 23, 1905, by Paul P. Harris and his colleagues. Rotary International is organized into areas, districts and clubs as the membership platform representing all Rotarians.

The Rotary Foundation – A Global Community Service Fund

The Rotary Foundation is a 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation created in 1917 by Rotary as an endowment fund for Rotary "to do good in the world." At over \$1 billion, it has one of the largest and most prestigious international fellowship programs in the world and operates well-known health and humanitarian service projects. It is funded solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation.

OUR ROTARY DISTRICT 6930

Rotary Clubs are organized in Districts. Rotary District 6930 stretches along Florida's Gold, Treasure, and Space coasts from Titusville to Boca Raton and includes six counties: Brevard, Indian River, St. Lucie, Martin, Okeechobee, and Palm Beach.

ROTARY CLUB OF WELLINGTON

We were chartered April 11, 1980, and sponsored by the Rotary Club of Belle Glade. The Club itself is a 501(c)4 that is directly a part of the international organization where your benefits and obligations are based. The charitable work is covered by a separate foundation set up by the Club.

Rotary Club of Wellington Foundation

A separate entity established by the Club as a 501(c)3 not for profit as the platform for collecting and distributing the charitable funds used in our programs.

Wellington Community High School Interact Club

The Interact is a Rotary Club sponsored high school community service and leadership program. Chartered in 1995, the Wellington Interact club comprises over 180 students.

Rotary has online and live seminars on various topics, many of which are free. Some programs are reimbursed by the Club. Ask the Club President or Membership.

Starting Out in the Club

- 1. Discuss your interests with Membership, President or President Elect.
- 2. Pay induction fee and dues
- 3. Sign up for at least one of our programs/events or training
- 4. Meet other members sit at different tables at lunch; get together outside club
- 5. Give a 10 Minute talk about yourself within 12 months of induction
- 6. Attend a Board of Directors meeting within 6 months of induction
- 7. Attend a District Function within the first six months
- 8. Attend meeting of another club within the first six months

Getting Involved – Programs and Opportunities

This is what makes us tick. We have a lot going on and it's easy to get involved. Let us know what interests you and we'll get you started. Here's our current list of programs along with the team leaders.

Weekly Lunches - Why are they beneficial?

A key feature of Rotary is our weekly lunches, which offer members regular opportunities to connect and network. Unlike other organizations that meet less

frequently, these gatherings are crucial for maintaining engagement and building relationships. We ask everyone to target two a month, but hopefully show up more. Here's the program:

- Buffet lunch and networking start 12:15 When you arrive pick a table. We recommend changing where you sit weekly to meet more members. Start eating right away, there's no announcement.
- Meeting opening and club announcements
- New member induction (when needed)
- Speakers

The President Elect oversees this program that is designed to bring topical issues to our members. Members are encouraged to make suggestions for speakers.

• Queens' Pot

A weekly card game where members buy raffle tickets to participate. Four winners are chosen randomly: the first wins \$20, and the other three pick a card. If they select the Queen of Hearts, they win half the pot; if they pick a joker, they win instantly. If there are no winners, the deck stays, and the raffle continues.

• Happy Dollars

Members are given the opportunity to announce birthdays, anniversaries and other events in their life. It's another way we learn about each other.
