ROTARY MEMBERSHIP

It goes without saying that membership is essential to Rotary's future as we cannot achieve anything without members. Yet we see that membership numbers in the USA are in long-term decline and we are not immune to this problem in District 6960. In the last Rotary year we experienced a net loss of over 4% of our members here in SW Florida, with 31 of our 53 clubs losing members, and only 16 clubs celebrating a net gain.

If we want to address this decline, we must ensure we are adding value to each member's experience and such value should be regularly checked. We also need to focus on **intentional attraction strategies**, bringing in the kind of members who will be a good fit for our clubs, or who offer longer term potential to Rotary.

Rotary has a history of funding scholarships to help young people go to college, so why not also invest in our own program which directly benefits your club, and Rotary's long-term potential?

For decades, businesses around the world have successfully embraced internships for young people, teaching them skills and immersing them into their corporate culture. The idea isn't just to give a helping hand to young people, it's to capture some of the new ideas they have picked up in their recent college experience and to learn the point of view of their rising generation.

There is a simple way that you can use this tried and tested technique **in your club**, providing a **1 year fully paid club membership 'scholarship'** (dues, meals, training) for 2 young emerging leaders in your community.

- 1.Look into your community and invite 2 young emerging leaders to become full members of your club for 1 year. Your club can either select these interns from your member networks or launch an application process where PR coverage (local media, local colleges) will encourage potential participants to apply. You can publicize this opportunity to local businesses and non-profits to encourage applications, while using this initiative to get to know these organizations better.
- 2. The intern will be expected to play a full, mutually beneficial role in your club, attending club meetings and events and participating in club committees, being encouraged to bring ideas from a younger generational perspective. The intern will learn about Rotary, develop skills related to club administration, enhance your club's public image and acquire skills through the various personal development resources offered to Rotary members (RLI, District training events and The Learning Center).

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

Thank you for your continued support in eradicating the polio virus. World Polio Day, October 24, is fast approaching. It's a day for Rotary members, public health advocates, and all who want a world free from polio to come together, recognize our progress in the fight to end polio, and talk about the actions we need to take to end polio for good. On that thought, we encourage every club to hold or participate, during the Rotary year, in a fundraising event to raise money for Rotary's contribution to eradicating polio and for every Rotary member to become a member of the PolioPlus Society.

One of our greatest pleasures in Rotary is planning and participating in events to raise money for one of our many causes. An event to raise money for eradicating polio can be a single or multi-club event that not only raises funds but also spreads the news about Rotary's contributions locally and internationally.

In southwest Florida, our best time for an event is in season when our population grows by nearly 25%. Whether you're hosting a fundraiser for World Polio Day, posting on social media to raise awareness, or giving a talk on polio to an organization, no action is too big or too small. Just remember to register your clubs' action at endpolio.org/register-your-event. Last year's numbers for registered World Polio Day events were over 1,400 events in 90 countries. Let's do our part to increase the number of events for this year.

Next on our list is to be sure you know how to become a member of the PolioPlus Society. You need to do two things to become a member. First, go to my.rotary.org/en/polioplus-fund, select PolioPlus Fund, and make a recurring, donation of at least \$100. Of course, you can donate more. The Gates Foundation has committed to seeing the eradication of polio to completion with their 2-for-1 match. That's \$2.00 for every \$1.00 you donate for a total donation of \$3.00. That's your donation times three. Keep in mind that a \$0.00 donation times three is \$0.00. That's a terrible loss.

Second, complete a PolioPlus Society member form. To obtain the form, check with your club president or email your request to polioplus6960@gmail.com to receive your form by email. When you complete the form, email the form back to the PolioPlus6960 email address.

This final push in eradicating polio is like pushing a car up a long hill and we're just inches from reaching the top. If we find ourselves exhausted and step away, the car starts slowly at first but soon rolls quickly right back down the hill. We know you won't step away, you're a Rotarian.

When Rich was 18 years old his 55 Pontiac broke down as he turned off the main road and started up a long incline into his parents' driveway. On his braces and crutches, he pushed the Pontiac up the incline and out of danger. He didn't stop until he succeeded. Let's succeed together in eradicating polio.

YOUR CLUB ON THE MOON – PEACE ON EARTH

Anti-Bullying Initiative

The Rotary Club of Lakewood Ranch recently hosted Rotarian Dave van de Velde of the Rotary Club of Dr. Phillips in Orlando at their weekly luncheon. Dave spoke with the members about a project he is working on to bring Rotary clubs to the moon.

The project started in 2018 when Dave learned of an attempted suicide by a high school student. Dave, a very successful entrepreneur and business leader, felt something had to be done about bullying and took a very non-traditional, business-like approach aimed at taking market share away from the bullies by getting students to sign a pledge not to bully. Past District Governor Ron Janssen teamed up with Dave to assist in the anti-bullying efforts.



The program launched and was overwhelming successful. The principal of Leesburg High School confirmed that the culture of the school had dramatically changed from one of hostility and antagonism to caring and support. School attendance jumped from 88 to 92 percent, and fights, which were once a weekly occurrence, dropped to zero and remained at that level for the remainder of the school year. What was even more significant is the historic graduation rate of only 67 percent increased to 85 percent and has remained at that level since.

One of the eight companies Dave founded was in the space industry, so he used his professional connections to make arrangements to have a drive with 1 terabyte of storage enclosed in a capsule on a moon lander. Any student who took the pledge would be sent to the moon via their digitized picture. Participation took off like a rocket.

Your Club on the Moon - Peace on Earth

Dave had a lot more room for just high school pictures, so he decided to put Rotary on the moon with his digitized copy of The Rotarian magazine. He then started inviting Rotarians and Rotary/Rotaract clubs to submit images, many of which include members holding "Peace on Earth" signs and banners. The project evolved into what is now known as "Your Club on the Moon – Peace on Earth", drawing attention and excitement to Rotary's peace initiatives.

Why the Moon?

The moon is a place that everyone on earth can look up and see. It is the only place where humans have set foot yet is still at peace. Perhaps that's because the first person to walk on it was Rotarian Neil Armstrong. Finally, it is a way of bringing together Rotarians from around the globe to attract attention this cause.

Calling All Rotary and Rotaract Clubs

All Rotary and Rotaract clubs are invited to join this program to make a larger impact. There is no cost to the club, simply send in a photo of club members, preferably holding a "Peace on Earth" sign or banner, and it will be included on the drive. If possible, add your club's name and country to the photo. The more pictures delivered to the moon, the greater the attention drawn to this wonderful cause! The drive with the pictures, and other digital data, will be enclosed in a capsule aboard the Griffin lunar lander, placed atop a SpaceX Falcon Heavy Lift which is currently scheduled to launch in September 2025 destined for the South pole of the moon. NASA's cutoff for receiving

pictures is January 1, 2025. It's free for clubs because all costs for the rocket have been covered by Dave. Like all rocket programs, delays can be expected. If a mishap should occur, Dave has already purchased space on a backup rocket and will have a duplicate chip ready to go. Clubs can submit photos via email to picturesonthemoon@gmail.com and should include the club's name, email, and address.

Around the Rotary Club of Babcock Ranch



So, what happens at the end of the 1 year scholarship and why is it an investment In Rotary's future?

If your club repeats this program every year, it could add 12 new members to that Rotaract club EVERY year. As we know, Rotaract has been a big challenge in our District, such that we have NO Rotaract at all. Here is a simple way to drive and build Rotaract.

If every club in our district did this, we would increase our membership by over 100 members. If all of Rotary's 36,000 clubs adopted this program, we will see Rotary's membership increase by 72,000 members – an immediate 6% increase, IN THIS ROTARY YEAR. Our age profile will also be reduced and make us a younger, more inclusive organization.

All good initiatives start somewhere, and for a modest investment, YOUR club can play an important role in being the catalyst for positive change and be a part of our district demonstrating to the rest of the world how to successfully invest in Rotary's future! **What's not to like?**
