SHEPHERDSTOWN ROTARY CLUB CHARLES TOWN ROTARY CLUB

As they have done for many years, the **<u>Rotary Clubs of Shepherdstown and</u>** <u>**Charles Town**</u> have teamed up this fall to provide free dictionaries and



thesauruses to students in Jefferson County schools.

The two clubs buy the books with Rotary funds, and club members volunteer their time to distribute them in the schools. They give dictionaries to all the third graders in the County's

schools and thesauruses to all the fifth graders.

This year, there are 616 third graders and 664 fifth graders in the County's schools.

The <u>Shepherdstown Club</u> handles distribution to the schools in the northern part of the county: C.W. Shipley, Driswood, North Jefferson, Shepherdstown, and T.A. Lowery elementary schools.

The <u>Charles Town Club</u> handles distribution to the remaining four schools: Blue Ridge, Ranson and South Jefferson Elementary and Wright Denny Intermediate.

The accompanying photo was taken at T.A. Lowery Elementary School in Shenandoah Junction on Wednesday, October 6. It shows students in Ms. Hite's third-grade class holding dictionaries they had just received from members of the <u>Shepherdstown Club</u>.

Promoting literacy has always been a major Rotary priority, and the organization sees the distribution of dictionaries and thesauruses as an important part of that effort.

The goal is to help students early on to become good writers and readers, so they can develop good communications skills that will serve them well no matter what vocation or profession they follow when they become adults.



Global Grant Update-Beekeeping in Bolivia

In 2019, the Rotary Club of State College/Downtown partnered with the Rotary Club of Concordia Bolivia, located in the city of Cochabamba, on a \$60,000 USD economic development project to bring beekeeping equipment, supplies and knowledge to rural communities in the area of Toro Toro National Park. In February, 2020, Bolivian Rotarians delivered hives, bees and other supplies to three communities. The COVID-19 pandemic delayed visitors to the rural communities, but Rotarians were able to visit in early 2021 and again in October.

Honey is now flowing! The communities have participated in training sessions for both beekeeping and honey production, and the project is moving forward. Despite travel challenges from both COVID and geography, State College/Downtown Rotarians hope to visit the project and see the results of everyone's hard work.





How did this project happen? A State College/Downtown Rotarian hosted an exchange student from Bolivia in 2002, and he returned to Bolivia and joined the Concordia club – Rotary's connections make great things happen!




