SHEPHERDSTOWN ROTARY CLUB

Community volunteers joined with members of <u>Shepherdstown's Rotary Club</u> and Community Club on a frosty Saturday, November 6 to to help plant trees at two sites that are very important to the town: Elmwood Cemetery and Morgan's Grove Park. In all, about 25 people participated. The photo shows some



of the members of the planting group at the Cemetery.

The project was organized by the **Shepherdstown Rotary Club** and carried out in partnership with the

Elmwood Cemetery Association; the Community Club, which owns Morgan's Grove Park; and the Cacapon Institute. This is the fourth year in a row the Rotary Club has sponsored the event, and the second time Morgan's Grove Park has been included as a planting location.

A total of 8 trees of various species were planted, four at each location. The species planted included Red Oak, Hackberry, and Red Maple.

The trees were donated by the Cacapon Institute, as part of its Carla Hardy WV Communi-Tree program. Two representatives of the Institute, Jeff Blount and Shannon Delawader were on hand to instruct everyone on proper planting techniques.

The Communi-Tree program promotes planting of trees in cities and towns in West Virginia's Potomac Headwaters. Its main goal is to help protect the area's water resources by reducing stormwater runoff pollution. But it is also aimed at increasing awareness of local water quality issues, educating the public about the benefits of trees, promoting long-term tree maintenance, and encouraging volunteerism.

Elmwood Cemetery was chartered in 1869 and incorporates two older church cemeteries that date back to the 18th Century; many members of the town's oldest families are buried there.

The Morgan's Grove Park property is also historic. Located near the spot where local militia began their famous 600-mile "Beeline March" on July 16, 1775 to join General George Washington's troops in Massachusetts, the land served as the site of an annual Morgan's Grove Fair from 1889 to 1936. It has been operated as a public park by the Shepherdstown Community Club (formerly the Men's Club) since 1961.

Many of the older trees on both properties have died, and the planting of new trees has been a priority in recent years.

WEST SNYDER/BEAVER SPRINGS ROTARY CLUB

The <u>West Snyder Rotary</u> was blessed to have Mike and Denise Wolf, representatives of Samaritan's Purse, speak to their members.

In the summer of 1993, Samaritan's Purse began a project calledOperation Christmas Child. This project started when Samaritan's Purse

President, Franklin Graham received a call from a man in England asking if he'd be willing to fill shoeboxes with gifts for children in war-torn Bosnia. Franklin asked his Pastor of Calvary Church of Charlotte to see if he could help with the need. A Sunday shortly afterward, Pastor Rhoads demonstrated for his congregation how to fill a shoebox with simple gifts and encouraged them to include a letter to the child as well. Within weeks, the church had 11,000 shoeboxes lining their hallways.

Since 1993, they have collected more than 168 million shoeboxes packed with toys, hygiene items, and other fun objects that are delivered to boys and girls in need around the world to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way. For many of these children, the gift—filled shoebox is the first gift they have ever received. The gift filled shoe boxes consists of towels, toothbrushes, small toys, games, and various school supplies. Since 2009, more than 26.5 million children who have received a shoebox gift have participated in The Greatest Journey, a 12-lesson discipleship program. Groups typically prepare the shoeboxes the third week in November which they consider national collection week. Thousands of volunteers inspect and prepare the shoe boxes to be shipped to 170 different countries. The influence of one simple shoebox gift continues to multiply as these friends share their faith with others.

The group is part of the PA 2-1-1 East Community helpline, which provides an easy phone connection to help.

Homelessness remain a problem in the County, with 186 new homeless served this year.




