SHEPHERDSTOWN ROTARY CLUB



The <u>Rotary Club of Shepherdstown</u> has donated \$1,220 to this year's "Candy Cane Express" Christmas toy drive for needy children attending T.A. Lowery Elementary School in Shenandoah Junction.

The school provides detailed guidance on the kinds of toys needed, and all the toys collected must be new and

unopened. When the drive is over, families come to the school to select their children's toys before the school begins its Christmas break,

The Rotary Club presented its check at the school. All the funds for it were raised through individual contributions from Club members.

The Rotary Club of Shepherdstown WV is partnering with the Rotary Club of Kakamega, Kenya, on a Rotary Global Grant project aimed at reintegrating street children in Kakamega back into homes, society, school, and other community settings.

It is hoped that the project will serve as a template for helping street children in other cities throughout Kenya. The total budget for the project is \$65,000. The Shepherdstown Club has been raising funds though District 7360, and the Kakamega Club has been doing the same through its district and other Kenyan districts and clubs.

The project total is nearly reached, and only about \$6,000 more is needed. The target date for beginning to implement the project is January 22.

WILLIAMSPORT, MD ROTARY CLUB

Williamsport MD Rotary Club provided food and volunteered serving food to local Willamsport, MD residents that are food insufficient, lacking the means to buy food for themselves. This is an Annual event we participate in called, "Shepard's Table". We served about 50 people and our Interact students participated along side us.



The <u>Willamsport MD Rotary</u> presented a \$250 check to the Kiwanis Club to buy socks for area disadvantaged children. Our donation along with a few other clubs allowed the Kiwanis to buy out the entire supply at Boscov's, a local department store. They purchased over 10,000 socks and they will be distributed to the local kids that would have walked to school in the cold without socks.

We also donated \$500 to the Children in Need a nonprofit that provides clothes to children in poverty.

Last we donated \$500 to the Willamsport MD 2022 Polar Bear Plunge to raise money for local nonprofit Americas Hauling for Hope. Their mission is to reduce poverty in Washington County MD through aid and education
