SHEPHERDSTOWN ROTARY CLUB

More than a dozen people turned out on Saturday, March 19, for the <u>Shepherdstown Rotary Club'</u>s 35th annual spring trash cleanup



along Route 230 south of Shepherdstown.

The Club was founded in 1987, and it has been conducting this cleanup twice a year since then, every spring and fall. The cleanup is focused on the two-mile section of Route 230 from the rail crossing in Shepherdstown to the Y intersection with Flowing Springs Road.

The cleanup itself began in 1985. A local couple, Conrad C. ("Connie") Hammann and his wife Mary Ann, initiated their own twice -a-year cleanups of this stretch of Route 230 that year in response to an effort by two other local individuals, Polly Hockensmith and Peggy Sharp, to do something about the area's most littered byways.

Mr. Hammann was a founding member of the **Shepherdstown Rotary Club**, and at his urging the Club quickly took over the Route 230 cleanup as one of its first community projects. Mr. Hammann coordinated the cleanup for the Club every year afterwards until he passed away in March 2015.

The State of West Virginia established its Adopt-a-Highway program in the late 1980s, and the Shepherdstown Rotary Club's cleanup was immediately recognized by that program. It is believed to be the oldest, continuously running Adopt-a-Highway cleanup in the state.

To Historic notes of Rotary around the world, both well-known and obscure:

In 1905, Paul Harris and three business acquaintances form Rotary by "rotating" the meetings among their Offices. Within a year the Club was so large that they had to adopt a regular meeting place. The next 4 years Clubs were formed in San Francisco, Oakland, Seattle and Los Angeles. The first International Club was in Winnipeg Canada in 1910.

The first club outside of North America was Dublin Ireland in 1911. London England became a club in 1912. That club maintains the first club in Europe status since the Dublin Club was not chartered until later. Early clubs in other Nations included Cuba 1916, Philippines 1919 and India 1920. By 1925 Rotary had grown to 200 clubs.

In World War II Era, clubs in Spain ceased to operate at the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War. Many clubs disbanded during this time period. In Germany, under the Third Reich, Rotary Clubs were considered a secret society associated with Jews, and Nazi party officials were banned from joining. This order rescinded in 1933, but Rotary was forced to ban Jews from membership. The clubs tried to survive by showing loyalty to the government and Nazi Party. After the war, German Clubs worked hard to overcome the damage from the war years.

On the Japanese side, Rotary tried to resolve issues in the 1930's to reduce tension and conflict in Asia, including having a leading Japanese statesman, Prince Tokugawa, as the Honorary Keynote Speaker at the Silver Anniversary Convention in Chicago in 1930. He served as the President of Japan's Upper House of Congress for 30 years. It was only after his death in 1940 that Japanese militants pushed Japan to join the Axis.

1945 onward, Clubs in Eastern Europe and communist countries were disbanded in 1945-46. New Clubs in Africa and Asia were welcomed. Government control of community groups in Russia and Soviet Satellites eventually relaxed and clubs were formed in those Countries, starting with the Rotary Club of Moscow in 1990.

Rotary International worked with the UN since 1945, and maintains a consultative status today.





Saturday, June 18, 2022





Family Ride: Bike riders are encouraged to ride a part or all of the Mifflinburg – Lewisburg Rail Trail. This 9 mile off-road bike trail is suitable for children and adults that prefer a flat and leisurely bike ride. This ride will be self-paced and self-guided. Ride as far as you want and at the speed you want.

Easy Road Ride: 22 miles, easy pace and only 550' of climbing.

Jacks Mountain 50: This 47 mile ride is for moderate to advanced road bike riders that enjoy changes in elevation. It is only 47 miles, but we are giving credit for 50. It is not a race! The 47 miles will be done at a moderate pace so that it is enjoyable for all experienced bike riders.

The suggested minimum donation per rider is \$25 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. All riders are encouraged to solicit addition donations toward their ride. The top fundraiser will receive a prize.

All donations are tax deductible and should be payable to "The Rotary Foundation" with PolioPlus on the memo line. Any gift of \$1,000 or more will receive a special recognition from The Rotary Foundation.

Check-in for each ride will be at the gazebo in Mifflinburg Community Park from 8 – 9 am. Recognition of the top fund raiser will be at 9 am just before both rides start.

The first 100 registrants will receive a coupon for a 10% discount at the Rusty Rail Brewing Company & Restaurant located two blocks away along the Buffalo Valley Rail Trail. Virtual Riders can Include a postage stamp when mailing your donation to receive your discount coupon.

Each rider/donor must have a separate registration form.
