ROTARY DISTRICT 7360 PEDALS OUT POLIO Saturday, June 17, 2023



The purpose of each ride is to raise funds and awareness for Rotary's Global Polio Eradication Campaign. Each ride starts and finishes at Mifflinburg Community Park, 211 N. 5th St, Mifflinburg, PA.

Family Ride: Bike riders are encouraged to ride a part or all of the Mifflinburg – Lewisburg Rail Trail. This 9 mile off-road bike trail is suitable for children and adults that prefer a flat and leisurely bike ride. This ride will be self-paced and self-guided. Ride as far as you want and at the speed you want.

Easy Road Ride: 22 miles, easy pace and only 550' of climbing.

Jacks Mountain 50: This 47 mile ride is for moderate to advanced road bike riders that enjoy changes in elevation. It is only 47 miles, but we are giving credit for 50. It is not a race! The 47 miles will be done at a moderate pace so that it is enjoyable for all experienced bike riders.

The suggested minimum donation per rider is \$25 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. All riders are encouraged to solicit addition donations toward their ride. The top fundraiser will receive a prize. All donations are tax deductible and should be payable to "The Rotary Foundation" with PolioPlus on the memo line. Any gift of \$1,000 or more will receive a special recognition from The Rotary Foundation.

Check-in for each ride will be at the gazebo in Mifflinburg Community Park from 8-9 am. Recognition of the top fund raiser will be at 9 am just before the 3 rides start.

The first 100 registrants will receive a coupon for a 10% discount at the Rusty Rail Brewing Company & Restaurant located two blocks away along the Buffalo Valley Rail Trail. Virtual Riders can Include a postage stamp when mailing your donation to receive your discount coupon.

Each rider must have a separate registration form with signature.

My signature on the entry form waives and releases Rotary International, The Rotary Foundation, Rotary District 7360 and each of it's individual clubs, committees and Rotarians; other riders, and any party concerned with the Polio Eradication Bike Ride from any claims for damages should personal injury or property damage occur while participating in, or traveling to or from this event.

I further acknowledge that this is an unprotected road tour. There will be unrestricted traffic and I will abide by all rules of the road. I am responsible for my own safety and travel to the starting and ending points that I so choose. I realize that there will be hazards from traffic and road hazards and assume all responsibility for my personal safety. I warrant that I am physically fit for the ride and will wear a helmet.

JOHN G. HUCKABY ROTARY CLUB OF MILTON





John G. Huckaby, 80, of 526 JPM Road, Lewisburg, died Tuesday, March 21, 2023, at Geisinger Medical Center, Danville.

A native of Marlinton, W.Va., he was the son of the late John Glenn Huckaby and Blanche Huff Huckaby. He was born Dec. 3, 1942.

He and his wife, Barbara Ann Ritchey, were together for nearly 44 years. Over the years, they provided a home to many rescue cats.

He was a 1960 graduate of Lewisburg Area High School and attended West Chester State College.

He was District 4 runner-up at heavyweight in wrestling as a Lewisburg senior. He also lettered in baseball and football. He served four years as a Navy journalist from 1961-65.

A long-time journalist, he was employed for 31 years at The Daily Item, Sunbury, as a reporter, regional editor, sports writer and sports editor. He later worked in the sports department at the Williamsport Sun Gazette before becoming the managing editor of the Milton Standard-Journal. He retired from that post in 2001.

During many of those 31 years, he wrote a weekly wrestling column during the season, covering all forms of amateur wrestling. During that time, he covered both the PIAA and NCAA tournaments as well as other various amateur events such as the Pittsburgh Classic and the Olympic trials. After leaving the Sunbury paper, he wrote an amateur wrestling column for the Centre Daily Times in State College.

He covered or attended 49 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships. He was honored to receive several awards for his coverage of amateur wrestling: Pennsylvania Wrestling Roundup Media Award of Excellence (1988-89); District 4 Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame, 1992; National Wrestling Media Association Print Journalist of the Year, 2001 and 2010; and Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Hall of Fame, 2002.

Huck was recognized as a Lewisburg Area High School Distinguished Alumni in 2002 and was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame Pennsylvania Chapter in 2007. He was a fan of the Atlanta Braves, Penn State football and Penn State wrestling. He and Barb attended three Olympics: 1996 in Atlanta, 2008 in Beijing and 2012 in London.

Avid travelers, they visited England, Italy, France, Switzerland, Austria, China, Germany, Russia, Finland, Canada and Mexico.

Huck and Barb were avid moviegoers, having attended the Toronto International Film Festival for 30 years, and viewed more than 120 films on the large screen annually.

His community activities included being a past member of the Milton YMCA board of directors; chairman of the membership committee of the Milton YMCA; member and past president (2003-04) of the Milton Rotary Club; past member of the Milton Rotary Club board of directors; and serving as a host and guide for members of a Rotary Group Study Exchange group from Finland in spring 2005. He was a Paul Harris Fellow with four sapphires. He chaired the Rotary club Pancake Day fundraiser as well as the club's dinner coupon booklet project for 10 years.

He had no mechanical talents at all. He could not fix anything or build anything. He once got a failing grade in a high school shop class.

Surviving in addition to his wife are a brother-in-law, C. Thomas Ritchey, and his wife, Anne, of Irving, Texas, and a sister-in-law, Susan Hosselrode, and her husband, Robert, of Cumberland, Md. A nephew, Thomas Ritchey, of Baton Rouge, La., and a niece and her family, Ashley Dom and fiancé Jason Phillips and Maggie and Tenlee Phillips, all of Plant City, Fla., also survive.



Born October 26, 1924 in London England, son of the late Percy Wilson and Dorothy Kingston Wilson. Geoffrey attended Saint Paul's Schools in London

and received scholarships to Queen's College of Oxford University where he earned a Master's Degree in Physics. He was then employed by The Ministry of Defense in Weymouth, England and directed a project contracted by Canadian Westinghouse. While in Hamilton he was visited by a family friend, Patricia Pankhurst, and proposed to her at Niagara Falls. They were married in Farnborough, England December 17, 1955 and returned to Hamilton where their two sons, Anthony and Nigel were born. In 1958 he was hired by the Penn State University Physics Department and soon after was transferred to the Applied Research Lab where his research included Underwater Acoustics. He simultaneously earned a PhD in Electrical Engineering with a specialization in Underwater Acoustics, from Loughborough University in England. Geoffrey retired from Penn State in 1985 and was recruited by Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, NC as Distinguished Professor of Math and Science. He procured multiple grants and developed advanced curriculum in both disciplines before his final retirement in 1990. Geoff was a member of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship in State College, and an active member of State College Rotary Club.

Geoffrey was preceded in death by his wife, Patricia, and three brothers, Arthur, Laurence, and Richard. He is survived by son Nigel and his wife Dagmar of Boalsburg, PA; grandchildren Tristan, Kedrin, and Savannah, son Anthony and his wife Sandy of Cherry Hill, NJ; grandchildren Josiah, Essie, Micah, Caleb, and Eli, and six great-grandchildren.

Geoffrey's greatest joy in retirement was traveling with his wife Patricia and spending time with his family. He never stopped challenging himself to learn the latest technology and he loved keeping up with his grandchildren's educational pursuits. Geoffrey's generosity and devotion to his family and select charitable organizations is a memorable part of his extraordinary legacy.

Norman "Jerry" Nelson, age 87, of Water Street, Johnsonburg, PA, died January 15, 2023 at Elk Haven Nursing Home after a lengthy illness. A son of the late Arthur and Arlene (Bullers) Nelson, he was born on August 6, 1935 in Ridgway, PA. On December 20, 1958 he married Marlene (Miller), who survives in Johnsonburg.

Along with his wife, Jerry is survived by: three children, David (Laureen) Nelson of Cherryville, PA, Bart (Nancy) Nelson of Johnsonburg and Kyle Nelson of Johnsonburg; seven grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; two sisters, Sally Anderson of Kane and Doris (Charles) Hybl of Keysville, VA; and a sister-in-law, Lois Nelson of Spring Grove, PA.

Besides his parents, Jerry was predeceased by: a brother, Donald Nelson and a brother-in-law, Ronald Anderson. Jerry graduated from Wilcox High School and the DuBois Business College. Promoting peace is one of Rotary's main causes. The fully funded Rotary Peace Fellowship, which covers tuition and living expenses, increases the capacity of existing leaders to prevent and resolve conflict by offering academic training, field experience, and professional networking.

Rotary Peace Fellows are selected every year in a globally competitive process based on personal, academic, and professional achievements. Fellows earn either a master's degree or a post-graduate diploma in peace and development studies at one of the Rotary Peace Centers located at leading universities around the world.

Over 1,600 program alumni are working in more than 140 countries as leaders in national governments, nongovernmental organizations, education and research, law enforcement, business and consulting, human rights law, media and the arts, and international organizations such as the United Nations.

Master's degree

- 15–24-month program, small-group classroom learning, in fields related to peace and development
- Intended for leaders near the start of their careers
- 50 fellows selected annually to study at one of five Rotary Peace Centers at partner universities, which offer interdisciplinary curricula with research-informed teaching
- 2–3-month field study experience to develop practical skills
- Fellows connect with an international cohort of fellows, thought leaders, and a global network of Rotarians

Professional development certificate

- Yearlong program for working professionals that blends online learning, in-person classes, and an independent project.
 Candidates who are from Africa, have worked in Africa, or work with African communities or initiatives outside the continent can apply for the certificate program at Makerere University in Uganda. (The certificate fellowship program at Chulalongkorn in Thailand is not accepting applications in 2023.)
- Intended for social change leaders with extensive experience working in peace-related fields
- 40 fellows will be selected to earn a post-graduate diploma in peace and development studies at Makerere University
- Interdisciplinary program includes a two-week online preliminary course, 10 weeks of on-site courses with field studies, a
 nine-month period during which fellows implement a social change initiative (with interactive online sessions), and an onsite capstone seminar

Eligibility: Qualified candidates must:

- Have three years of related work experience for the master's program
- Have five years of related work experience for the certificate program at Makerere University and be able to
 explain how their plan to promote peace aligns with Rotary's mission (Candidates for Makerere University must either be from
 Africa, have worked in Africa, or work with African communities or initiatives outside the continent.)
- Be proficient in English (Master's candidates whose first language is not English must provide English language standardized test scores.)
- Have a bachelor's degree (Master's candidates must provide a copy of their transcripts.)
- Demonstrate leadership skills
- Have a strong commitment to cross-cultural understanding and peace

Candidates must have at least three years between the completion of their most recent academic degree program (undergraduate or graduate degree) and their intended start date for the fellowship. Candidates currently enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate program are not eligible to apply.

Applications for the 2024-25 academic term need to be submitted by 15 May 2023.



"Do your club bylaws reflect your members and other participants' needs?"

While this goal may not seem to be DEI focused, let us provide you with some example questions which you may ask to frame this goal through a DEI lens. Does your club represent the diversity in the community? Does your club represent the job classifications in your area? What activities does your club engage in to ensure members feel included and welcomed in the club? If your club believes these questions are reasonable, then the next challenge is to find ways to include those concepts in your bylaws. The end result should not only focus your club's leadership on similar goals, but also help you create a roadmap which your club can follow for improvements.
