In 1992, a large Club social event took place at the new Daniel Stowe Botanical Gardens. The same year, Don Lineberger took the lead on a project to build a Rotary-sponsored Habitat House. Speakers included Mark Richardson who made his pitch for an NFL franchise in Charlotte, and Tim Grooms discussing a campaign to build a Civic and Performing Arts Center. What would become a major, multi-faceted international grant program began with a project to bring drinking water to the Chorti Indians in Honduras. This later expanded to an effort to bring medical and school supplies to the impoverished citizens, as well as a partnership with Habitat for Humanity to build affordable housing. Don Warren, Rob Collis, and Mary Harris led this effort for many years.


