What's Your Club Experience?

I weep for the retail industry, especially when it comes to customer service. Case in point. While making my DG visits last month, my wife, Ann, and I had some free time between meetings, so we decided to spend some time at a very popular shopping center. It was mid-afternoon on a Monday and not many people were there so the shopping center appeared to be recovering from the weekend crowds. I wandered into a popular men's store to browse their racks and noticed that I and the lady behind the counter (who I think was the manager) were the only two in the store. When she greeted me, I responded, "Thanks, I'm just looking around." For a good 45 minutes I looked in the store. I found some shirts I liked on sale (Rotary colors) and I proceeded to take them to the ties and bowties to match something. Then, I took the shirts to the pants to match something......and the whole time the lady stayed behind the counter. I eventually bought the shirts at a great price and the lady behind the counter rang up the sale. As I was leaving, I could not help but compare this customer service experience with the excellent customer service I receive at my favorite men's clothing store in Mount Airy. F Rees has been in business since 1946 and was founded post World War II by Flip Rees, who is an icon in Mount Airy. Over 70 years later, his son, Gene, still owns the store today. They do not have a website to purchase clothing, nor do they regularly post to social media. Every sale they make walks through the front door at 198 North Main Street. Mount Airy. How can a specialty men's store, which sells high end clothing in a small town last for over 70 years? Two words.....customer service! If I had been in F. Rees on that Monday afternoon looking at shirts, I can guarantee you that the sales associates would not have stayed behind the counter waiting to ring up the purchase. As a matter of fact, instead of walking out of the store with two shirts, I would have probably walked out with two pairs of pants, ties, sweaters, a sports coat, and maybe even a pair of shoes.....cue the scene from Pretty Woman when Julia Roberts is trying on clothes and Richard Gere tells the sales associate, "We are going to spend an extraordinary amount of money in this store today!" Why would I have spent so much? I would have because of excellent customer service experience! I would have felt valued for coming into the store to shop that day, and my need for a new outfit would have been met.

At this writing, I have visited 39 of our district's 47 traditional clubs. If you have heard my address to the clubs, you know that I talk a lot about building value in your club and the "club experience". I am challenging clubs to take an honest look at themselves and to evaluate what type of "experience" they are providing for their members and potential members. Do people leave your club feeling like they are missing something or "shopping" here is not worth their time? Or do they leave your club feeling that this was a great way

to spend an hour and I'll be shopping here again soon. Now, there are a lot of factors that go into the club experience, but you get my point. What kind of customer experience does your club offer? Do your "consumers" feel welcome when they walk in the door (I have found the club's Sergeant of Arms is vital in giving people that first impression of your club)? Do they feel like this is a place where they can network with others? Is this a place where they can give back to the community? I firmly believe that the success (or challenges) of your club will depend on the club experience. What kind of experience is your club giving?


Innovation in Entertainment and Rotary


On September 29th, the music band U2 opened the Sphere in Las Vegas which is perhaps the most

Proceeds from the Pittsboro Street Fair & After-Hours Concert fund our club's many service projects throughout the year. Projects include donating over 100 Thanksgiving Turkeys to the local food pantry, distributing 800 new books to local elementary school children, providing school supplies to our local schools, maintaining our quarterly Adopt A Highway Cleanup project, and most notably supporting



our various Youth Services Projects like the 4-Way Test Speech Contest, RYLA and scholarships to high school seniors.

The Pittsboro Street Fair is a day full of fun and laughs, and we hope that you'll join us in downtown Pittsboro on Saturday, October 28!



As the Rotary Club of High Point approached its Centennial Year, it contemplated options for a project to commemorate the milestone. The celebration of 100 years is significant. The prevalent thought was to think big. It was during that 2019 process that RCHP member and chair of the High Point Public Library Foundation, Wil Elder, floated an idea to Club President Steve Ilderton and the board. Plans were being developed for a Sensory Garden project on the campus of the downtown library and he thought Rotary should be involved. Suddenly, the Club found its Centennial Project, not just as a partner in the venture, but as the lead donor with naming privileges, a \$ 100,000 financial commitment. The library was an attractive partner for the Club as both are committed to programs that benefit children and young people. The Rotary Club was already working with the Library on its annual Christmas Party for at-risk students and their teachers from 17 High Point area elementary schools. In the Fall, the Library and the High Point Rotarians partner for an annual Read-A-Thon where exuberant Club members read to Kindergarten and 1st Grade students. At both events, books are given to the students. High Point Rotary also makes the gift of a book to the Library in honor of every speaker that presents the program at its weekly Thursday meetings. The Club was excited. Once the City signed off on the project, the ball started rolling.

That ball, however, started rolling much too slowly. We all know what happened in 2020 when the Covid Pandemic shut down the entire world. True to the Rotary Service Above Self motto, plans kept moving, just slower than everyone wanted. The commitment never wavered and as the pandemic's impact slowed, the Sensory Garden's progress gained traction. High Point Rotarians ramped up their efforts and through projects such as their annual BBQ and Raffle, Owen Bertschi Memorial Golf Tournament, and annual Poinsettia Sale, as well as from various sponsorships, raised the \$100,000 necessary to fulfil its commitment as naming sponsor of the Rotary Club of High Point Sensory Garden.

This Garden will be a welcome and inviting space for everyone of all ages and abilities for years to come. Sensory gardens are areas designed to stimulate one or more of the five senses: sight, smell, sound, taste, and touch. In recent months, Visit High Point announced that the City of High Point had been named the first Certified Autism Destination on the East Coast, meaning visitors with autism or other sensory sensitivities will be welcomed and safe. But so will others, including many with dementia, Alzheimer's, and visual impairments.

On Friday, September 22, 2023, the official groundbreaking took place at the library. A large contingent of High Point Rotarians were joined by other donors, City Officials, elected Officials, community leaders, Library Foundation members, and High Point Public Library Staff for the 5 p.m. ceremony and the turning of the first shovels full of dirt. Foundation Chair Wil Elder, current Rotary President Ken Esposito, and Library Director Mary Sizemore were among those that addressed the crowd, each thanking countless individuals that helped make this project possible. And as for High Point Rotarians with the turning of those shovels of dirt, the Rotary Club of High Point Sensory Garden at the High Point Public Library became more than a Centennial Project, as it was now coming to life. And that vision that members have had in their minds since day one would soon become a reality!
