International Service exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.

Youth Service recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Our motto, Service Above Self, exemplifies the humanitarian spirit of the Rotarians worldwide. Service efforts are directed toward our areas of focus: Peace and conflict prevention/ resolution, Disease prevention and treatment, Water and sanitation, Maternal and child health, Basic education and literacy, Environment, and Economic and community development.

Youth Services Committee Report

The 2010 Rotary International Council on Legislation made Youth Services the official fifth avenue of Rotary service. In 2015-2016, our Board of Directors made a change to the club by-laws that established Youth Services as a separate committee apart from the Services Committee. Youth Services recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Service Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Our Interact program (Rotary for students ages 12-18) had become completely inactive during Covid. We are happy to report that in April 2024, WBHS Guidance Counselor, Kristine Keith, joined us as our faculty advisor and is committed to helping us rebuild this valuable program at the high school. We are hopeful to revive the program at Shallotte Middle School as well.

A highlight of Youth Services is RYLA weekend. Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), held annually the last weekend of January is fun-filled weekend of leadership development and training for District 7730 high school juniors. Held at Trinity Center, Pine Knoll Shores, NC, Students connect with leaders in our community and around the world to:

- Build communication and problem-solving skills
- Discover strategies for becoming a dynamic leader in his/her school or community
- Learn from community leaders, inspirational speakers, and peer mentors
- Unlock his/her potential to turn motivation into action
- Have fun and form lasting friendships

We were pleased to sponsor home school student MacKenzie Biasi and WBHS juniors Jayfren Ortigoza and Joseph Hamrick as our delegates.

Service Committee 2023-24 Year End Budget Report

This was an amazing year for inclusion. SBI participation with both financial contributions and attendance helping many organizations meet their objectives. It also allowed us to experience fellowship with other Rotary partners and clubs. Some of the highlights include:

- 5 Area Rotary clubs worked together to host a luncheon at Brunswick Community College for 150 BIP or Special Needs Students and Faculty. Each club sent representation to the organizing meetings and took on specific duties to make this a very successful event. The students had a great time and told us they can't wait until the next one.
- Shallotte Rotary Club partnered with us on the Rise Against Hunger event, packing some 10,000 meals in support of ending hunger in the world.
- Boys and Girls Home, Girl Scouts, Beulah Baptist Church, Special Olympics, Coastal Carolina Outreach and Future Farmers of America all participated in this event. It was great to meet and enjoy working alongside family members of Rotarians who came to help.

Next years' Service Committee is already working on projects and is committed to another high output year while building great team atmosphere to help those in need regardless of near or far.

Treasurer's Report

All information contained in this report is based on May Y-T-D information. United Bank, Sunset Beach is our local bank. All accounts are held there.

Club Administration Account – SBI Rotary (July 1 – June 30)

This account is used for the administration of the Club and is separate from all fundraising and project activity funds. Primary income includes:

- Member dues
- Breakfast income
- Weekly raffle income
- Initiation Fees
- Happy Dollars

Primary expenses include:

- Semi-annual Rotary International and District 7730 dues
- Breakfast meeting room and expenses including Club guests
- General operational expenses including accountant, bond, web support, general operating expenses

In the 2023-2024 year, members were given the option to be invoiced for member dues only, currently \$370 per year (\$95 per quarter) and pay \$9 per week for week for breakfast. Members may also be invoiced for annual dues plus pre-paid breakfast expense, \$432 per year (\$108) per quarter, total of \$802 per year. As a result, we anticipate the Administration account will end the year with a surplus of approximately \$7000 (receivables and expenses for June still outstanding). 2022-2023 outstanding dues were paid in the 2023-2024 year contributed to the excess in funds.

Service Committee Report

The Service Committee was comprised of 17 individuals who were committed to supporting the children of Brunswick County, the blind of China and Philippines, the hungry of Haiti and the needs of specially challenged individuals. With a budget of \$53,000, donations were distributed to more than 43 projects that supported literacy, food programs for the hungry, and improvement of the mental and physical health of Special Needs individuals.

More than \$15,000 was approved in District Grants. The importance of these grants are significant as \$7,500 was returned to our club for future projects. District Grants submitted and approved included;

- Speaker signed books for the school library
- Rise Against Hunger participation
- Local Girl Scout Troop supplies
- Special Olympics training and transportation of athletes
- Future Farmers of America leadership conference attendance
- Boys & Girls Home various activities
- Union Elementary Field trip
- Oliver's Entourage donation
- Coastal Carolina Outreach benches for activity center

Treasurer's Report Continued

The decision was made, with Board of Directors support, to move from a cash accounting method to an accrual method after the books are closed at year end. This change will enable a more accurate representation of breakfast dues paid in advance, etc.

Club Fundraising Account

This account is used for two purposes, 100 Club accounting and CART donations, both of which are in essence, pass through accounts.

This account will be closed at the end of June. The 100 Club moved to our South Brunswick Islands Rotary Foundation account and CART donations will be moved to the Club Administration account.

\$10,600 of the account balance will be moved into a CD.

South Brunswick Islands Rotary Foundation (SBIRF) (January 1 – December 31)

SBIRF Checking Account

This account supports the 501c3 activity within the Club. Club fundraising events such as the annual Golf Tournament and Bike Event, along with smaller fundraisers are deposited into this account.

- Net proceeds from the Golf Tournament are allocated to the Service Committee to support our charitable efforts and projects serving youth in the upcoming 2024-2025 Rotary year.
- Net proceeds** from the Bike Event are allocated to the Service Committee to support our other charitable efforts and projects.

There are two exceptions to the funds allocated to the Service Committee from the Golf and Bike Event.

10% of the net proceeds from each of these events is allocated to the SBIRF Permanent Fund. This fund is designated for future projects and not included in the Service Committee funds.

SBIRF Operating Expenses** are deducted from the net proceeds of the Bike Event, thereby reducing the amount available to the Service Committee by the amount of SBIRF annual expenses.

Treasurer's Report Continued

The Service Committee will report on income sources and projects funded during the 2023-2024 Rotary year. The SBIRF checking account is on a calendar year.

SBIRF Savings Account

\$7,700 balance prior to transfer of May 2024 Golf Tournament 10% proceeds of \$2,180.

SBIRF CD

The United Bank \$26,088 CD was renewed on April 7, 2024 for seven months at 5.00 % APY.

In general, all accounts are in good order. An independent Certified Public Accountant will prepare the SBI Rotary and the South Brunswick Islands Rotary Foundation IRS Form 990 for tax filing.

Administrative Committee Report

The Administrative Committee consists of three areas: fundraising, materials and supplies, and social activities. While the fundraisers are "all hands-on deck" events, many SBI Rotarians worked diligently on the other tasks. We are so very appreciative of all Rotarian efforts within the Administrative Committee areas.

Fundraising

South Brunswick Islands Rotary has two fundraising events. SBIR is proud to announce the monies collected are used in only three areas. Firstly, the events pay the direct only event expenses. After 10% of the net proceeds are allocated to the SBIR Club Foundation permanent fund, the proceeds are used exclusively by the Service Committee projects. The Fore Kids Golf Tournament generates income specifically benefiting the children of Brunswick County. The Three Bridge Tour generates income for the remaining local and international Service Committee projects. With the Rotarians' hard work and the sponsors' generosity, we can support the Service Committee which is where the "rubber meets the road".

Supplies and Materials

Thankfully, the club has Rotarian Ken Dresser's audio-visual expertise to call upon and Kim Barnarr and Michael Jacobs have volunteered to assist. Ken handles the audio/visual when a zoom meeting is required. Ken fortunately has robust equipment to handle the zoom requirements. Our normal meetings utilize the simpler stand-alone equipment.

This year the club refreshed the club and Four Way Test banners with a new self-standing banner. This banner and all club supplies are available for use by the committee events.

Social Events

Without a firm committee, several Rotarians have stepped up to the plate and organized non-meeting social gatherings. In August, we attended the Rodeo at the Boys and Girls Home of North Carolina. SBIR held a Family Bowling Night in March.

Rotary Foundation Committee Report

Rotary is dedicated to causes that build international relationships, improve lives, and create a better world to support our peace efforts and end polio forever. With the help of contributions made to our charity, The Rotary Foundation, we are able to be peace-builders, disease fighters, champions for mothers and children. We are able to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to communities. We support education and help to grow local economies. We are tackling environmental issues the way we always do: coming up with projects, using our connections to change policy and plan for the future.

The club's giving to the Rotary Foundation is \$510,969. We have 43 Paul Harris Fellows, 11 Benefactors, 4 Bequests Society Members and 11 Major Donors. The Rotary Foundation Committee sincerely thanks all Rotarians who continue to donate in support of our charity.

After experiencing three years of membership decline during Covid, our club has had a great year attracting new members and retaining existing members.

We began the year with 47 members and currently have 54: 45 active, 7 Rule of 85, and 2 Honorary. Membership is becoming more diverse, as well, with nearly 40% being women and 8% being under the age of 40. 98% of our existing membership was retained.

At a practical level, we have strived to improve the club experience for members by: hosting social activities, engaging in a variety of service opportunities, and promoting growth and development.

We believe the following strategies (cited by Jessie Harman after review of Rotary International member survey 2022-2023) to be effective:

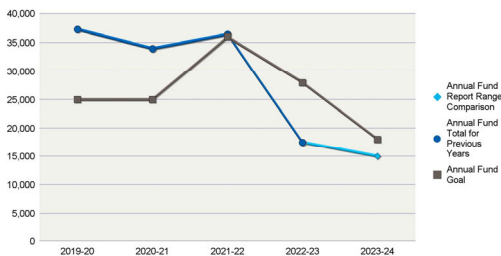
- Taking time to understand individual members' needs and expectations and delivering an experience that meets those needs.
- Ensuring members are actively involved and engaged in service, making friends and, where appropriate, professional connections.
- Improving the meeting experience through more effective time management, better speakers, and more interesting opportunities for club members to learn.
- Creating a club culture that is welcoming and inclusive.
- Addressing conflicts between members proactively and quickly.

In the end, knowing who we are, knowing our appeal, and delivering an exceptional club experience is the key to engaging and retaining members and attracting new members into our organization. It is also the key to creating great brand ambassadors for Rotary.
