We will fly into El Paso, Texas and be escorted by Ted Holder of District 5730. We will check on how our food has been distributed and being used. We are also pleased to announce that Bob Broadbent from the Boulder City Sunrise club will go along and assess how a water project could be built to hold water for the Indian Village. Currently they go to the stream for water and carry it to their home or hang pails off of their house roofs when it rains or snows. Some of the roofs are aluminum sheeting and the roof stays pretty clean so the water is pretty clean. Others have roofing material of other “stuff” and it gets into the water pails. Very unsanitary for people to be using! We will attempt to assess how water can be gathered in holding tanks and fed to the village with plastic pipe.

Thanks to the Boulder City Sunrise club for taking an interest in this project. There are other Clubs in the Southern part of Nevada who have also expressed interest in supporting the on-going village project. We have a list of items/projects that the elders of the village have come up with. Sister Amparo has put them together with a budget. 2001 RYLA PARTICIPANT SHARES HER MEMORIES

(Annie Rossi, President of the Los Angeles County High School for the Arts Interact Club, talked to the Monterey Park Rotary Club about her experience at this year's RYLA conference). She was pleased to see three of her best friends from her former high school in attendance. Those at RYLA were separated into continents. Her continent was Africa and her City was Capetown. On her team were students from Nevada and West Covina. Her team leader was a Rotarian from Covina.

On the first day they received their group project. The projects were to show how to build a team to reach a goal. For their City they had to find a problem and develop a solution. . They presented the solution on the third day. The illiteracy rate was high so they focused on the lack of communication between the home and school. They proposed that senior citizens would work with elementary students at the library. They decided to ask for a grant from the hospital and a food company. In addition, there would be a \$0.05 charge on tickets to sporting events that would go for the program. The \$5,000 grant from Rotary would be for start up purposes and to purchase materials. When they presented their plan on the third day, they did very well, but did not go on to the next level due to the points they lost for going over on their presentation time.

On the evening of the first day they went up as various groups i.e. Jews, African Americans, Asian Americans, etc. The groups had to tell others what the misconceptions were about their group. Next they had to say what they never wanted to hear about their group.

On the second day they worked on their projects. They also had leadership projects, for example, working together on the egg drop, climbing a wall blindfolded, and carrying a glass of water without spilling the contents. They also were given labels and others were to treat them as the bands on their heads said, for example, jocks, most unpopular, class clown. She never considered herself funny, but after people started laughing at what she said and did, she started feeling differently. It was interesting how they took on their roles. That evening, they had games and competitions between the continents and a dance.

The third day they had to be out of their dorms by 8:00 am. This was followed by the group presentations on the projects. They also received a memory yearbook with information on District 5300 and a photograph of the whole group. They were also told how to become a Senior Counselor next year. Six students from this year's group will be chosen.

Annie said that it was a wonderful experience. They had lots of speakers talking about leadership. Leaders need to work with others. You have to be a junior in high school to attend RYLA. She plans to stay in touch with her team over the Internet.

EAST LA CLUB SPONSORS MENTAL ILLNESS SPEAKERS BUREAU

Chances are you have a family member or know someone afflicted with one of three major biological mental illnesses – schizophrenia, bi-polar or clinical depression. Historically these diseases have been marginalized and grossly misunderstood by the general public

Two million Americans suffer from schizophrenia. One out of every five American families is affected by mental illness. Treatment works – if the person gets it. But, stigma causes too many people to hold back from seeking help when they need it.

In keeping with the International Rotary theme, “Create Awareness-Take Action,” the East Los Angeles Club sees a great opportunity to bring about greater awareness and understanding of these debilitating disorders. Under the club sponsorship, San Gabriel Valley NAMI, (National Alliance for Mental Illness) has assembled and trained a speakers contingent available to address Rotary Clubs in District 5300. Members of the Altadena Rotary participated in last month's Community Bike Day held at Thomas Edison Elementary School. Rotarians, along with members of Interact and the local Sheriff's Department, helped set up the obstacle course, safety video, bike inspection area, and tune-up shop. Participants were able to have their bikes inspected, handlebars tightened, and review the rules of bike safety. In addition. 50 bicycle helmets acquired by the club with the help of Safe Kids L.A., tire patch kits, bike locks, wheel reflectors, safety booklets and water bottles were distributed to the participants.

Alhambra Rotarians awarded \$8,000 mini grants to teachers in the Alhambra School District. Many of the grants are to be used for the purchase of books. In addition, over 2,000 books have been distributed through the Reading is Fundamental joint literacy project to the Alhambra School District.
