October Message From "De Guv"

Dear Family of Rotarians,

We are all heartsick over the results of the terrorist atrocities that occurred September 11, 2001. Yet we can take comfort, in some measure, in the core beliefs of Rotary as we strive for, support, actively work for, and encourage world peace and understanding through our activities and monetary support.

You, the Rotarian, and your Rotary Club want to help the victims and the children and families of the deceased from the World Trade Center and the Pentagon attacks and the plane that crashed in Pennsylvania rather than allow it to be used as a weapon of destruction. There are many ways to help

and the District is not here to tell you how to decide, but only to let you know of some of the options that are available to you.

Any donations made to the Rotary Foundations of New York and/or Washington, D.C. (I have not yet heard of plans to aid the families of those on the plane in PA, many of whom were Californians) will be used 100% for the purpose – no administrative costs. You may choose to donate to the organizations involved in the rescue and recovery effort such as the Red Cross. You may decide to adopt a family that has lost their breadwinner and heart. You may want to send letters to selected people at times of increased stress, such as holiday times. You may choose to support the Rotary Peace Scholarships with a long-term purpose of training people in crisis management and fostering of peace. You may want to make a donation to the Rotary Foundation World Fund.

Just to let you know, you may want to become a part of the District 5300 Relief Response Team and make a donation to the Relief Response Fund that is being temporarily held in the District 5300 Foundation, or you may choose to hold money in your own club foundation. Clubs who do this will be asked to have a representative serve on the oversight committee so that appropriate decisions can be made. Here, I am looking to the long term and after taking into consideration the outpouring of money to the various organizations that has occurred to this point. We feel we need to sit back and wait to see where the greatest need is and plan for the future.

However you decide, let us all work to continue to foster world peace and understanding.

I have also been trained as an English language tutor and instructor, as well as a community facilitator. As an organizer, I have also sat-in on mediation and community leadership trainings. I also have conducted several human rights and peace trainings since working as the Ralph J. Bunche Fellow for AIUSA."

Eradicate Poverty Native Teens to Start Learning Business

Our Eradicate Poverty objective of creating jobs on Indian reservations, where unemployment often exceeds 70%, recently took a major step forward. Arcadia Rotary President Jeff Swensson, Arcadia International Service Chair Pat Dolphin, and I met with faculty members of Sherman Indian High School (Riverside) and Junior Achievement staff to explore how to launch a program of teaching business and entrepreneurship to Native American students. The Rotary Clubs of Montebello, Pasadena Sunrise, Arcadia and Altadena are financial sponsors. The Rotary Foundation approved our joint Community Assistance Program grant request for this project and we're eager to begin.

Sherman High School, which is under the administration of the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs, has 509 students from more than 100 Indian reservations in the western United States. The school was founded in 1892 but new campus buildings were constructed just 25 years ago.

After meeting with faculty at Sherman and learning of their enthusiasm, it was determined that the JA Program will begin December 1 with Rotarians being recruited to mentor students.

The Altadena Club awarded nine mini-grants worth \$300 each to teachers from three local elementary schools. Teachers used the grants to purchase items for their students and classrooms including language arts and reading

materials, biography books on prominent African-American, Hispanic, Asian, and female individuals, instructional aids for time-telling and money management, a trip to the Long Beach Aquarium, multimedia software which integrates video, graphics, and audio, new basketball hoops and balls, and new calculators. All the teachers and principals were very grateful for the funds and many Rotarians were amazed how the teachers were able to use a relatively small amount of money to provide a quality educational experience for their students.

Alhambra Rotarians participated in Mervyn's annual ChildSpree for needy children. Each Mervyn's store provides a clothing allowance of \$100 per child for new shoes and school clothes. Additional funds came from local organizations, including the Alhambra Club. Each Rotarian was paired off with a child and given a list from parents identifying the child's needs. Following two hours of shopping, everyone was treated to breakfast and entertainment.

Las Vegas Club members purchased more than 150 tickets for the club's Wheelchair Foundation Benefit. Unprecedented support came from a non-Rotarian who wishes to remain anonymous. He donated \$1,000 to purchase show seats in the names of the first 20 wheelchair recipients and/or their family.

The Duarte Rotary Club's Port Antonio AIDS project has been approved for funding. With help from the Upland, Alhambra, Glendora, Claremont, West Covina, Las Vegas University, Rancho Cucamonga, and Sierra Madre Clubs, Duarte can now move forward to make this project a reality for the Jamaica Club.

The Chino Club presented a check for \$600 to the Youth Boxing Foundation to support the Y.E.S. Youth Employment Program. The program is designed to help high school aged youth gain skills in sports-related fields that will help them secure jobs in the future. Participants learn skills such as coaching, refereeing, umpiring and scorekeeping in baseball, basketball and football. The \$600 will allow six youth to complete the training program that requires them to work three times a week for a minimum of two months.

Chino Club members also donated \$90 to help pay for hearing aid repair for a China High School student.

The Las Vegas West Club has approved a new scholarship program aimed at fostering the ideal of "Service Above Self" and keeping quality teachers in at-risk schools. Beginning this year, the club will award a \$1,000 scholarship to a student at Mojave High School who best exemplifies the ideals of Rotary. The funds will be used for post-secondary education or vocational training.

In addition, \$1,500 will be awarded to a teacher to be selected by both the Interact students and the club's board of directors. These funds will be used for continuing education or instructional resources. In accepting the award, the teacher must agree to spend another two years at the school.

Members of the *Covina Club* showed off their marksmanship at the 3rd Annual Invitational Sporting Clay Shoot. Proceeds benefit Operation Santa Clothes.

The Arcadia Club donated \$500 to the Arcadia Unified School District which was used for the students' White Mountain Apache visit.

Pahrump Valley members donated time and money to help vaccinate children at the Nevada State Health Department's Shots for Tots Program.
