Chantal Paydar is one of more than 210 candidates being reviewed by a Rotary panel to select the 70 Peace Scholars that will start the two-year Master's Program at one of the seven Rotary Centers for Peace Studies throughout the world. The successful candidates will be notified by December 15 BUT no public announcement will be made until March or April when Rotary International will have a worldwide publicity campaign on this program and the 70 Peace Scholars.

This is the first class of Peace Scholars. The cost per student is \$50,000. Any donation of \$1,000,000 will allow the donor to perpetually endow a Peace Scholarship and also name it. DDF (District Designated Funds) have been transferred from the Pioneer Districts – we are not one of those Districts due to the limited undesignated Foundation Funds that were available to me to assign. This is only one of the many reasons why I ask you to continue to give to the Foundation, to make Rotary International an additional beneficiary in your life insurance policy and/or will, and to contact those you know who might consider a major gift to the Foundation.

Everything you wanted to know about District Conference (but were afraid to ask).

1255 Rotarians are already registered!

Where is it going to be held? At the Primm Valley Resort located in Primm, Nevada, just on the California and Nevada stateline, on Interstate 15.

When will it be held? June 6, 7, 8, and 9, 2002. Many participants will arrive on the 6th to rest and be ready for the Golf Tourney which starts at 7:00 am on the 7th. Many just arrive early to relax. The Conference officially opens at lunch on Friday with guest speaker, General Steve Ritchie, the last American War Ace, and the only man known who shot down 5 enemy migs. It ends with the passing of the Rotary leadership from this year's District Governor, Margaret Cooker to District Governor Elect, Lee Harlan. In between there is lots of fellowship, district activities, speakers, meals, Rotary Forums, etc., etc.

Why should I go? If you've never been to a District Conference, this is your chance to meet other Rotarians and celebrate the Rotary year with the District Governor and the District Avenue of Service Chairs. In addition, you can pick up new and helpful ideas from all the other clubs participating. Awards are given to those clubs and persons who best exemplified Rotary during the year and the finals of the Dan Stover Music Scholarship Award and the 4-Way Speech are held at district. If you've been to District Confrences in the past, you'll like this one. I promise a District Conference that will be talked about for years.

Can I bring my family? You bet! Many Rotarians and their spouses bring their children, just remember, this year it is being held at a Gaming Resort, but all the rooms and facilities are away from the casino, as well as the conference itself. The conference tends to be more adult oriented, but there are things for the kids to do. There's swimming, a roller coaster, golf, a shopping center and a variety of other interests including horseback riding, etc., etc.

How much will this cost? Good question, and while this will have to be formatted to your particular situation, the rooms will average about \$60 per night single or double occupancy, \$5 extra for each additional person, plus taxes. Most people spend two nights, Friday and Saturday. Spa suites or larger suites will cost about \$129 per night. Meals will cost \$155 per person for all six meals inclusive, when a meal package is selected. (Individual meals can be selected at slightly higher prices). That's it. As little as \$430. Any other costs you incur will be your own personal expenses while shopping, golfing, playing games of chance, valet parking and so on. All in all, this will be the lowest cost conference in years, perhaps never again to be seen at these prices. There will be hospitality suites at night for those looking for comraderie, excitement, fellowship, and oh yeah, complimentary cocktails served by various clubs.

OK! Roy, you've convinced me! How do I register? First, you may be registered through your club. Check with your club president to find out if the club has registered as a whole. If they haven't, there is still time to do so. Margaret Cooker and I have stretched the incentives of registering individuals for \$5 apiece until December 31, if the whole club is registered. If you aren't registered through the club, you may register individually for \$10 until December 31, 2001.

Club and Individual Registration forms are available for download at the District Conference site at the District Website www.district5300.org. After that, the price goes to \$15 and eventually \$25. Once you are registered you will have to select a meal package for you and any guests you are bringing. Meal Package Selection Forms are available for download at www.district5300.org. Just click on the District Conference information and it's right there. A lot of other information is located there also. Again this year, **Alhambra Club members** delivered a Thanksgiving feast to the families staying at Ronald McDonald House. The house is next to Children's Hospital in Los Angeles and serves as a place to stay for the families of children who are being treated at hospitals in the area. The Alhambra Club donated money to furnish one of the rooms in the house. The room is designated by a plaque with the Rotary logo and recognition of the contribution from the club.

Duarte Club members served Thanksgiving breakfast to 90 seniors. Almost 100% of the members participated in cooking and serving at the club's annual event.

The **Montebello Club**, along with members of the Montebello Lions Club, delivered 150 Thanksgiving baskets to needy local residents.

At a recent prison graduation ceremony, the **Las Vegas University Club** presented an outstanding graduate, an inmate who will be eligible for parole in 2002, with a \$1,000 scholarship to be used to further his education in computer science.

Through their participation in a 5K run and pancake breakfast, **Covina Club** members raised \$10,000, which will benefit the local YMCA and teacher mini-grant program. Both runners and sponsorships exceeded last year's totals. Club members also assisted in serving dinners to seniors in celebration of Octoberfest.

The **Monrovia Club**, along with members of the Kiwanis and Quota Clubs, pooled resources to raise a banner over Myrtle Avenue at Foothill Boulevard that reads "God Bless America." The banner matches one put up the city at the corner of Myrtle and Huntington Drive.

The **Victorville Club** made a \$1,000 donation to the New York Rotary Foundation of the Rotary Club of New York to assist those affected by the September 11 tragedy.

The Altadena Club, along with the support of the Arcadia, Pasadena Sunrise, Sierra Madre and South Pasadena Clubs, has raised \$880 from the sale of 84 Twin Towers t-shirts. The money raised will be donated to the Rotary Clubs of New York City.

The **Apple Valley Club**, along with other High Desert Rotary Clubs, secured a matching grant allowing for the donation of three retired fire trucks to the Puruandiro, Mexico Fire Department. The department previously had one fire truck to serve 30,000 residents. Three days after the new trucks arrived, a dam broke in the small community of San Martin flooding 150 homes. The water level was higher than the road and the only way firefighters were able to get across was in one of the newly donated trucks.

The **Chino Rotary Club** has donated a truck to the Oldtimers Foundation, which will be utilized to bring hot meals to homebound seniors who are unable to travel to the Chino Senior Center for lunch. In addition, the club, along with Buena Vista High School, dedicated three murals depicting scenes from nursery rhymes, which were painted on the walls of the school's childcare center. Club president Craig Watkins presented a plaque to principal George Gonzales commemorating the dedication.

Las Vegas West has formed a new partnership with the Agassi College Prep School serving 150 third, fourth and fifth grade "at risk" students. The club is currently assessing the school's needs and what role the club will play.

The **Arcadia Club** has partnered with a local elementary school to serve as reading tutors for students in primary grades. Volunteers will attend a three-hour training session in preparation for the Rolling Readers Program beginning early next year.

Las Vegas Rotarians and guests raised \$28,000 of which \$18,000 will be used to purchase 120 wheelchairs. The funds were generated from ticket sales to a private performance of "The Honky Tonk Angels," a country music tribute show.

Rotary Reading By Nine Literacy Program

I know there hasn't been much information forthcoming on this year's Rotary Reading By Nine Literacy Program yet, but LA 5 is finally mailing out the application information to you. For those not familiar with the program, this is the third year Rotary and the *Los Angeles Times* have partnered to provide low cost books to students in kindergarten through third grade. Books are provided at an extremely low cost, approximately \$1.60 each, by Scholastic Publishers.

Last year, District 5300 has 27 clubs contribute \$62,000 to purchase over 40,000 books. This year, District Governor Margaret Cooker has set a goal of 45 clubs contributing a total of \$100,000 to purchase approximately 60,000 books. Although the Rose Hills Foundation's matching program of \$1,000 per club has not yet been renewed, we are optimistic that these funds will be available before the January 1st deadline for submitting your Reading By Nine order.

If your club has participated in past years, I am sure you will be continuing again this year, given the success of the program so far. If your club has not participated in the past, I urge you to consider funding the program at the \$1,000 level or higher in order to maximize the Rose Hills Foundation's matching funds. It is an easy project to administer and involves partnering with one or more elementary schools in your area. If you need any assistance or have any questions, call or e-mail me.
