Debbie Verges, Executive Director of the Las Vegas Boy¹s and Girl¹s Club presented a plaque to the **Las Vegas North** Club on behalf of the efforts the club has made to support the Boy¹s and Girl¹s Club of North Las Vegas.

The **Duarte** Club will provide a scholarship of \$250 to a needy member of the Interact Club to attend the Duarte Teen Center computer building class. If the student successfully completes the ten week course, the City of Duarte will give the student the computer he or she built.

The **Chino** Club has established a new award program, Excellence in Service, which will annually recognize a club member for his or her commitment to Rotary within his or her chosen vocation. Gene Hernandez has the honor of being the first recipient.

A Rotarian since 1987, Gene has served in virtually all board of director positions and was president of the Orange Rotary Club in 1989. He currently serves as director of community service for Chino Rotary and is president-elect elect. Gene was nominated to receive this award by past president Kevin Sullivan who said, "Š (Gene¹s) great sense of humor and ability has contributed to the financial success we have enjoyed and was demonstrated on a weekly basis as our Sergeant of Arms last year."

The **Altadena** Club has contributed \$1,500 towards the cost of a solar oven that will help cook food for Afghan refugees. So far, Rotarians in North America have raised enough funds to send a total of three ovens (over \$30,000 worth of equipment.) The first oven is currently in route to Afghanistan and will be used by the Shelter Now International organization. The other two ovens will be shipped to World Vision International and to the Green Star Foundation for use in a world food program camp

serving Afghan refugees in Pakistan. Developed by a Rotarian from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the oven was developed to help feed large groups of people without destabilizing the environment or adding to the world's current deforestation problem. One oven can serve 400 people two meals per day replacing 340,000 pounds of firewood annually.

The **Pahrump Valley** Club has purchased a sign for the 4H Club which will be erected outside their facility located on Dandelion Street.

Alhambra Rotarians donated unwrapped toys to the Spark of Love Toy Drive which were given to needy children in the community.

Las Vegas Rotarians sponsored and chaperoned 32 needy children at a recent UNLV football game. The club also presented 17 hearing impaired children from a local elementary school with brand new shoes. Overall, the club has provided more than \$50,000 in financial support for worthy causes in the past six months.

A representative of the American Red Cross recognized several **Victorville** Rotarians for helping raise over \$15,000 for the High Desert Chapter and the High Desert Communities United Way through the Hoops for Hope project.

More than 30 **Arcadia** Rotarians and their families spent a day at the Jardin Guaycura School for the Handicapped in Tijuana. Rotarians began the day by washing classroom walls in preparation for painting. After painting, Rotarians changed fluorescent light bulbs and installed window blinds. While in Tijuana, the group also distributed toys to two local orphanages.

Thirty **Claremont** Rotarians helped decorate a float for this past New Year's Day Rose Parade.



Las Vegas Fremont Rotary Club Scores 10 with Russian Judges

Four Russian Judges recently visited the City of Las Vegas, Nevada as the guests of the Library of Congress and the Las Vegas Fremont Rotary Club. The four judges, two men and two women, spent seven days and nights touring Southern Nevada, attending seminars, visiting courtrooms, and meeting the local law population including Senior Federal Judge, Lloyd George, Nevada Supreme Court Justices, local District Judges and a host of others involved with the Judiciary. Accompanied at almost all times by U.S. Marshals, the judges spent most days experiencing American justice firsthand. Tours of various Federal, District and Municipal courts, ongoing trials, and the local incarceration system were among the highlights of their days.

Here to learn about American justice, they pointed out some of the differences between their laws and ours. In Russia, generally, if you are arrested, it is generally assumed you are guilty and must prove you are innocent. A fundamental difference, as in the U.S., you are innocent until proven guilty. Another difference noted was that in Russia there are NO jury trials. This means you're never judged by a jury of your peers, (although there are some in this country who think that a jury of your peers is impossible), and the judges in many cases called to dispense justice can be swayed by powers above them. There is no separation of government as in this country, and if the powers that be tell the judge that the arrested person is to be found guilty, that usually happens.

The Las Vegas Fremont Rotary Club, based in downtown Las Vegas and just a few blocks from the Lloyd George Federal Court House, had the honor of hosting the judges and their entourage. Accompanied by a facilitator, two translators, and an observer from the Library of Congress, the judges were met each morning by various members of the Rotary Club to have breakfast. They were then met by the federal marshals to start their day.

The Las Vegas Fremont Club hosted the Judges at their regularly scheduled luncheon on Tuesday and also hosted a contingent of ten visiting students and two teachers from the Ukraine who happened to be visiting the Las Vegas Academy of Performing Arts. Speaking that day was former Nevada Governor Mike O'Callaghan, who spoke on the subject of Veteran's Day.

The judges were also hosted one evening by Rotarians in their homes and had a chance to visit with Rotarians, their families, and guests.

The four judges, Lidiya Khviyuzova, 48, from Arkhangelsk Oblast; Irina Lodyzhenskaya, 40, from Saint Petersburg; Gennady Perfilyev, 39, from Saint Petersburg; and Aleksandr Sivashov, 38 from Saratov Oblast are married and have children, and all were the parents of at least one 13 year old.

Those of us lucky enough to spend any time with the judges soon found out their goals in life were the same as ours. Work hard, raise your family as best you can, see that your children are educated and pursue the enjoyments of life. Asked specifically about peace, the judges all agreed that the Russian people want nothing but peace and a chance to build their country back to its former greatness. They realize they have a country rich in resources and can become strong with the right leaders and the right form of government. They are still trying to get used to their new form of government and indicated it will be awhile before many people accept the "new way".

During the week they also were hosted by Federal Judge Lloyd George at his home, and in one of the highlights of their trip, participated in a tree planting ceremony at the Federal Courthouse. A tree was planted in their honor and in honor of the American and Russian veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice for their country during World War II.

The judges spent a few evenings with various Rotary Club members, had dinner, toured the local nightlife establishments and also got a chance to see Lake Mead and Boulder Dam, Red Rock Canyon, and had their picture taken under the famous "Welcome to Las Vegas" sign. On Friday there was a grand farewell party, hosted by Rotarian Roger and Amy Tabor, where the judges received farewell gifts, and handed out a few of their own. Las Vegas Fremont President Mark Stewart was singled out by Federal Judge Lloyd George for his involvement with the program, and taking the lead and making sure it was a success. The judges also applauded Mark for his involvement. Mark's comment on all this was, "I had a great time, I hope the judges did, and I want to be involved in this again. This is one of the best things I have ever been involved with, and look forward to future visits."

Strengthened by their involvement with Rotary, the Library of Congress is expanding its visiting judges program. When and if you are asked to take part in something like this, I urge you to do so. It allows us as Rotarians to do what we do best, but more importantly, it can change your life and the lives of others.

Rotary World Peace Scholarship Applications Available

Applications for Rotary World Peace Scholarships are now available from local clubs and members of the District 5300 World Peace Scholarship Committee.

The World Peace Scholarships are for study at one of the seven Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution to obtain a two-year master'slevel degree or certificate in international relations, peace, and conflict resolution. The Rotary Centers have been established by the Rotary Foundation in partnership with universities throughout the world. Seventy scholarships will be awarded for study during 2003-2005.

During their studies, Rotary World Peace Scholars will work to advance knowledge of issues related to peace, causes of conflict, and world understanding. They will participate in an annual Rotary Center Seminar and will commit to a career related to international relations, peace, and conflict resolution. Applications are sought from persons holding baccalaureate degrees in an appropriate field and who have demonstrable experience in the field of conflict resolution and international relations. Recipients will study in a country other than their own.

Rotary World Peace Scholarships are for two academic years and provide funding for round-trip transportation, tuition and fees, room, board, and other limited expenses.

Curmudgeon Corner...

Newsletter editors, what is your planning process? Have you stepped back to take a good look at the newsletter? Did you ask officers, directors and members to give you constructive feedback? Did you ask non-Rotarian marketing professionals to evaluate your weekly effort? Has your newspaper editor or community college journalism department head been invited to express an opinion about the layout and content? Any of these could be considered an important planning tool. Most important is that you have some kind of planning process, and not just at the beginning of the program year but an ongoing month-to-month effort.

What makes anyone think this is a job the editor can handle by themselves? In a small club, however you want to define small, most members are already wearing several hats. They will not be excited about putting on one more. It's time to go outside the membership ranks. Here may be a catch 22 situation. Small club may mean one existing in a small town with lean resources, where all the professional talent of the community is already involved in Rotary. Now what do you do? Yes, this process will work for the medium and large club as well.

If everyone involved, beginning with the President, has relatively thick skin one answer is to ask neighboring club members to help. How? Why not send your newsletter to several club editors, the District Regional Assistant DG and ask them to either review or send it on to others for comment? Another suggestion, turn to the District PR Resource committee and ask for an evaluation.

Don't do any of the above without some advance planning. What specifically is it you want to know? If you send it to the PR Resource committee we want to know at least the answers to these questions:

• What are you trying to achieve with your newsletter?

- What production resources are you using, what others are available you can afford; mimeograph, computer desktop publishing, professional printer, other?
- Are you concerned about content, style or both?
- What prompted you to ask for an evaluation in the first place?

If you can't put a one-sentence answer on paper, responses you receive will probably be basic writing/publishing instruction that may not come close to helping.

Ok, you want a specific planning tool, not more jargon. The tool I use on a weekly basis is a two-part list: **The Vine – Article/Section Monthly Check List.**

Under **Regular Inclusion** I have basics: volume & issue # & date; birthdays & anniversaries; who's doing the Pledge, Invocation, Introductions; Meetings and Events [listing this and next weeks club program] recognition fines; Brief Notes [contains RI, District, club web site url's, significant RI, District, Club events for the month & or quarter] 4-Way Test box; current months RI theme; Visiting Rotarians & guests

Under **Irregular**/ **Now & Then** I have articles by directors/committee chairs. **NOTE**: *This should be under regular inclusion but I can't count on it.* Summary of board meeting; Club goals status; District & or RI articles from The Rotarian or Highlighter; Presidential awards and recognition; key project updates.

Until this year there was no assistant editor. The checklist was a tool to guide any one-time editors that stepped in while I was gone. Any checklist should also be reviewed on a regular basis to ensure it reflects what the editor wants included. Doing this article caused me to realize my checklist needs to be revised.

One reference piece you may want to add to your library is a soft cover by Mark Beach titled, "Editing Your Newsletter" How to produce an effective Publication using traditional tools and computers. The pub is published by Coast to Coast Books and distributed to the trade by Writer's Digest/Northlight Books.

See you next month. We will tackle another basic planning element, "typography and graphics." Bet you can hardly wait, right? By the way, all you marketing professionals, editors and freelance writers, this column is a good place to share your experience. You know who you are, don't be bashful.

This month's assignment is to rewrite a paragraph or the entire article with attention to brevity. Remove words, tighten, revise, say it a different way and for heaven sakes don't send it back to me!

They read and "share excitement" about the reading for 30 minutes. We started about two years ago with our District Literacy program.

Thank you to everyone who responded to the request for projects for Rotary's upcoming television Public Service Announcement (PSA). We received hundreds of responses from across the country. The number of service projects and good works Rotary contributes to communities around the world is tremendous.

In coordination with our PSA vendor, Bonneville Communications, we went through every project turned in and have chosen two endeavors to represent Rotary for this year's PSA. The two projects are:

Miracle League Field - Rotarians from the Conyers, GA area raised over \$800,000 to build a specially designed baseball complex for children with disabilities. The project has had such success that with the help of other Rotary clubs, The Miracle League is now expanding to over 20 different cities in the US and is growing daily.

City of Youth and Hope Ranch - These Rotary sponsored projects serve as residential vocational centers for troubled and homeless youth in the Sao Paolo State of Brazil. WORLD BANK: Toward a World Free of Poverty

The slogan of The World Bank, "A World Free of Poverty," was the first thing I noticed on the wall as I entered this huge building in Washington D.C. It is so similar to our slogan, "Eradicate Poverty." For the next two days I saw and heard reference to that goal many times over at the Development Marketplace that I attended January 9 - 10. More than 200 start-up projects from around the globe had come to vie for a slice of the \$4-million in grant aid offered by the World Bank.

Our project, Youth IT Micro enterprise (Africa), was listed in the directory with The World Bank as the sponsoring organization, and with Altadena Rotary Club D5300 as the Partnering Organization. That took my breath away! The World Bank and Altadena Rotary! Our exhibition display had been prepared by World Bank staff and at the top was the Rotary wheel and 'Rotary's Global Outreach.' Youth IT Project partners were listed as 'Rotary Club of Altadena and District 5300,' followed by Junior Achievement and World Links, the World Bank affiliate that we are working with and represented by Tony Bloome.

Rotary International sent Emily Taylor, External Relations specialist, to assist and to open doors for a wider cooperation between Rotary and the World Bank Group. I had suggested to R.I. that it must be valuable to have our headquarters represented on this auspicious occasion, and they agreed. She invited two Past District Governors from the D.C.-Central Maryland district, Bob Nelson, R.I.'s liaison with the World Bank, and Rob Brown, R.I.'s representative with the Organization of American States. She organized, with Tony Bloome's help, an hour-long meeting at which we gave a presentation to Bank staff and other interested organizations. Her Power Point presentation began with 'Rotary & The World Bank: Meeting our Common Objectives' and presented by 'Rotary International, Altadena Rotary Club,' and 'World Links Organization.' Taylor gave an overview of Rotary, followed by Nelson on 'Rotary Clubs Meeting Community Needs: Carrying out the Mission of Service Above Self,' then I spoke about the Youth IT Program, and Tony Bloome wrapped it up and asked for any questions. Back on the exhibition floor, Peter L. Woicke, Managing Director of the World Bank, presented me with a crystal 'Finalist' plaque while cameras flashed. It was a heady experience that started with a simple email to Sam Carlson, the head of the World Link program, in November 2000, wondering if there was any interest in linking up with Rotary and our Junior Achievement program abroad.

As I walked around the exhibition floor and inspected many of the 200 projects, I thought, "This is a Rotary International Service committee's candy store for projects to support. They were so interesting and innovative. One project was a solar-powered ice-making machine to chill fresh cow's milk so it could be transported to a distant town where the price was four times higher than locally.

The whole idea of a Development Marketplace was that of James D. Wolfensohn, President of The World Bank, and his opening remarks exuded his enthusiasm. "Welcome....to make further inroads into today's growing challenge of fighting global poverty, we need ever more new ideas, more creativity and greater commitment from all who care...We need to work together to take advantage of the talent and ideas to implement programs that will help reshape our world.....and fight poverty."

It sounded to me like one million Rotarians could help here.

Knowing that only a few, 30 or so, of the many projects would win a grant to start-up their dream, I found myself suggesting that they contact their local Rotary Clubs for money and volunteer assistance. None had ever thought of that but would pursue it. I suggested to visiting MBA students from D.C.-area universities that they go abroad and serve as interns for an intensive term of teaching business and entrepreneurship. This, too, met with excitement.

After meeting with representatives of 20 or so of the huge development organizations - US-AID, UNICEF, Asian Development Bank, UN Foundation, etc. - I came away with brochures and contacts for developing matching grants for whatever we in Rotary might dream up. This truly was the Center of the Universe for funding programs to Eradicate Poverty.

The euphoria generated in D.C. was topped off by a letter today from Emily Taylor, Public Relations, R.I., "Thank you....I feel privileged to have had the chance to participate with you and Tony. Please know that I will do my best

to promote your good cause." Yes, Altadena Rotary and District 5300 had linked up with Rotary International and the World Bank Group to work together 'Toward a World Free of Poverty."

Local woman targets foreign child-rape issue By Marie Leech, Staff Writer

SIERRA MADRE -- Susan Nunnery is on a mission, and neither the Atlantic Ocean, 8,500 miles nor 10 time zones can stop her.

The Monrovia resident is tying to stop infant and child rape in South Africa - an ongoing problem there because of the belief that having sex with a virgin will cure or prevent the HIV/AIDS virus.

Five million people in South Africa - one in eight – are infected with the virus, according to recent United Nations numbers.

Nunnery, a member and former president of the Sierra Madre Rotary Club, recently approached the group with an idea to educate the public on the South African rapes. Now, with the help of Jeremy du Plessis, the Rotary's assistant governor in South Africa, Nunnery is trying to get the word out to the rest of the world. In trying to do so, Nunnery and du Plessis set up a trust fund to help rape victims. "This is a horrible, despicable thing going on there, and it needs to be stopped," Nunnery said.

In November, a co-worker, originally from South Africa, approached Nunnery after she had heard about a 9-month-old in South Africa who was raped by six men, including the child's grandfather.

"She was completely horrified and knew I was a member of the Rotary and asked if there were anything I could do to stop what was going on there," Nunnery said. The child, whose court-appointed name is Tshepang - which translates as Hope - has undergone several reconstructive surgeries.

It was through extensive research, e-mails and conversations that Nunnery found out Hope's case wasn't isolated. More than 21,000 cases of child rape or assaults - mostly committed by male relatives of the victims - were reported in 2000. A couple of months ago in Johannesburg, South Africa, a 5-month-old girl was raped. Two male suspects - one 17, the other 24 - were charged with the crime. The child's life was saved after emergency surgery.

In another case, a 14-month-old girl was raped, allegedly by two uncles. In a separate case, a 4-year-old from Venda died in a hospital three months after she was allegedly raped by her 35- year-old father. He has been charged with murder.

"This is horrendous," Nunnery said. "It's a huge issue and it needs to end."

Nunnery has written letters to every major media outlet, the Oprah Winfrey show and even the United Nations. She is giving a presentation to senior girls Monday morning at Alverno High School and said she will try to get them involved in her quest.

Carol-Ann Lowe of Whittier, Nunnery's co-worker from South Africa, said she is grateful for what Nunnery is doing. "I have always been concerned about the situation in South Africa because my family is there," Lowe said. "I called my mom one night and she told me about the case of the 9-month-old baby. I felt an absolute urge to do something about it." She blames the "corrupt government" for the high number of rape cases. "They are not doing anything to educate the people there about AIDS," she said. "Rape has become an epidemic there and they're giving AIDS to babies."
