The **Las Vegas** Club received a plaque in recognition for their donation of \$5,000 to support the renovation of a teen youth drop-in center. The center will

provide food, shelter, medical services, and GED/computer training services for the homeless youth of South Nevada. Most importantly, the center will provide a safe place for homeless youth to turn to in times of need.

Club members also received a thank-you from the Salvation Army for participating in their 2001 Christmas Angel program, this year supporting some 8,914 children.

Arcadia Rotarians helped with maintenance at a local school for handicapped children. Duties included repairing stairs, installing lighting fixtures, and keeping the kids entertained while the work went on.

Arcadia Rotarians also honored two English teachers from Arcadia High School as the club's teachers of the month.

The **Las Vegas University** Club received a thank-you note from Desert Pines High School for a donation which allowed the school to purchase 20 white boards and dry erase markers for a science classroom and purchase a skull for the school's science club.

As part of the Reading by Nine program, the **Chino** Club presented two local schools with \$1,000 worth of books each. Each year, the club presents books to two different elementary schools.

For the first time, this year's annual Altadena Old Fashioned Days Parade was under the sole sponsorship of the **Altadena** Rotary Club. The club was involved in most of the activities, including planning, organization, administration, parade monitors, awards/certificates, publicity, and the special flags that were distributed during the day. This year's parade had over 40 entrants. According to club members, the parade is now Rotary's event and next year's will be bigger and better.

For the third year, **Claremont** Rotarians participated in the annual Taste of Claremont fundraiser working as greeters, cashiers, food servers, and helping with set up and clean up. With its 30 sponsors, the event raised \$36,083.

The **Monrovia** Club is preparing for the Taste of Monrovia fundraiser to help raise money for a new public library in the city. The Monrovia Club is the sponsor of the event along with the Downtown Merchant's Association.

The **Montebello** Club is gearing up for its annual golf tournament scheduled for Friday, May 10 at the Montebello Country Club. All profits go toward charitable work of the club and are used to assist over 2,500 elementary school children in the community with vision screening, dental screening, immunization programs, and library books. They made the cards and gifts on the previous Thursday and walked their hand-made gifts to the Center at noon. This time it was to the Mexican Hat dance!

This month the kids have also been making posters and fliers to advertise their Third Annual Blood Drive, March 14th in the school auditorium. The first blood drive collected around 20 units of blood. Last year the kids collected 43 units of blood. The students want to beat that number but it will be difficult. Two Clubs and Two Countries Transcend International and Imaginary Borders

In August of 2000, when the City of Sierra Madre purchased a new fire truck for its allvolunteer fire department, Mayor Rob Stockly, a Sierra Madre Rotarian, conceived of an idea for an international service project. Could the Sierra Madre Rotary Club raise the funds to purchase the City's used 1971 Mack pumper, he asked International Service Chair, Dr. Deborah Smith? The two formed a committee with Tom Hale, Foundation Chair, to determine the feasibility of District and International matching grants and to arrange for purchase of the truck from the City's auction.

While a search for the international beneficiary began, Sierra Madre Rotarian Steve Garrett (Past District 5300 Governor and recipient of the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service, 2000-01) and a committee worked together to pursue the funding, consider transportation logistics, explore legal and regulatory issues and, most importantly, to ensure that the project embody "service above self."

As the project progressed, the City of Guamuchil, Mexico (Sonora, District 4100) was selected from several deserving candidates, and donations were collected from the neighboring Rotary Clubs of Pasadena, Monrovia and Duarte, in addition to private donations.

Throughout the 15 months, a close email friendship developed between Sierra Madre President, Susan Nunnery, and Sandra Zavala de Rojo of Guamuchil Rotary, which enabled the project to proceed and become the Sierra Madre Club's most successful project since the young club chartered in 1997.

While details were being worked out, the club successfully bid on the truck at auction. Two final tasks remained: delivering the truck to the Mexican border and the formal handing-over ceremony in Guamuchil.

More than a year after the project began, Sierra Madre Rotarians Mike Avila, Ron Hutson and Mayor Stockly joined Sierra Madre Volunteer Firefighters Eric Peterson and Mike Tyler for the arduous 250-mile trip to deliver the truck to the Mexican border. Once over the border, the 30-year old truck was driven home by Rotarians and firefighters from Guamuchil.

Operacion Rescue was nearly complete. In order to share American fire-fighting knowledge with the Club's new friends in Guamuchil, four Sierra Madre volunteer fire fighters were selected to join the Sierra Madre Rotarians for the weekend trip. A third team member from Sierra Madre, new Rotarian David Ruprecht, provided translation and video/ photographic services.

Guamuchil Rotarians greeted the Sierra Madre team with unprecedented grace, kindness and festivities. And, although the ceremonies and celebrating began and ended one weekend in November of 2001, the memories will live on. *Operacion Rescue* was not about a 100 year-old service organization, nor fire-fighting equipment. It was not about grants, avenues of service or plaques. It was about friendships and service, and how both transcend international and imaginary borders.

I want to personally thank all the members of our Club for their tremendous support in hosting our beautiful Indian guests Professor Narayana Ichlangod and his wife Jayanthi Meepguri. Request for Nominations

Representatives to 2004 Council must be elected before 1 July. Legislation adopted at the 2001 Council on Legislation requires that the election of Council representatives must be conducted in the Rotary year two years preceding the Council. Therefore, each district must elect a representative and an alternate representative to the 2004 Council during the 2001-02 Rotary year - in other words before 1 July 2002 - rather than in the year immediately preceding the Council, as was the prior requirement. Council representatives will be elected at the district conference. Please submit your nomination to DG Margaret - nominee must be a PDG.

Polio Plus Partners

During the first half of the 20th century poliomyelitis paralyzed half a million people a year. Today the disease is near eradication. By 2005, thanks to Rotary and the1.2 million Rotary volunteers world wide, the disease will be a memory. The final years will be the toughest yet. Rotary is up for the task and committed to seeing it through the end.

Since Rotary began the Polio Plus Program, the number of polio-endemic countries has declined from 125 countries in 1985 to 20 countries at the beginning of 2001. In 1999 over 450 million children received oral polio vaccine. This represents nearly 75% of all the world's children under the age of 5.

By 2005, Rotary's contributions to the global polio eradication effort will be about a half billion US dollars. The World Health Organization estimates over one billion us dollars is needed from donors through 2005 to eradicate polio. Approximately \$600 million has already been pledged. The current estimated funding shortfall is \$400 million. Donations to Polio Plus Partners are down by 67% this Rotary year as compared to last year. We need the support of each and every Rotarian to ensure Rotary's investment in polio eradication becomes fruitful.

To achieve this goal please remind every Rotarian to donate \$100 annually for Polio Plus Partners program. Not only will this save the world \$1.5 billion in US dollars, it will also save countless victims from being effected by this disease. What better gift can we give the children of the next century than a world without polio?

We all know that VFW stands for Veterans of Foreign Wars. But recently it stood for *Volunteers Form Workforce*. At 7:30 a.m., dozens of volunteers from Sierra Madre Rotary, Sierra Madre Interact, Sierra Madre Kiwanis and friends began a full day of painting and refurbishing the downstairs Town Hall of the 50-year old Post # 3208 on Montecito Avenue.

Project Coordinator, Dan Alle (President Elect of the 5-year old Sierra Madre Rotary Club), said, "scaffolding equipment and supplies were generously contact by Ash Buchan, Jr., of Apex Plastering Company." He added, "It's important to note that none of this hard work would have started without the organization, expertise and labor of Kris Poulsen (Rotary) and George Maurer (Rotary & Kiwanis)."

By the time the painting was finished and the masking tape was removed from the 2,000-foot Town Hall, volunteers from the community service organizations were still flowing in and reporting for duty on the sunny January afternoon. Some cleaned and replaced the light switches while others reinforced loose boards. A few on ladders changed air filters as others painted ceiling grids and replaced tiles. Several of them spoke at our club last Veterans Day and we were all very moved by their stories of compassion and dedication", noted Jennie Jacobsen-Huse, President of Sierra Madre Rotary. "In our very own Sierra Madre way, we wanted to say thank-you to our Veterans for all the years they fought for freedom."

Gordon Caldwell, Project Coordinator for Sierra Madre Kiwanis, was responsible for the initial coordination of the daylong work project. "Walking on air," was how Jennie Jacobsen-Huse described Gordon. "He is so pleased with the outcome of this joint effort; the more so because our Vets are absolutely thrilled with it." VFW Commander Bill Newberry and Past Sierra Madre Fire Marshall Dick Probart also provided additional project supervision for the work crews. Erin Wiley, President of the Interact Club, stated, "It was a good opportunity for us to give something back t our Veterans who have done so much for us."

At the end of the day, Sierra Madre Rotary President Jacobsen-Huse summed it up best: "It was a joy to watch everyone working together; several generations and several clubs. Most memorable for me was watching the teens from Interact excitedly talking with the Vets about history. Young and old just came alive."

North Las Vegas Rotary/District 5300 Mexico Project Update Charlotte Leas

North Las Vegas Rotary Club International Chairperson

As you may recall, in the year 2000, the Rotary Clubs of this District were invited by then Governor Sal Brugglio to participate in a "Feed the Children Project" in Choguita, Mexico. The North Las Vegas Club spearheaded a Souper Supper in

September of 2000 and raised over \$7,000 for this project. The District matched this amount with a Humanitarian Grant. (Check out the District 5300 Website <u>www.district5300.org/mexico</u>)

With half of this money, we purchased 100,000 servings of dehydrated food and two tons of beans to be distributed in the Village school in the area of Choguita, and Creel in the Sierra Madre Mountains of Copper Canyon.

The remainder of the money is being spent on a water storage tank, which is being built between the clinic and the house of the Catholic Sisters who teach in the School in Choguita. We recently sent \$4,000 to cover the estimated cost of this storage tank. We will have photos of this water storage unit on the website just as soon as it is completed. On February 8, 2002, the North Las Vegas Rotary Club sent a Rotary sign which will be attached to the storage tank back to Mexico with the 13 visiting Rotarians from Amigo Chihuahua City Rotary Club.

The Amigo Club Rotarians came to the North Las Vegas club at the invitation of Charlotte Leas and Annette Hardy who had visited their club in January and July of 2001. The Amigo Club members wanted to invite the North Las Vegas Rotary Club/ District 5300 to "**sister**" with them on a Matching or Humanitarian Grant to continue the work with the Tarahumara Indians in the Sierra Madres.

The Amigo Club has completed 12 grants since 1988 to provide for the Tarahumaras in the Copper Canyon area. The projects have ranged from X Ray equipment for the Children's Hospital in Chihuahua, equipment for the Down Syndrome Institute, equipment for the Deaf children, funding for the study and cure of epilepsy, as well as Fire trucks and dehydrated food for the Tarahumaras in the Region. They have also provided some water pipes to transport water from pumps to one of the Tarahumara villages. <u>These 12 grants have</u> totaled more than \$209,000</u>. These grants were obtained with the assistance of sisters clubs from 8 areas, both in New Mexico and Texas. They are inviting this District or some of the clubs in this district to "sister" with them on a grant. The North Las Vegas Rotary club will meet and discuss this invitation at the next Board Meeting, but if there is interest on the District level, we are willing to coordinate such an effort.

Let us know if your club is interested in participating and what sort of project that you are leaning towards. After seeing the needs on the two trips that we took to the area, it seems that water, electricity, food and medical are still the greatest needs. The drought that they had for the past seven or eight years seems to be over, but there is a lot of growing to catch up to the demand for food in this area.

The Paradise Club and the North Las Vegas Rotary Club will partner on presenting a Cinco de Mayo on May 4th. Check the calendar for time and location.
