The **Montebello** Club, along with Interact members, raised funds which will be used to purchase 88 wheelchairs for the Rotary wheelchair program. In addition to the donations from club members, Rotarians George Hensel and Bob Jugan matched each donation dollar for dollar.

**Claremont** Rotarians presented a check to the Claremont City Council for \$14,600 which will be used for the purchase of a recreational trailer that will be moved about and maintained by the city.

On March 30, 25 club members took part in the annual Easter egg hunt at Memorial Park. The 50 pounds of wrapped candy, which were distributed throughout the park, were promptly found within ten minutes of letting the kids loose. Club members also accompanied the children around the petting zoo that was set up for the occasion.

The **Duarte** Club participated in the annual Easter pancake breakfast. They were aided by the local Interact Club, who provided the Easter bunny, took photographs, and helped with set up and clean up.

The **Chino** Rotary donated books, computer programs, and audio books to the Chino Library. The club also donates individual books and programs each week in honor of every club speaker. In addition, the organizing committee of the joint service club Bingo Night project have given a portion of the proceeds from that event to the Chino and the Chino Hills libraries.

The **Las Vegas University** Rotary donated \$200 for the purchase of ten keyboards for the computer class at Desert Pines High School.

The **Arcadia** Club honored four students and one teacher at its annual Student/Teacher of the Month awards.

The **Pomona** Club delivered over 1,000 books to the Barfield Elementary School as part of the Reading by Nine program.

Each spoke to three successive classes of students and answered questions about their own careers and what students should consider when planning their futures. The school's principal expressed her gratitude for the club's consistent help which means so much to the students and faculty.

In addition, Altadena Rotarians along with representatives of all four Rotary Clubs within the Pasadena Unified School District (PUSD), participated in a conference to explore ways for the 375 Rotarians in those clubs to partner with PUSD and improve the future of the district's 23,500 students. The enthusiasm of all the participants in this new Rotary initiative should make for a well-coordinated effort to help all students in the Pasadena Unified School District.

**Las Vegas** Rotarians, along with at-risk children from Bracken Elementary School, enjoyed an evening of nail-biting excitement as the UNLV Runnin' Rebels emerged victorious in an overtime game against San Diego State University. Rotarians and friends had a great time with the students, parents, and teachers who were treated to a night of fun, fellowship and food. Club members distributed 50 hot dogs, 50 bags of popcorn, 50 cokes, and 50 candy bars.

Rotary International District 5300 has chosen to sponsor



educator Chantel Paydar as a World Peace Scholar in Rotary<sup>1</sup>s newest program to create future world leaders. Chantal, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Victorville, will attend the Universidad del Salvador in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

This is a two-year Master's level program worth \$50,000 and is paid for through the Rotary Paul Harris Foundation. Chantal will also have the support and encouragement of local Rotary clubs in Buenos Aires, in addition to the support of her sponsoring Rotary club, the Rotary Club of Victorville, California.

Chantal is a citizen and resident of the USA. When she was a child her family lived in its native Iran but emigrated from Iran to the USA during the revolution and seven-year war with Iraq. From a very young age, Chantal has been aware of cultural differences. She works with Internexus San Diego as an English language instructor and student activities coordinator. She previously worked with the American Friends Service Committee on the Caribbean Project for Peace and Justice and created activist information.

As an employee of Amnesty International, she created and conducted human rights education workshops for youth in Boston. She volunteered with the City of Somerville Youth Center and tutored refugee women in English language skills. She holds a bachelor's degree in Latin American studies from the University of California, Berkeley.

Chantal plans to focus on human rights in Latin America and the Caribbean during her graduate studies. She believes that youth are the key to creating a culture of peace and respect for the rights and dignity of all people.

To help prepare this next generation of diplomats and future leaders, Rotary has teamed up with eight universities around the world to establish new centers focused on peace and conflict and annually will award scholarships to promising leaders. The first class of 70 World Peace scholars was announced on April 18 at the United Nations Plaza. Rotary Foundation Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay made the announcement at the Non-Governmental Organizations Briefing at the United Nations Headquarters in New York City.

A press briefing followed at the UN Millennium Hotel, United Nations Plaza, at which Professor Paul Rogers, Director of the Rotary Center at the University of Bradford, England, and two of the Rotary World Peace Scholars were also in attendance.

Public announcements have been placed in the 18 April 2002 issue of The New York Times other major newspapers in the Rotary Centers host countries.

"Today, there are still far too few mediators who are experienced practitioners in conflict resolution. There is an urgent need to produce another generation of people who can play a mediating role in the future," said Professor Paul Rogers, University of Bradford. "This program is the most significant development in graduate work in conflict resolution in decades."

The Rotary World Peace scholarship supports students seeking a two-year master<sup>1</sup>s-level degree at one of the Rotary Centers for International Studies. This inaugural class of scholars was selected from thousands of applicants from 32 countries representing a wide range of occupations including lawyers, educators, diplomatic staff and former international peacekeeping soldiers.

The eight universities chosen to host the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution are:

Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, USA (both universities jointly host one Rotary Center)

International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan

Sciences Po (L<sup>1</sup>Institut d<sup>1</sup>Etudes Politiques), Paris, France

Universidad del Salvador, Buenos Aires, Argentina

University of Bradford, West Yorkshire, England

University of California-Berkley, California, USA

University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia

All Rotary World Peace Scholarships are for two academic years and include tuition and fees, room, board and other expenses.

These scholars will study international relations, peace, and conflict resolution at the Rotary Centers with the aim of increasing diplomacy, mediation and conflict resolution skills among the next generation of community and world leaders.

# **Polio Partners Report**

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative, led by Rotary International, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), reports that 2001 saw some powerful strides in polio eradication with a record 575 million children under the age of 5 vaccinated in 94 countries.

To date, 537 polio cases had been reported last year worldwide, down from 2,979 in 2000 - though that figure may increase slightly. The number of polio-endemic countries also dropped from 20 in 2000 to 10 in 2001. This represents a greater than 99.8% reduction since 1988, when polio paralyzed more than 350,000 children in 125 countries.

However we still have a way to go and a US\$275 million funding gap hinders the eradication effort. RI's new campaign, Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio, aimed at raising \$80 million to help fill that gap, will be officially launched in June at RI's 93rd annual Convention in Barcelona, Spain.

"If we raise this money now, we will be saving all of humankind from this disease for all time, and that's priceless," said Foundation Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay.

Dr. John Sever, RI PolioPlus Committee, said at the briefing that Rotary will work together with the initiative to "do everything in our power to make sure nothing derails this effort."

I call on all Rotarians in 5300 to join together in this effort and support Governor Lee in his campaign for three year pledges and/or outright donations to the Polio eradication campaign. Think of those members of your community who have roots in a country where Polio still exists and approach them for a donation. # ALTADENA ROTARY AWARDS MINI-GRANTS TO LOCAL TEACHERS



The Rotary Club of Altadena recently completed the distribution of its annual mini-grant program. This program requests simple proposals from teachers regarding how they will use the minigrant funds to enhance the classroom experience of their students.

This year, the club received 20 proposals from four different elementary schools. After an extensive evaluation, the club awarded 11 minigrants totalling nearly \$4,300. The mini-grants were awarded to five teachers at Franklin Elementary, four at Burbank Elementary, and one each to Cleveland and Edison schools. They ranged from conducting field trips, to purchasing tape recorders for learning English, to purchasing additional books so students could take them home and read with their parents.

The teachers and their principals, come to a regular luncheon meeting of the club in June to report on the use of the grant money. These mini-grants are conducted by the Community Service Directorate of the Rotary Club of Altadena.

### **District Executive Committee Organizes at Primm**

District Governor–Elect Lee Harlan met his newly formed Executive Committee for the first time at the conclusion of PRLS in Primm, Nevada. He made it quite clear that under his leadership, "District business will not be done as usual."

"The word is out from RI. Leadership development at the local club level is more important now than ever before. For the first time in our 100 year history, developing future District and RI leadership has been pushed down to the local club level as one of our 'key' priorities," Harlan told those present.

"I didn't campaign for this job, didn't ask for it and frankly, didn't want it. I ran away as fast as possible, but in the end I said yes with the understanding the DG office was going to be a team effort. There is no way I could do a responsible job without major changes in the way we conduct District business," Lee told his executive committee.

"Decision making and leadership development will be done from the bottom up in 2002-2003. No DG could effectively manage the 20 or 30 Assistant Governors and committee chairs in the previous District organizational structure. That daunting challenge is a major reason we have had problems recruiting DG candidates in recent years," DG Lee said. He also stressed that public relations was a district priority, which was confirmed by adding a public relations chair to the executive committee.

Under Lee's supervision, Assistant Governors in each of the 13 regions assume significant responsibilities. They are asked to become visible at meetings of the five clubs within their Region by visiting each club at least once, with three additional visits as their goal.

"The DG will not be making visits to every club as in the past. Instead, I suggest the clubs meet in their 13 regional groupings early in the Rotary year. The idea is to invite prospective members to larger social gatherings where the Governor will give a short talk. With this approach, prospective Rotarians will become involved in the social interaction, which is an important part of the Rotary experience. This will also allow clubs to work interactively with each other on a project, something that is becoming even more important. Individual clubs may opt out of this approach, especially those more than an hour away from other clubs in their region," Lee said.

Lee has added four regional Executive Assistant Governors to his organization. While he admits adding administrative layers is not usually a good move, Lee said it was necessary to "keep me sane." One REAG covers the area west of the San Gabriel River, one from East of the River to Rancho Cucamonga, one in the high desert, and one in Southern Nevada. Each of these Executive AGs, except the high desert, works with four Assistant Governors who in turn work with five clubs. In the high desert, the Executive AG is in effect the AG for that area.
