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A Few Words from the District Governor

Margaret Cooker, a wonderful District Governor, ended her year with a huge "Thank You" to everyone. I wish to offer at least as big a thanks to all who have made the start of this year a delightful experience. It really is not "the start of this year," but simply a continuance of past years. We can say it all when we link last year's theme with this year's: Mankind is our



Business, therefore, Sow the Seeds of Love. What a wonderful new theme. Treat it lovingly, and with all the respect it deserves. It comes from a wonderful RI President for 2002-2003, Bhichai Rattakul. President Bhichai has given us two concepts to set the tone for our year in District 5300.

First, we should be a bottom up organization, with ideas coming up from the clubs, not descending from RI. Thus each club will set its own goals. That is both refreshing and challenging as we try to decide what is reachable and meaningful at the same time.

Second, President Bhichai emphasizes we do not need to reinvent the wheel. Each club is doing great things now, and the continuance and strengthening of these things will provide most of what we need to do to succeed during the year.

For the District clubs and their members, I offer three suggestions. Each is within the framework set out by President Bhichai. First, we must continue our wonderful efforts at recruiting new members. For the past two years, we have netted nearly 10% per year. Let's do that again. Second, we must build on the great start Ron Hutson has made in Public Relations. He planted the seeds last year, now we must water them as they begin to grow. Third, we must complete our promise made many years ago to eliminate polio in the world by 2005. It is in our year that RI must raise \$80,000,000. Past experience would indicate that our District could raise almost \$700,000 of that in gifts including three year pledges, an average of about \$250 per member. And, while we emphasize these three things, we must continue doing those things which make each of our individual clubs the best club in the world.

For most of the clubs, all of this will start coming together in July and August when two events happen. First, all of the combined District Governor parties are now set. They have three purposes: fellowship, inviting prospective members to the events, and highlighting the history of Rotary and where we think it will go during the next year in our individual clubs, using the title: "Holding Hands and Dancing: a Story of Love in the 21st Century". The second event for July and August will be the visit of a Polio Eradication Committee member to speak to each club and to meet with their boards for the purpose of receiving the club's goal. While I listed a possible goal above, we are a bottom up organization this year, so it really will be the sum of the club goals obtained at these meetings which will become the district goal.

New members, polio eradication, public relations and, the continuation of past excellence. What a way to start a year of continuing greatness for District 5300. Let's Go!

Rotary Potpourri

The Rotary Flag

An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field. The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The words "Rotary" and "International" printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the keyway of the wheel are white.

The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City, Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole.

Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings. In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem.

The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the world headquarters as well as at all conventions and official events of Rotary International.
