I'm a reluctant gardener, but a gardener nevertheless who still does his own yard. My wife, Joan thinks I'm crazy. Anyway, long ago I noticed that just keeping up a residential lot means that choices have to be made, and that not every square inch is



going to come under cultivation. For instance, this year I did not put in a vegetable garden, even though last year I built a wonderful raised bed with an automatic watering system and we had great vegetables.

I say this to you because I think our District and your club are both a lot like my gardening efforts. Rotary International puts forth an incredible number of projects and expects, so they say, that all Districts will participate in every one, with the District Governor intimately involved in all 247 of them. Can you say no at least occasionally even though the projects proposed are great so you can concentrate on the ones you want to grow really well? And if your harvest is really looking good, are you planning to advertise it outside of your club so all in your neighborhood will know what good gardeners you and your club are? Please remember, Joan and I want to sample some of your efforts as they ripen. One of the reasons I cut down on my own gardening and reduced the Governor's visits by consolidating them is so that we can partake in the fruits of your labors.

At the end of our year, we want to tell RI President Bhichai that we did our District 5300 gardening well, that each club did Sow the Seeds of Love, that we gathered in the harvest, distributed it, and thus made the world a far better place because we tried. I've promised him that already because I know what a strong start all of you have had in your clubs. Thank you again for joining Rotary in all these efforts.



Letter from Rotary Club of Vasco De Gama, Goa, India

Greetings from the Rotary Club Of Vasco Da Gama, Goa, India! (Club number 15697, R.I. district 3170) We are a 35 year old club with a good track record in vocational services especially in career guidance programs.

This year we propose to take up computerization of schools in our area and other parts of Goa. This ambitious scheme envisages the supply of 1000 entry-level computers with open source/free software to various schools. The reasons why we have taken up this project are: 1. To teach students at school level how to use a computer. Today you are not literate without the knowledge of how to use a computer. 2. As a teaching aid for teachers for better audio-visual presentation. 3. Students themselves will use the computer for their assignments. 4. In India, the cost of a PC is very high considering the per capita income. Therefore, most students cannot afford to have PCs at home. Schools therefore have to be provided with sufficient computers that can be accessed and used by the students.

We are looking for other Rotary Clubs to join hands with us to make this project a reality.

2002 Designated "Year of the Polio Survivor"

New Jersey Governor Jim McGreevey and the New Jersey Senate have designated 2002 "Year of the Polio Survivor" and September "Polio Survivors Month." This year marks the 50th anniversary of North America's most devastating polio epidemic which affected nearly 60,000 people. September is the month when the summer epidemics of polio ended and rehabilitation for polio survivors began.

"New Jersey is the first state to make these declarations," says Dr. Richard L. Bruno, chairperson of the International Post-Polio Task Force and director of The Post-Polio Institute and International Centre for Post-Polio Education and Research at New Jersey's Englewood Hospital and Medical Center. "But states across the country are moving to make similar declarations and pass legislation on behalf of polio survivors "

A bill by Assemblywoman Loretta Weinberg has been drafted to direct the New Jersey Commissioner of Health to establish a public awareness campaign about PPS and to develop of educational materials for local boards of health, physicians,

hospitals and clinics to distribute to polio survivors.

"New Jersey's declarations recognize for the first time that there are more polio survivors alive today in North American and Europe than there are individuals with spinal cord injury, multiple sclerosis and Parkinson's disease combined," said Bruno. "People think polio and polio survivors are gone. Polio may be forgotten, but it is not gone. There are estimated to be 1.8 million North American polio survivors, 20 million throughout the world."

These declarations also call for education about Post-Polio Sequelae which health care professionals -- and even polio survivors -- often know nothing about. Post-Polio Sequelae (PPS) are the unexpected and often disabling symptoms that occur in 75% of paralytic and 40% of non-paralytic polio survivors about 35 years after the poliovirus attack.

"PPS can be treated and even prevented through simple therapies," said Bruno.

As part of the "Year of the Polio Survivor," polio survivors Mia Farrow and Thaddeus Farrow are co-chairing the Post-Polio Letter Campaign. The Post-Polio Letter is a one page summary about the cause and treatment of PPS that will be translated into 15 languages and made available by the International Post-Polio Task Force to every doctor and polio survivor in the United States and around the world. "Other states and countries are also declaring 2002 "Year of the Polio Survivor" and September 'Polio Survivors Month' to get the word out about the cause and treatment of PPS, " says Bruno. "Polio survivors need education and treatment now. There is no more time to waste!"

<u>Altadena</u>

The Altadena club awarded \$400 mini-grants to eleven local elementary school teachers. Funds were disbursed for proposals ranging from book clubs to inspire reading, to digital cameras to document and record individual growth and development in language arts, to character maps documenting change.

<u>Arcadia</u>

On behalf of the Arcadia club, Michael Hoey collected and shipped 65 pairs of eyeglasses to the Volunteers in Optometric Services to Humanity. The glasses were sent to people in underprivileged countries who otherwise would be unable to afford them.

And speaking of websites and the internet, kudos to Anne Donofrio-Holter and husband Larry for unveiling such a great web district newsletter.


