For some of us, it may be quite a straight road as far as Rotary goes,



for others it may seem twisty and cluttered, full of challenges. And for most of us there are many intersections with other parts of our life, causing us to look this way and that to be sure we don't bump into anything, or at least that the bumps are easy ones

There surely are opportunities ahead for all of us. We've pledged to eradicate Polio and now we must ensure that our pledges turn into reality. We've begun to work on the district conference and now we must put the pieces of this very exciting adventure together. Every club will have an active part in the conference, so be ready for the call. There, past RI president Cliff Dochterman offered this observation to immediate past president Rick: "You know your term is up when the phone and fax stop ringing, and, more importantly when you find you have to pay for the meal at your own club." We have six months before the changeover, and when it does come, what we have done for those six months will set the stage for it. I suppose the better the job we have done, the more difficult it will be to give it up. So, my hope for all of us during the first half of 2003 is that we Sow the Seeds of Love in

Rotary Potpourri

In October, many of the Las Vegas area Rotary clubs participated in "Safe Streets" at Opportunity Village. Opportunity Village is a training facility for mentally challenged people which helps provide job skills to help their clients participate in the general population. The facility is extremely expensive to operate and very few state or county funds are provided. "Safe Streets" is a major fund raiser for the organization. The public is invited to tour the "Haunted Forest" over four days at Halloween. This year, as in the past, the Rotary clubs provided the funds (about \$8000) for candy at the many "trick or treat" stations.

More than 200 Rotarians participated in the four-day event. Members handed out candy, helped the children board the train that ran around the forest and ran the carrousel. Each participating club had their club banner on display.

Another event that took place was the annual "Santa Clothes" project. The Las Vegas Rotary Club started this project many years ago. On December 5 about 90 children were taken to two stores to shop. They were allowed to enter the stores at 8AM, before it opened to the public. Each Rotarian took a child and went shopping for an hour. The participating clubs provided the funds for each child to select \$125 worth of clothing. JC Penney gave a very generous 25% discount. After shopping the kids were transported to the UNLV campus where student athletes awaited their arrival. Lunch was served at the baseball stadium and the UNLV students and coaches then talked to the kids about the importance of staying in school, getting good grades and avoiding drugs and alcohol. It was a wonderful day that made you feel great about being a Rotarian.

Southern Nevada Clubs Announce Shop-a-Thon

Southern Nevada clubs have joined together in conjunction with local shopping malls and large retail outlets to raise funds to help eradicate polio. The clubs have requested the retailers make a pledge or donation and to place a poster in their establishments showing their support for the program. The general public will then be encouraged to shop at stores displaying the poster.

PRLs Seminar Scheduled for February 15-16, Primm, Nevada

The PRLs program is intended to help new Rotarians and potential Rotary leaders learn about Rotary and develop skills and knowledge needed to become effective Rotary committee chairs, directors and officers. The skills taught at the annual PRLs leadership seminar can also enrich and improve Rotarians in their professional life.

Formal recognition will be presented at the 2003 district conference to those Rotarians that have completed the entire PRLs program:

- 1) Attend a RYLA facilitator training meeting;
- 2) Attend a PRLS leadership seminar;
- 3) Sponsor at least one new member into Rotary; and
- 4) three of the four following options:
- a) attend a club board meeting;
- b) attend a district assembly;
- c) attend a district conference;
- d) attend an international convention.

These requirements must have been completed after the PRLs program started (7/1/94) Applications must be verified by the club president and assistant governor, and presented to the PRLs chairman by March 31, 2003. Presentation of the PRLs pin will be at the district conference scheduled for May 1-4, 2003 at the Pasadena Sheraton and Conference Center.

Altadena

A quarter of the active members in Altadena Rotary have signed on to mentor kids on business in local schools, impacting at least 250 kids each week. These Rotarians are giving the most valuable thing they have - their time. Altadena Rotary's efforts over the past 6 years, which have reached about 500 kids, was the catalyst for this new undertaking.
