March 30 Deadline to Submit Bulletins for Awards

March 30 is the deadline to submit club bulletins for consideration by the Club Bulletin Awards Committee. Club presidents and bulletin editors should start at the district web page and link to District Awards for information. Page 11 and 12 are specific to the judging and criteria. The committee will be looking at content, layout and style – use of color and humor – does it report your club's activities, programs and projects?

Send five (5) copies of five (5) club bulletins or newsletters. These are the five required: Your choice of your "best" bulletin from the months of August 2002, October 2002 and January 2003, along with the bulletins from the weeks of November 18 and February 24.

Send all 25 copies to: Christine Montan, Club Bulletin Awards Committee, 1357 Cogswell Road, South El Monte, CA, 91733.

Combined scores on these publications will determine the winners. The winners will be announced at the District Conference, May 1-4, in Pasadena. Do not miss the deadline – entries submitted after March 30 cannot be considered.

Centennial Poster Contest

Rotary International will be celebrating 100 years of service in the year 2005. As part of that celebration, Rotary clubs are invited to organize children's poster contests. One winner selected from each participating Rotary club will be entered into a Rotary district competition. One winner from each district competition will be entered into one of 34 zone competitions. One winner from each zone competition will compete in the international competition.

<u>How To Enter</u>: Through the local Rotary club. Eligibility: Children ages 10, 11, 12, or 13 on January 1, 2003 are eligible to compete. There will not be separate competitions for various age groups. One entry per child and all posters must be the work of only one child.

<u>Design Theme</u>: Posters should express the concept of providing service to others in the community and in the world.

Specifications: Use chalk, charcoal, crayon, paint, pastel, pen, or pencil. Chalk, charcoal, and pastel posters must be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing and smudging. Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled, or attached to the artwork in any way. Framed, matted, or laminated artwork will not be accepted. The use of lettering, numbering, or a corporate logo in any language on the front of the poster is not allowed, with the exception of the Rotary International or the Rotary Centennial logos. Artwork must be no smaller than 12 inches by 18 inches (30 cm by 45 cm) and no larger than 24 inches by 24 inches (60 cm by 60 cm). Folded posters will not be accepted; artwork should be rolled and shipped in a mailing tube.

<u>Deadlines</u>: The clubs and districts will determine specific deadlines for their competitions. Club contest entries must be submitted to the district no later than November 15, 2003.

<u>Winners</u>: Winners of the club and district competitions will be presented with certificates provided to districts by Rotary International. Zone winners will be announced in September 2004 and will receive a memento from Rotary International. The winner and runners-up of the international competition will be announced in February 2005 and will receive a cash prize and a memento from

Rotary International. Clubs and districts are encouraged to display runners-up in the local community in schools, libraries, and other public places and to consider presenting recognition materials to runners-up and other participants at no cost to RI. District 5300 will award one first place recognition of \$250, and five runner-up recognitions of \$50.

Space Art

It was a cultural smorgasbord for the visitors as kids aged 9 and 10 were transfixed by paintings of the American Masters on display in the Artrain.

The train's passageway is narrow, less than twelve feet wide. The children immediately realized they were in a very place special. Some of them sat on the floor, other preferred to stand, but all were instantly attentive. The NASA and National Air and Space Museum Art Collection tour was about to begin.

The first painting to be interpreted by a Rotarian was Rockwell's "Astronauts on the Moon." The Rotarian guide explained to the eager youngsters that Rockwell's painting was a wonderful example how an artist used lines and geometrical figures to depict their subject.

As the youngsters moved through the exhibit they learned about colors, textures, and brush strokes as wonderful examples of these techniques were on display.

How did our club become involved in this wonderful project? Two years ago Rotarian Jack Childs had a vision of bringing paintings of contemporary artists to his adopted hometown of Henderson, NV., so that the local children might learn about art.

A coalition of sponsors and supporters were formed to assure that Artrain's stop in Henderson would be a success. On a sad note, Jack passed on before his vision was realized. His wife Donna continued to press forward and on September 19, 2002, Jack and Donna's dream became a reality.

Picture four streamline passenger car trains standing on a railroad siding. The guides for these interactive touring exhibits were largely Rotarians from the Las Vegas South Sunset Rotary Club. Every volunteer had to attend a two-hour class conducted by the Artrain staff.

In all, twelve members of our club volunteered some 600 hours to guide approximately 4500 children and adults through 'outer space' as seen by some of America's great artists.
