## Rotary Potpourri

### Membership

While August is recognized each year as Rotary's membership month, every month provides us with an opportunity to support and grow the world's first service organization. And, although Rotary provides an abundance of tools and leadership to benefit clubs worldwide, there is nothing truly new in the time-tested processes of recruiting, developing and retaining members. Whether you are seeking to develop membership strategies, explore innovative ways to set goals, or create ideas to implement plans, there are no truly new ideas or magic bullets - it's all been done before.

Take a look at how these three organizations approach the challenge:

Cornell University states "the primary purpose of every Cornell club and alumni association is to actively reach out to attract more and more alumni every year." This top-ranked university states that clubs and alumni associations with the greatest success in increasing membership have three elements in common: 1) They make membership development their TOP priority; 2) They offer a diverse range of programs that are attractive; 3) They implement a plan for follow-up.

The Art Gallery in South Australia titles their approach "Getting Them In and Keeping Them There: Membership Development Through Functions." They noted a correlation between the "function we do and the level of our membership," and present some examples of activities to "demonstrate how we use our program to increase and retain membership."

Finally, a look at the five-year strategic plan for the Speech-Language-Hearing Association of South Carolina states that its number one goal is "building membership by recruiting new members," including: 1) Encouraging members to recruit by starting a member incentive program; 2) Helping new members learn about the organization; 3) Targeting potential members emphasizing the importance of joining a professional association.

If you visit the Download Center at [www.rotary.org](http://www.rotary.org), you'll find additional support material that's easy to use, concise, tested, proven and free. I urge you to challenge your clubs and your members to Lend A Hand in helping us reach our goal of 1.5 (million) in '05.

## **Russian Delegations**

Rotary International and the Open World program sponsored by the Library of Congress have a program available to Rotary clubs to bring a small group of Russians to our communities for eight days to learn more about the USA.

The delegates learn about our education system, laws, environment, economic development, health system, women in leadership, and youth issues, by visiting businesses arranged by local Rotary clubs. Much of the program is paid for by funds available through the Open World Program and Rotary. Funds cover an additional translator, ticketed events, and reimbursement for host family expenses. Rotary clubs are expected to pay for items such as Rotary meetings, fellowship parties and dinners, and transportation costs.

The delegates may be hosted in homes, or other lodging, such as university dorms.
