A Few Words from the District Governor

Did you know that District 5300 has a student who will graduate in the FIRST graduating class from one of the Rotary Centers for International Studies? Chantal Paydar will complete her studies in 2004 from a University in Brazil. There are seven new Rotary Centers in the world and only 70 students were selected for the first year of graduate study. What an honor to have Chantal selected from our district. Once she graduates, she will be visible within our district and will be speaking about her experiences. As Rotary sends out 70 World Peace Scholars every year, the world will be impacted by Rotary and our ability to pursue peace. Someday soon the United Nations will look to Rotary as the specialists in peace and conflict resolution and will be leading peace talks around the world. The reason I have brought up the Rotary Centers for International Studies is because February is *World Understanding Month.* What better way to understand other parts of the world than to work toward peace.

President Jonathan Majiyagbe wants us to "Lend a Hand for world understanding." He states "the connection between humanitarian service and peace is especially important. Hunger, poverty, and ignorance breed despair, anger and fear – the same emotions that fan the flames of intolerance, conflict, and even war." With Rotary International's worldwide fellowship of clubs in 31,000 communities, we have many programs to promote peace. We have the Group Study Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholarships, Matching Grants, Rotary Friendship Exchange, Youth Exchange, the Centennial Twin Club program, just to name a few, to better understand different parts of the world.

District 5300 is actively participating in these programs. Please consider hosting team members from our two incoming teams from South Africa and Mexico. Two teams from our district will be going to these two countries. The Mexico GSE Team will be looking for projects in Mexico that we can do over three years. We have made a commitment to District 4110 to return two more years to hopefully make a difference in their district. Our district committee will soon be interviewing for Ambassadorial Scholars, so look to your community for potential candidates. I would love for our district to get more involved in youth exchange. The program is such a great opportunity that we need more of our students to take advantage of it. If your club is not taking part in these programs, you are truly missing out.

One of the ways we can give back for these wonderful programs is to donate to the Rotary Foundation. On February 7, 2004, you can hear past Rotary International president and chairman of the board of trustees for the Rotary Foundation, James Lacy, speak about the wonders of the Rotary Foundation. He recently spoke from the heart at our Las Vegas foundation dinner. You will be blessed by hearing him and he will make you proud to be a Rotarian. 9th Annual Rotary International Peace Conference - March 27, 2004

March 27, 2004, Fuller School of Psychology, Travis Auditorium, Pasadena, 8:30 AM - 3:00 pm. The theme of the conference is PROMOTE PEACE - CREATE JOBS: Strategies for Eradication of Poverty.

The eradication of extreme poverty is the number one objective of RI president Jonathan Majiyagbe and the UN's millennium development goals, with a reduction in half desired by 2015. Clubs in District 5300 have been actively pursuing the stimulation of entrepreneurship through economic education that leads to job creation in the Middle East, Africa, Mexico, among Native Americans, and in local schools.

Speakers representing the World Bank Institute, World Vision International, Pasadena Unified School District, Fuller Theological Seminary, and others, will explore the parameters of the theme, followed by a plenary of experts on programs currently being tried by Rotary clubs. The World Bank representative will present a new program - AIDSWEB - which couples HIV/AIDS education with the Youth IT micro enterprise program currently being conducted in Uganda in partnership with District 5300.

The objective will be to develop strategies for actual implementation by Rotary clubs, both in international service and in vocational service locally. PDG Garbis Der Yeghian is the conference chair and moderator. Committee members include C.
