

# Pasadena Sunrise Rotary Helps Donate Two Ambulances to Ensenada, Mexico Rotary Club



When Attorney Dale Pelch learned from a client that two

decommissioned ambulances were available for donation, he knew just where to turn for

help in finding an organizat ion that would put the ambulanc es to good use



- his fellow Pasadena Sunrise Rotarians. "They haven't let me down yet," said Pelch, who has recently completed serving a term as the club's President. With the aid of Rotarian Pete Reyes, Pelch helped develop and coordinate a plan for members of the Ensenada Centenaria Rotary Club to come to Pasadena, accept the ambulances from Aegis Ambulance Service Inc. of Monrovia and drive them back to Mexico. In turn, the Ensenada Centenaria Rotary will deliver the ambulances to two small towns in need of such equipment.

"We are very grateful," said Carlos Carral, founder of the Ensenada Centenaria club, at the Thursday morning meeting when the transfer took place. "I hope this is the beginning of our two clubs working together on a number of projects."

## District Clubs Seek Partners in Matching Grant Project Tom Hale

The Rotary Clubs of Arcadia and Sierra Madre are looking for other clubs who may be interested in collaborating on a matching grant opportunity. This project, if approved, has the potential of changing hundreds of young adult's lives each year. The purpose of the grant is to purchase equipment for the newly-established Kinkiizi Community College in southwestern Uganda in East Africa,

In January 2004, the college opened with 40 students and in just seven months, the numbers grew by more than 300% to 160 students resulting in congestion within the facilities regarding kitchen and classroom equipment, library books, sanitation equipment, computers, etc. This project will provide beds, chairs, cooking equipment, an electric generator for equipment operations, solar panels for lighting, and additional sanitation facilities. These will make it possible to maintain the existing number of students and also prepare for another 140 students that are expected by the end of the year. Based on feedback from Uganda Rotarians, providing vocational and educational opportunities for their young adults is the best way to break the "cycle of misery" of hunger, disease, overpopulation, and extreme poverty.

In 2003, the Arcadia Noon Club, led by Past President Bob Novell, spearheaded a very successful matching grant with the same Rotary Club of Bugolobi, Uganda along with District 5300 partners Sierra Madre, Victor Valley Sunrise and the St. Luke's Church in La Crescenta for a Clean Drinking Water Project in Nyamirama. In less than fifteen months, the grant was conceived, written submitted and approved for District and R.I. matching funds, commenced and completed. The water project now serves over 5,000 Ugandans, and is a great example of how combining resources and creative energies can result in a greatly improved quality of so many lives.

Intra-district projects also build better friendship between District 5300 Rotarians and our fellow Rotarians internationally. In a recent presentation about Germany to the Covina Rotary Club, Lauren shared a letter from her host family. Here is an excerpt: "We are so happy . . . that we are the host parents for Lauren because our daughter Julia leaves for Brazil in August. Julia is our only child and we will miss her very much. Now all our love is for Lauren. She must not be afraid about the strange language. She will learn it very quickly . . ."

## Blane Immunization Grant From Margaret Cooker

A little known source of funds is the Blane Immunization Grant that is available on a one-time basis per club for any project that increases immunization rates WITHIN YOUR OWN COMMUNITY.

It is a simple form to fill out and your club president has received the complete package of information. Governor Roy has set aside more than \$4,000 of DDF for these local projects. This means \$500 of club money will become \$2,000 to fund your project.

These grants are approved on a rolling basis with very quick results. Victorville had their money in hand within six weeks.

Here are a few ideas: publicity for a flu or childhood immunization clinic; purchase vaccine such as tetanus, chickenpox and flu, which are in short supply; a small portable freezer to transport vaccine for your local provider; incentives for an immunization clinic. You can mix and match ideas within the grant. Victorville used the grant to fund a portable freezer and informational baby bids with their grant.

# Report from El Salvador University, Argentina

Chantal Paydar is District 5300's World Peace Scholar. Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Victorville in 2001-2002, she is nearing completion of her Master's Degree. Chantal chose to study at the University of El Salvador in Buenos Aires so will not complete her studies until the end of their academic year in December of 2004. Here is an update from Chantal to all of us.

"Right now I'm still in Buenos Aires studying like a maniac. I've been going to bed at 7 or 7:30 a.m. for the past couple of nights/days/whatever, in preparation for the LSAT on October 2 and trying to keep up on all the school work we have.

Being part of the first class and, thus, the



guinea pigs, the university has arranged for us to have our most intensive number of courses during our

last semester, on top of all the thesis preparation/reading we are doing. I then went and made my semester even more complicated by decided to take the LSAT. Fortunately, we have an amazing staff, headed by Dr. Mirta Barreiro, and they are always to supportive and understand and extremely helpful. Long story longer, I will be finished with my program in December and will make future plans based on what my options are. I also applied for this amazing program call Ship for World Youth.

## **GSE Team Member from D-9350 Nominated as World Peace Scholar** From Margaret Cooker

Steven Nakana, the conflict resolution member of the GSE team from D-9350 South Africa, has received their district's very first nomination for the prestigious Rotary Peace Scholar, a two-year master's level program awarding \$25,000 per year.



The team first learned about the program in May 2004 and with the encouragement and support of team leader Trevor Tyers, Stephen has been selected as their nominee.

RI makes the final selection from among the total possible 529 candidates, one from each district in the world, in December with world publication in March at Rotary UN Day.

The bad news in this story is that although RI can select up to 70 Peace Scholars, at this time there is only funding for 20. District 5300, however, is a Pioneer Peace Building District and gives \$25,000 to the World Peace Scholar Program each year.

District 5300 is currently seeking candidates for our own Peace Scholar selection process. Please contact John Regan, District 5300 Chair with your club's nomination.


