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A Christmas Gift to Help Impoverished Arab Youth in Lebanon

In recent days, one of our number, who wishes to remain anonymous, made a major contribution to The Rotary Foundation that will not only benefit three recipients with Paul Harris Fellowships but, through designation to a Matching Grant project in Lebanon, will benefit hundreds of Arab high school youth.

Although this anonymous Rotarian says, "It's no big deal," this Rotarian has done something awesome that deserves our applause and commendation. The marvel of Rotary's matching grant program is that this Rotarian's gift turns into three times plus the original donation because of the addition of matching funds from District 5300's share account and

from The Rotary Foundation. This multiplier effect is what has enabled our International Service committee to use its share of funds from Altadena Rotary Charities to do so much abroad in Armenia, Nazareth, Jerusalem, Uganda, Zimbabwe, South Africa, and now in Lebanon.

The Junior Achievement program in Lebanon was started by Rotary Clubs there. The oldest is the Beirut club, organized in 1932, and now there are 15 other clubs. Baabda Rotary, with only 24 members, is a daughter club in Beirut and has raised funds in Lebanon toward the Matching Grant along with Altadena Rotary and Glendora Rotary, whose president-elect Ray Malki is managing our whole Middle East program. Malki, born in Syria and therefore fluent in Arabic, visited the Baabda club and personally met with the Rotarians who are the overseers for this project. But well before that, Malki and I met several times with Heather Haxo Phillips, Oakland who spent two years in Lebanon to get J.A. launched there.

We thank this anonymous Rotarian for the generosity and desire to help impoverished Arab youth. 'Malignant poverty' was cited in the *L.A. Times* this week by a prominent civil rights attorney as the main cause of violence in greater Los Angeles, and it certainly applies around the world and in the volatile Middle East. 'Entrepreneurship education' is the key to future 'job creation' according to all economic development experts. The announcement of this contribution to alleviate poverty in Lebanon will bring joy to the hearts of our fellow Rotarians in Beirut but especially to the youth who will benefit, as we have already seen in Nazareth.

TRF - HUMANITARIAN GRANTS PROGRAMS

Phased out grant program reports are due at TRF (The Rotary Foundation) immediately. The original deadline was extended from June 30. Phased out programs include: Children's Opportunity Grants, Community Assistance Program (CAP), Discovery and Helping Grants, Transportation Grants, and New Opportunity Grants.

Beginning January 2005, failure to submit acceptable reports will result in the following:

1. New DSG requests will not be approved until all district-sponsored New Opportunity Grants and CAP Grants within the district are closed. That that District 5300 will not have access to the \$25,000 that is planned for distribution in the District Simplified Grant program of District 5300.

- 2. New Individual Grant applications (funds towards travel of Rotarians and non Rotarians to areas of planned or active projects) will not be approved for clubs and districts that are international sponsors of open Discovery Grants until those grants are closed.
- 3. New Matching Grant applications will not be approved for clubs and districts that are sponsors of Children's Opportunity Grants, Transportation Grants and Helping Grants until those grants are closed i.e. until ALL reports are in from ALL active grants then NO club in the district will get ANY money from the Foundation.

Please ensure all reports are submitted ASAP.
