The purpose of the Symposium is to provide participating Interactors, faculty advisors, Rotary liaisons and other junior Rotary club members, with valuable information that will enable them to

build and maintain successful Interact and other junior Rotary clubs. To achieve its purpose, the Symposium is organized around three primary components: speakers, workshops, and fellowship. Keynote speakers from Rotary International and/or the participating Rotary districts will address the Symposium participants on topics of interest to high school students. The speakers' topics will reflect the international nature of the programs of Rotary.

Symposium participants will attend sessions and workshops that address the following key points: Membership Development and Retention; Meeting Skills and the Board of Directors; Team Building, Leadership and Communication; Community Service; International Service; and Fundraising.

The sessions and workshops are primarily designed to assist officers and directors of Interact Clubs to be more effective. They are intended to be both inspirational and practical. Each workshop and/or session may, if appropriate to its topic, present Rotary projects as examples of service. Each workshop will present techniques, ideas, and specific examples of successful Interact Club activities that participants can put into action in their own Interact Clubs. Membership in an Interact Club should be an enjoyable experience. Interact Symposium participants will take part in various fellowship activities.

In addition to simply being fun, these activities will develop leadership skills, foster co-operation, and encourage the establishment of lasting friendships.

## Montebello Fire Department Mourns Loss of "Rotary" Dog Anne Donofrio-Holter Montebello Rotary



The Montebello Fire Department is mourning the loss of Harry, one of the department's three search and rescue dogs and one of its loved and valued members.

Close to 100 police and fire personnel from all over the state, along with their four-legged partners, attended Harry's memorial January 29 at the Quiet Cannon. Harry passed away January 19 from a previously undetected heart problem. The chocolate lab was four years old.

All of Montebello's search and rescue dogs were placed through the

National Disaster Search Dog Foundation. The Foundation rescues dogs with potential from animal shelters or assistance programs and professionally trains them for six months. At the end of the training period, they are placed with firefighters at no charge to the department. Harry's training was funded by a matching grant from Rotary International.

Harry and his handler Engineer Russell Tao's most recent assignment was the search for victims of the La Conchita mudslide a few weeks ago. In December 2003, Harry also helped supply closure for four families when he located the remains of four victims of the Old Waterman Canyon mudslide.

"I miss Harry dearly," said Tao. "He was a great partner and friend. I've learned a lot

working with Harry over the past three years and I am a much better person because of it."

To keep their skills sharp, the teams train three to four hours a day, twice a week, in all types of situations. A dog's nose is 20,000 times more sensitive than a human's enabling the dogs to locate live humans within minutes that have been buried alive in all types of materials and situations.

In time, Tao will team up with a new four-legged partner and work again with canine search and rescue. "Working with Harry was too wonderful an experience not to do it again," said Tao.

# **District 5300 a Leading District in the World**Margaret Cooker DFC

District 5300 is a leading district in the world in Foundation giving. As of January 31, we are ninth in the world's 529 districts and third in our Zone with total contributions of over \$500,000. In the last ten years, total TRF contributions have been between \$284,000 and \$710,000, with contributions to the annual SHARE program between \$250,000 and \$500,000 dollars. This means that we have between \$110,000

and \$302,000 coming back to the district three years after the donation as ddf - district designated funds - money that we decide how it will be spent among the programs that we generally support e.g. Ambassadorial Scholars, Peace Scholars, Matching Grants and District Simplified Grants.

DSGs are a new program - this is only the second year we have had these funds available for the district committee to assign. This year 14 grants have been funded and include the following projects:

## DISTRICT 5300 IS NUMBER ONE IN ALL OF ZONE 24 IN MEMBERSHIP FOR THE YEAR 2003-2004!



Congratulations all Rotarians who helped to achieve this goal. As District Governor in 2003-2004, I challenged incoming Presidents at the President Elect Training Seminar in early 2003 to make membership a top priority in their club. As usual, they came through with flying colors as they passed that challenge on to their own clubs.

District 5300 had a 3.28% increase in membership during the 2003-2004 year, elevating

our District Rotarian number from 2,801 to 2,893. Zone 24 consists of 11 districts from Southern California, Southern Nevada, Hawaii and parts of Canada. The 2<sup>nd</sup> place district behind District 5300 had a 2.74% increase, so we were on top by quite a margin.

The chartering of the Azusa Rotary Club helped to cinch our illustrious title, as we were able to submit 20 new Rotarians to Rotary International on June 30, 2004, just under the deadline. A special thank you to the Governor's Special Representative, Rudy Hayek, Past President of Sierra Madre for leading the new club to charter, and another big thank you to the President of Azusa Rotary, Dan Bacani for his tireless efforts in making sure his club chartered by June 30, 2004.

Without a great District Membership Chairman and Committee, we would not have been able to attain this awesome goal. District Membership Chairman for 2003-2004, Susan Nunnery, spread enthusiasm around the district as she traveled to many clubs and gave them tools to grow their membership. Hats off to a great District Membership Committee who also spoke at clubs and led three successful membership seminars during the year.

And, finally kudos to the "red shirts," the Club Presidents of 2003-2004, the best class this district has ever had! (I know I'm a bit biased!)

My apologies for taking so long to congratulate our District, though the final membership numbers were recently released from Rotary International. I think they might have had a hiccup in their membership computers. Let's keep up the energy and excitement for membership and carry it on this year and for years to come. It's nice for District 5300 to be #1.....let's stay there!
