

On Sunday, November 20, 2005, Montebello Rotarians Manny Franco, Angel Muro, Edgar Morales, Helio Altamirano, Gabe Robles, Fernando Cuevas, Bill Nighswonger, David Avirom, Gabe Garza, Richard Adams and Anne Donofrio-Holter assembled at Montebello's Sanchez Adobe for a semi-annual clean-up day.

Along with members of the Montebello and Cantwell High School Interact Clubs, Montebello High School Ecology Club, local Boys/Girls Scouts, Montebello Historical Society and Montebello Housing Development Corporation staff, groups fanned out canvassing the grounds of the structure pulling weeds, cutting tree limbs, collecting cans, bottles and other debris. Inside, groups dusted display cases and swept floors.

In celebration of 100 years of Rotary International, Montebello Rotarians adopted the Sanchez Adobe last year as their centennial project. The club's goal is to enhance

Montebello's oldest standing structure by improving the grounds, courtyard and interior of the historical landmark which was built in 1845.



Phases two and three of the project includes a museum assessment program and the development of a master plan for on-going maintenance, improvements, and funding. On Saturday December 17, Azusa Rotarians Rosalinda Buchwald, Harry Heflin, Connie Ibarra, and Rae and Frank Kearney had the privilege of helping their favorite Santa, Azusa Rotarian Terry Kistler, deliver presents to 30 children in 10 families in Azusa who needed a little help to make their Christmas morning extra-special.

The gift delivery climaxed a three-month effort to identify families in need, locate sponsors for the children, gather, sort, and wrap the donated gifts, and then finally deliver them to the children. Azusa Rotarians contributed many of the gifts, and an "Angel Tree" at the King Buffet in Azusa where the club meets helped publicize the effort and attracted gifts from King Buffet employees and customers.

The sorting and wrapping of the approximately 60 gifts was a much larger project than anyone anticipated, and the Rotary group did a lot of the work at their Christmas party and also at their December board meeting.

Azusa Rotarian Rae Kearney who conceived and organized the entire project, says "We experienced first-hand the joy of giving to children in need this Christmas, and not only that, we had fun doing it!"

One of the truly unique aspects of the program was that "Santa" delivered the presents roaring around Azusa on his Harley-Davidson motorcycle, attracting a lot of waves and approving hornhonks in the process. Azusa President Harry Heflin says, "Well, snow for Santa's sled is sparse in Azusa, so I guess he just had to make do..."

MONTEBELLO ROTARIANS SERVE AT ANNUAL CHRISTMAS AT THE CANNON PROGRAM

Montebello Rotarians Helio Altamirano, David Avirom, Anne Donofrio-Holter, Manny Franco, Gabe Garza, Ralph Helm, Ted Jones, Sheraly Khwaja, Kathy Kohn, Edgar Morales, Mike Newton, Phyllis Murakawa, Bernadette Ramos, Chris Robles, Gabe Robles, Kathy Salazar and Luis Trujillo, in addition to members of local high school Interact clubs, helped serve lunch to more than 2,000 needy local residents at the 18th annual Christmas at the Cannon program held Christmas Eve at the Montebello Country Club.



Following a buffet style lunch, those in attendance were treated to performances by Christmas carolers and clowns, and of course, a visit from Santa Claus.

Each year volunteers from all walks of life participate in various capacities - as food servers, table clearers, greeters, and gift wrappers. The program has turned into a major community event and has fed over 30,000 people to date.

"This is a wonderful program put on each year through the efforts of many local organizations and groups in our community," said club president Kathy Kohn. "The Montebello Rotary Club is proud to participate."

MATCHING GRANT IN NIGERIA APPROVED

5 Bore Holes will be dug in Nigeria thanks to the fund raising efforts of Griffith Middle School Jr. Interact Club and Gabrielino Interact Club members.

Influenced by speakers that they heard at the Seven District Interact Leadership Symposium on the Clean Water Initiative these young people decided to make a difference. They compounded their money by approaching their respective Rotary Clubs - East Los Angeles and San Gabriel - for a match of funds. Dave Beltran of East Los Angeles took the lead in writing two grants.

One got under the wire for the Individual Grants and allowed Dave Beltran to travel to Nigeria in November 2005 to establish the relationships with the local people and Rotarians as well as set the projects in motion.

The other is the full Matching Grant that was approved mid-December for the provision of at least 5 bore holes to this remote area of Nigeria. When complete these villages will have access to clean water for the first time.

The release of the women and children from the time consuming and physically demanding task of fetching polluted water will allow the women to start to educate their children and to start micro- businesses.

Funds for the 5 bore holes

comes from a Junior Interact, Interact and two Rotary clubs, District 5300 ddf (district designated funds from Annual-Share giving 3 years ago) and TRF (the Rotary Foundation).
