WHERE ROTARY ISN'T

Whenever we travel for work or pleasure, we Rotarians pretty much take for granted that wherever we go, we can find a welcoming Rotary club filled with like-minded persons where we will be welcomed for a makeup. In addition to being the original service organization currently boasting 1.2 million Rotarians in 167 countries, Rotary is of course also the most international of all the service clubs.


But the question might occur, are there any countries that do not have Rotary clubs? Rotary International will charter Rotary clubs wherever the fundamental principles of Rotary can be freely observed, but sadly there are 23 countries in which for various reasons no Rotary clubs exist. No clubs are to be found in Bhutan, Cuba, Iran, Iraq, Kiribati, Kuwait, Laos, Libya, Maldives, Marshall Islands, Myanmar, Nauru, North Korea, People's Republic of China, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Syria, Turkmenistan, Tuvalu, Uzbekistan, Vietnam, or Yemen.

Although Rotary International has nine criteria for the establishment of clubs in a country, generally there are two main hurdles that block the establishment of clubs in those few countries without Rotary.

First, the organization of the Rotary clubs must have express and concrete approval from relevant branches of government. Secondly, the club must be able to function freely as a nonpolitical entity of an international organization which is committed to the ideal of service to humanity and the enhancement of the quality of life. Freedom of speech and association are thought to be crucial for Rotary to succeed.

In the countries that do not yet meet the criteria to host their own Rotary Clubs, Rotary International still encourages established clubs in other countries to do what they can to bring worthwhile projects to the countries as is possible without creating political tensions or endangering lives. The hope is that those worthwhile projects will demonstrate the good that Rotary can do, and slowly hearts and minds will be won over, and the barriers will at some point drop so on more country can join the world of Rotary.

So, while we can all look forward to a day when all countries will benefit from an organization that unselfishly provides humanitarian service, encourages high ethical standards in all vocations, and helps build goodwill and peace in the world -- very sadly that day is probably not near at hand.



INDUSTRY HILLS ROTARY CENTENNIAL PROJECT

Industry Hills Rotary commemorates their participation in the Rotary International Centennial Projects by creating a delightful park area next to the treasured Rowland Home, a 150 year old brick edifice that was built in 1855 by John Rowland, cofounder of the La Puente Valley ranches and vineyards, and co-owner of Rancho De La Puente which was originally a 50,000 acre land grant.

Today the Home, under the auspices of the La Puente Historical Society, is part of a historical monument to the past, a learning source for the 3,000 or so students a year that come to the facility, where a "hands-on" tour takes them back to the early California days when candles were made from melted wax, blankets were handwoven from yarn, corn was ground on a matate, clothes were scrubbed on a scrub board, and calves were roped by young ranchers.

The many loyal volunteer docents from the La Puente Valley Historical Society spend countless hours reaching out to these students from the 3rd grade classes throughout our valley. Children come with their teachers to "learn by doing," and the park has been created to give them a place to relax and enjoy their lunches at the end of the tour.

The original selection of a park was made by John Kramar, a native La Puentean, Rotarian, and former Superintendent of the Hacienda /La Puente School District. It was his suggestion that Rotary, in creating this beautiful little park, would continue to commemorate their dedication to the community by a permanent addition to a beautiful and treasured part of California history.






NATIONALLY RENEWNED SPEAKER AT PICO RIVERA CLUB


DISTRICT GOVERNOR FOR 2008-2009 SELECTED


My team brings a diverse group of professionals with much to share with our European counterparts. We are looking forward to the many learning opportunities the trip will present. I feel we have put together an
