DISTRICT 5300 3-H GRANT IN UGANDA IS APPROVED BY: BOB NOVELL

At their April board meeting, The Board of Trustees of The Rotary Foundation (Foundation) approved District 5300's 3-H (health, hunger, and humanity) matching grant with an award from the Foundation of \$300,000. Thirty-two Rotary Clubs within District 5300 had collectively committed \$30,000 to support this multi-year project. The total amount coming from the Foundation and the District 5300 Rotary Clubs will therefore be \$330,000.

The basic concept for this matching grant project is as follows: (a) we will select up to 400 high school graduates who have the mental capacity to attend college but do not have the financial capacity to attend college; (b) we will organize these selected students into groups of 20 individuals and give them micro loans of approximately \$400 each which will be used for training, seed and goats, tractor rental, and day labor cost; (c) the students will work together to grow crops / raise goats which they will sell back to the lending cooperative in order to repay their loans and earn a surplus which will ultimately pay for their college education; (c) the cooperative in turn will process the crops into food and sell / distribute it at a reduced cost to feed approximately 5,000 elementary who currently go without food during the school day; and (d) included in the above project will be donated land to be farmed, irrigation systems, trucks, tractors, storage silos, and administrative personnel and equipment.

It is expected that the grant implementation will cover multiple years, and once implemented, the project will be selfsustaining. More details will follow in next month's newslet-

ter.

Editors Note for the golf challenged:

A shamble is a type of golf tournament that combines elements of a scramble with elements of stroke play.

Like in a scramble, all members of a team (usually four) tee off and the best ball of the four tee shots is selected. All players move their balls to the spot of the best ball. From this point, the hole is played out at stroke play, with all members of the team playing their own ball into the hole.

So: select the best shot off the tee, move all balls to that spot, then play individual stroke play until each member of the group has holed out.
