# DISTRICT GOVERNOR STEW ANDERSON'S OUTSTANDING MONTHLY MESSAGE

#### **Dear Fellow Rotarians:**

How does one start the last Governor's newsletter for the 2005-2006 Rotary year? I checked my District Governor's manual but there was no reference to the last newsletter.

How can I possibly thank all the outstanding Presidents and the 2830 Rotarians who worked so hard to complete their club goals?

As a tribute to you all I would like to list a few of the District's accomplishments this past Rotary year. All too often we are given the goals but not the results.

#### • Membership Goal:

Thru May 15<sup>th</sup> we have increased our District membership by 48 members for a 1.73% gain. During the last two years our District added 70 new members so we are looking good. I am confident we will show even greater improvement over the next two months.

We have lost one club (Diamond Bar) and merged Foothill Sunrise with the Azusa Rotary Club to make one stronger Rotary Club. These two clubs have placed "Service Above Self" to put history aside and begin the second century of Rotary in cooperation and fellowship.

#### • Literacy Project:

As you may have heard we have far exceeded our book goal! Thank you for your total support. Our community's children are the winners.

It was very exciting to hear that Reading by 9 will be offered in the state of Nevada next year. We have 14 clubs in our district who are participating with other organizations that distributed over 605,000 books this year. Congratulations!

#### Hunger Campaigns:

Throughout the year you have contributed thousands of pounds of food to your communities thru your generosity.

This weekend our goal was to collect 530 pounds of food to donate to the Palm Springs area food bank. We collected 870 pounds during the conference plus 1800 pounds collected by the Las Vegas NW Kideract clubs for a grand total of 2670 pounds. Outstanding!

#### Health Campaign:

The emphasis has been on clean water. Our district is leading the way with numerous water projects around the world. Clean water still remains a major opportunity and it deserves to be a Rotary priority.

Other health issues, in which we have been involved, include immunization clinics, eye surgery, polio corrective surgery, malaria eradication to name just a few.

Along with the Rotary Foundation, our district has contributed over \$100,000 for the projects I have mentioned.

#### ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE UPDATE

Welcome to the 2006-07 Rotary year. First I would like to thank Jim Rider of Arcadia Rotary Club. Jim has done a great job bringing the Rotary Youth Exchange Program to a higher level.

Our district is part of a multi-district exchange group. In years past, we were called SCANEX (So. California, Arizona, Nevada Exchange), but then we added Hawaii and Utah. Unable to make a name of it... we changed our name to Y.E.S. (Youth Exchange Services).

Rotary has two types of programs. The *long-term* exchange lasts for one year. Students stay in two or three homes. Host families do NOT need to be Rotarians. Each student is sent by a Sponsoring Rotary Club and is hosted by a Host Rotary Club.

This year, we will host three *long-term* students. The Boulder City Rotary Club in Nevada will host a young lady from Germany, the Alhambra Rotary Club will host a young man from Brazil, and the Claremont Rotary Club will host a young man from Denmark.

The *short-term* Youth Exchange Program lasts three to four weeks. The *short-term* program is a one-to-one exchange. Each student that goes abroad must be willing to host a student in his or her home. Students stay with only one family. This year we will have three short-term students. Courtney sponsored by the Altadena Rotary Club, Kristen sponsored by the Arcadia Rotary Club, and Evan sponsored by the Duarte Rotary Club. Courtney and Kristen will be going to Paraguay to immerse in the culture and language. Evan will be going to the Czech Republic.

Now is the time to identify students interested in being Youth Exchange Students. Students CAN be children of Rotarians. Your Interact Club, church group, neighbor, relatives, or friends of your children are all potential candidates.

We have a *long-term* outbound orientation in the fall. Applications for *long-term* students should be received by September 30.


