The Rotary Foundation (TRF) Monthly Report By: Bob Novell, D5300 Foundation Chair

Happy New Year. We are halfway through the Rotary year and Rotarians in District 5300 continue to contribute to the Foundation which means that District 5300 Rotary Clubs will be able to use the Foundation's educational and humanitarian grant programs at a level that very few other Districts in the world can do.

• **District Simplified Grants (DSG's).** The final day for submitting a grant DSG application was December 31st. Review, approval, and distribution of funds to Club's whose DSG's have been approved will take place in January. We have \$25,000 available in DSG funds to support Club projects.

• Southern California Foundation Dinner. <u>The Magic of the Rotary Foundation</u> will be this year's theme for the Southern California Rotary Foundation Dinner on January 27th at the Royal Vista Golf

Club in Walnut (see the District website for more details). This will be an opportunity to celebrate the wonderful programs and projects that we can do through the Foundation.

Polio Eradication Update. In addition to the endemic countries of Nigeria, India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan, twelve countries have reported polio cases in 2006 due to importations (Somalia, Yemen, Indonesia, Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Kenya, Angola, Cameroon, Namibia, Niger, Nepal and DR Congo). The eradication program now has vaccines which are twice as effective and diagnostic tools that detect and track poliovirus twice as fast as before. The remaining challenges to a polio-free world are: (a) strengthening political oversight at the national, state and district level, (b) curbing the intense transmission in the highpriority states in northern Nigeria and western Uttar Pradesh, India, (c) increasing access to reach enough children with vaccine to break the final chains of transmission, (d) continuing to apply the rapid response strategies to stop polio outbreaks in previously poliofree countries, (e) addressing low routine immunization rates and surveillance gaps in polio-free areas, and (f) maintaining funding.

'07 Peace Conference to focus on Latin America by C. Ray Carlson, Program Chair

Latin America and Hispanics in the US will be the focus of the 12th Annual Rotary International District 5300 Peace Conference. It will be held on Saturday, March 31, at Azusa Pacific University.

This conference, like previous ones on Africa and the Middle East, will present ideas on how to eradicate poverty through entrepreneurship education that leads to new business formation and job creation.

The huge unemployment in Mexico and other Central American nations leads to migration North in search of jobs. The migrants say they would far rather stay home

with their families and in the neighborhoods and culture they grew up in. But in order to put food on the table for their families, they take enormous risks to come North.

So a program directed toward Job Creation in Mexico makes sense for them and is something we Rotary Club members, with plenty of business-savvy, can direct our attention to.

Actually, Altadena Rotary launched such a program in Tijuana in 1999, in collaboration with CETYS Universidad which operates the Junior Achievement program across Baja California, and 1,600 students were impacted. Unfortunately, the leadership of the

university changed and the JA program got side-tracked, but not before the Ministry of Education had investigated the JA program and found how valuable it was. Dr. Carlos Rodriguez Rubio, of CETYS, spoke at Altadena Rotary last year and presented a document on the value of a new collaboration between Rotary Clubs in District 5300 and in Mexico and with CETYS.

The population of Hispanics in D-5300 is rising rapidly and has reached 42 percent of the population. Very few Hispanics are to be found in Rotary Clubs here and it should be valuable to show them that we are interested in helping their youth. So Hispanic organizations, clubs, and Latin Studies programs at universities will be solicited to send

representatives. Workshops will be held in the afternoon to develop practical projects and associations.





Utah is an international hub for genealogy and family history research,

thanks to the world-class Family History Library.

Located on Temple Square in Salt Lake City, less than two blocks from the Salt Palace Convention Center, the Family History Library is the world's largest and most advanced repository of genealogical information. Their various records hold the names of more than 3 billion deceased people (prior to 1930) and is open to the public free of charge. Visitors can search the:

- Ancestral File Database (36 million names)
- International Genealogical Index (725 million names)
- 2.4 million rolls of microfilmed records
- 742 million microfiche
- 310,000 books
- 4,500 periodicals

700 electronic resources

These records have been collected from churches and government offices in most countries of the world, and staff at the Family History Library speak many of these languages.

A little overwhelmed? Begin your research at the genealogy kiosks located in the **House of Friendship** where Library staff will be on hand to get you started. If you want to learn more, you can attend one-hour presentations in a specially-designated **Genealogy Room** on the second floor of the convention center before heading to the Family History Library.
