Letter from Governor Christine:

LEADING THE WAY - CHANGING FOR THE BETTER

In March, we completed two first-ever Board of Directors Training Seminars. To my knowledge, this program is unique in at least this part of the Rotary world. The champion, Past District Governor Steve Garrett, first approached District leadership with the idea last fall, that of all the folks we train - District leadership, President Elects, committee members and officers at District Assembly, new members - we lack a training program for perhaps the most critical! The Board of Directors of the Rotary Clubs!



This has been such a successful first effort! Congratulations to all those involved in the development and implementation. And thank you to those of you who, when promised an effective use of your time, attended, and will take something back to your clubs of real value. This training came at a particularly good time, when clubs are looking at the transition to the new Rotary *Club Leadership Plan*. The Club Leadership Plan will strengthen our clubs, by suggesting long- range strategic planning, a simplified committee structure and involving ALL club members. I encourage you to find out more about it, and to support the idea when it's introduced at your club.

Organizational change is seldom easy, and we tend to resist change. But it's necessary if we expect progress! And the organization must change to keep in tune with our changing environment and culture. For change to be effective, it needs to compatible with the existing organizational goals. It can't be too complex. We need an understanding of the advantages. Will the results be observed and measurable? Yes. On the Rotary International website, it indicates as many as 60% of the clubs world-wide are now using the plan! So it is tried and true.

Mahatma Gandhi urged "Be the change you want to see in the world." We need not imagine international projects to change the world - as indeed they do - but see a vision much closer to home as you embrace the changes that will strengthen your Rotary club.

Memo from your RRIMCs: Are You in The Minority or The Majority?

One of the pleasures of being a **Regional RI Membership Coordinator** (RRIMC) is being able to participate in exceptional learning opportunities in specific subject areas. Both of your RRIMCs - Dave Benson (Zone 31) and Joe Dino (Zone 32) -- have just completed the 2007 Training Seminar for Regional RI Membership Coordinators in Evanston, Illinois. RRIMCs are appointed to a three-year term by the RI president to promote membership growth and coordinate membership development efforts for assigned zones or geographic areas. Forty-four RRIMC's gathered from all over the world to share, learn and develop ideas about Rotary membership at the seminar. The work was intensive, the exchange of ideas overwhelming and the camaraderie awesome.

The magnitude of the topic of membership to Rotary was made evident with the constant presence, accessibility and interaction of both sitting RI President "Bill" Boyd and President-elect Wilfrid Wilkinson. They both emphasized the value they place on membership throughout the week. And -- talk about putting your money where your mouth is - they have added a significantly-relevant requirement to this year's qualifications for a club to receive a Presidential Citation - the club must report a net gain of one new member by March 31.

Another indicator of the raised importance of membership at RI central is that they have also reconstituted and strengthened the RI Membership Development and Retention Committee as a special resource to Rotary clubs. The personable Past RI Director Ronald "Ron" Beaubien is now chairing that committee and made it clear that he is available to help any of us with membership problems.

One startling fact emerged from our briefings -- that the vast majority of Rotarians have never proposed anyone to join Rotary. Read that again. Think about it. Who, then, is responsible for the continuation of Rotary?

"The Mouse That Roared" at Rotary International

Women who today enjoy membership in community service clubs and the organizations fortunate enough to have them as members can thank the Duarte Rotary Club for making it possible.

Before 20 years ago women were barred from membership in service clubs such as the Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and others. But that changed on May 4, 1987 when the tiny Duarte Rotary Club that had been stripped of its charter by Rotary International for daring to admit three women to membership 10 years earlier, won a landmark victory in the United States Supreme Court that ended gender discrimination in service clubs.

On Friday, May 4, in conjunction with the City's 50th anniversary celebration, the Duarte Rotary will commemorate the 20th anniversary of the Supreme Court decision. From 3:30-5p.m., a forum will be held at the Duarte Community Center, 1600 Huntington Dr., featuring some of the key participants in the court battle who will discuss the landmark case. Historic video clips of the national news coverage of the Supreme Court decision will also be shown at the program. The public is invited to attend. Admission is free.

The Supreme Court decision opened the doors to women in Rotary and other service clubs across the nation. It also earned the Duarte Rotary Club the nickname, "The Mouse that Roared".

In 1976, with only eight members in the Duarte Rotary, and recognizing that women were increasingly holding key leadership positions in the community, the club admitted Duarte school principals Mary Lou Elliott and Donna Bogard into its ranks against Rotary International rules. A few months later Rosemary Freitag, a Duarte based psychologist became the third woman member of the Duarte club.

When Rotary International representatives learned of the women, Duarte Rotary was ordered to terminate their membership or lose its charter. Duarte Rotary, under then president, Richard Key, who was also the superintendent of Duarte Unified School District, stood its ground and eight months later in February of 1978, Rotary International revoked the charter of the Duarte Club. When all appeals to International failed, the club voted to continue to meet as a quasi-Rotary Club. An X was placed over the Rotary Insignia and the club renamed itself The Ex-Rotary Club of Duarte. In June

of 1978, the club filed suit against Rotary International with the pro-bono help of attorney Sanford K. Smith, a member of the Arcadia Rotary, and Carl Agate, a member of the American Civil Liberties Union. The long battle against Rotary International in the courts was begun.

Duarte Rotary also has the distinction of electing the first woman president of Rotary in the world. Sylvia Whitlock, pictured at right, served as president of Duarte Rotary for the 1987-1988 Rotary year.

Altadena to Promote Zambia Project at R.I. Convention

For the 10th time, Altadena Rotary will have a project booth at an R.I. Convention, this year in Salt Lake City, June 16-20. Their hugely successful Youth IT project in Zambia, with funding from the US Dept of State and the Rotary Foundation, will be promoted at the convention as a model of what can be done all across sub-Saharan Africa and beyond. The 204 youth were given 140 hours of instruction in Information Technology, how to write a business plan, and healthcare services (in hopes that some will start businesses that relate to the enormous HIV-AIDS needs). Their *graduation* will take place on April 13, with the US Ambassador as *commencement* speaker, and the event will be video-transmitted by the World Bank from Lusaka to dignitaries in Washington DC and Rotarians in California. Nine of the youth will come to the US in early July as part of the State Dept's *Citizen Exchange* program. C. Ray Carlson, Chair of District 5300's International Projects in 2007-08, will man the booth along with John Frykenberg and others from our district who will hopefully volunteer to serve an hour or two of the 33 hours of booth-time, but an opportunity to meet many Rotarians from abroad and to invite their clubs and districts to collaborate with District 5300.

Montebello Rotarians Help Deliver 800 Food Baskets

For the eighth year in a row, Montebello Rotarians, along with Rotarians from the Ensenada, San Diego, Downtown San Diego, Vista and Avalon Rotary Clubs, helped deliver a record-number 800 baskets to needy families in Ensenada, Mexico.

Filled with warm blankets and food items including rice, flour, beans and cereal, the baskets are assembled in a warehouse by Ensenada Rotarians early in the week. Upon the week-end arrival of other club members, all participate in adding the final items to the baskets - ten cans of tuna - donated by American long-range sport fishermen.

The recipients of the baskets, identified as "the poorest of the poor," are selected by the Ensenada Rotary Club. The baskets are distributed to families as far away as 40 miles outside the city as well as to orphanages and Indian communities.

Montebello Rotarian Ted Jones is dedicated to the annual project.

"Several years ago, I met this young girl who couldn't have been more than 13 years old, same age as my daughter," he said. "She had a toddler with her, and I thought it was her brother. Turns out it was her son. I lost it. That's the story that will stay with me."

"The need here is so great and so is the appreciation," said Pete Adriance, another Montebello Rotarian who makes the annual trip.

The Montebello club donated \$1,500 to this year's project.

In keeping with the club's spirit of giving, the following weekend, Montebello Rotarians made their annual trip to Tijuana where they delivered clothing and toys to children living in area orphanages.


