

Kira Brunner Don, a native of Oakland, in partnership with Abbey Rappaport, is Co-Founder and Editor-in-Chief of *Stranger's Guide*, which publishes magazines focused on countries around the world whose stories are written by the people living there. Kira was our featured speaker on January 22.

Kira feels that it is most relevant to give voice to people from places around the world who are living the experience rather than bringing in writers from the outside who are looking in and only getting a snapshot of the realities that exist there.

As their website notes:

century authors wrote "stranger's guides" to cities and countries—pamphlets and books that combined helpful tips with particular and offbeat advice and context: the best boarding houses alongside bits of history, preferred brothels as well as facts about paleontology and poetry. They were personal, eccentric and intimate portrayals of place. *Stranger's Guide* is a modern version of that idea.

Inviting writers from their country to create stories that are firsthand and lived helps to eliminate skepticism and mistrust that comes from having foreign observers come to take a snapshot of their world and then create a big picture story that could be told from a slanted point of view.
