The Berkeley Baby Book Project

Seena Hawley is the founder and Executive Director of <u>The Berkeley Baby Book Project</u>, a nonprofit organization that provides free books to children ages 0-5, one per month.



Last Wednesday, Seena shared the organization's history, starting with her experience as a school teacher who, upon retirement, drove school buses in Berkeley where she provided free books to children. This led to her realization that many children did not have access to books, which sparked

the idea to provide books to children from birth to age 5.

The organization now has over 2,000 children enrolled in its monthly book program from the East Bay, with about 1,150 living in Berkeley. The BBBP aims to increase kindergarten readiness and lifelong literacy. Regardless of the parent's literacy, when children are exposed to books starting from 6 months of age, their brains capture the fundamentals of literacy, turning pages from right to left, reading from left to right, and recognizing symbols that represent letters, words, numbers, objects, people, and animals. This creates neurological connections in the brain's formation that prepare them for learning to read and comprehension of what they are reading. Studies have shown that children who have a minimum of 20 books at home during their preschool years are more likely to be prepared to be readers in kindergarten.

She noted that there is a significant increase in book usage among children as a result of the project, with over 90% of children spending more time with books. Seena also emphasized the importance of literacy as a civil rights issue, as it enables individuals to access information and shape their world.

The Berkeley Baby Book Project is a small nonprofit organization funded by donations and grants. It partners with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, which provides the infrastructure and technology for the program. Seena highlighted the organization's direct outreach to low-income families and their partnership with the Berkeley Head Start sites. She also discussed the program's funding, which includes a grant from the Witkin Foundation. The program is funded in part by the State of California and Dolly Parton's foundation, with the State covering half of the program's costs. For more information, go to https://www.thebbbp.org/

Cal Rotaract Seeks Help Fighting Ebola Epidemics in Uganda and Zimbabwe

President Ken allowed Cal Rotaract to present an international project in Uganda and

nearby African countries at our March 26 meeting. Amin Balakhmet, a Cell and Molecular Biology major at Cal, reviewed the deadly ebola epidemic that hit Africa prior to COVID and appears to be returning. He introduced the Alliance for Global Health and Science, formed by Cal students and faculty, which trains African researchers on infectious diseases through Makerere University in Uganda and the University of Zimbabwe. These trainees continue research, have tested a million samples to monitor ebola's spread, and provide a key line of continental defense. However, recent U.S. funding cuts for foreign aid, WHO, and CDC have significantly reduced public health monitoring budgets.

Amir suggests that Rotarians consider sending the flyer to friends and family. You can help save hundreds, maybe thousands, of lives.
