
Rotary Global Scholar Recipient and Fulbright Scholar

This past Thursday, our last meeting of the year, we welcomed Zia Saylor, a resident of Pasadena, and graduate of Williams College, who is currently studying at the University of Bristol (UK), in the area of Social Policy. Zia was the recipient of a Global Scholarship to support her Public Policy MSc, but had to turn it down because she had earned a Fulbright Scholarship for 2023-2024 as well, and was not able to accept both. However, due to the hard work of

Rotary, Zia was able to keep the Global Scholarship and delay its distribution until after she completed her Fulbright. Zia's local sponsors are the Rotary Club of Bristol. Laurie Haynes, the Club's President last year, assisted with the arrangements. During her tenure at Bristol in Spring 2024, Zia gave what Laurie described as an "impressive talk" to their club and she maintains contact with the student liaison club members.



For her talk on Thursday, December 19th, Zia spoke about her current Ph.D. research, which is focused on post-Apartheid electricity policy in South Africa. Integrated into her research are questions tackling tough subjects, including social inequity and temporal inequity in electrical policy and delivery, impacts of climate change and energy justice, as well as educational and mortality impacts on the population of color in Cape Town.

Zia's talk was not only interesting but has relevance in the US as well. When load-shedding occurs [demand increases and availability

decreases], how does the frequent and sudden shut down of electrical infrastructure affect children, seniors, and those at the lower-socioeconomic strata? Zia intends to use qualitative data collected through interviews and quantitative data to inform her research as part of her methodology.



Her PowerPoint presentation reflected her strengths in policy and mixed methods research and was comprehensive and informative.

Finally, the Q and A session was particularly lively, with good solid questions being asked by our Rotarians. Zia's responses showed the depth and breadth of her training and expertise in the area. Joining Zia at the meeting were her mother, Nora Zamichow, her childhood friend Roman, and his father, Xavier Inguanzo.


