LAST WEEK: JEFF PRANG LA COUNTY ASSESSOR

This past week, our Rotary Club had the privilege of hosting Jeff Prang, the Los Angeles County Assessor, as our guest speaker. With a distinguished career in public service and a decade of membership in the Beverly Hills Rotary Club, Jeff provided us with an insightful look into the operations of the Assessor's Office, its critical role in the county's economic landscape, and the measures being taken to assist those affected by the recent Eaton Fire.

The Role of the Assessor's Office

The Los Angeles County Assessor's Office is responsible for identifying, listing, and valuing all taxable property in the county. This is no small task, as Los Angeles County is home to approximately 2.5 million real property parcels. These include residential homes, commercial buildings, industrial facilities, and even unique assets such as aircraft and racehorses. The assessments provided by the Assessor's Office form the basis for property taxes, which fund vital public services, including schools, law enforcement, fire departments, and infrastructure improvements.

In 2024, the assessment tax roll for Los Angeles County reached an astonishing \$2 trillion. This figure reflects the cumulative value of all taxable properties in the county, demonstrating the immense economic weight that property taxation carries in supporting government functions.

The Impact of Wildfires and Property Tax Loss

Unfortunately, natural disasters such as wildfires significantly impact property values and, consequently, tax revenues. Jeff Prang projected that due to the recent wildfires, including the devastating Eaton Fire, Los Angeles County could see a tax revenue loss ranging from \$200 to \$300 million. This loss results from property devaluations, reassessments, and delays in rebuilding efforts.

Assistance for Eaton Fire Victims

Recognizing the struggles faced by those affected by wildfires, the Assessor's Office has taken proactive steps to provide relief. Property owners who have suffered significant damage or total loss due to the fire are eligible for reassessment, which can substantially lower their property tax burden while they rebuild. The office is expediting claims for affected homeowners and businesses, ensuring that those impacted receive necessary tax relief as quickly as possible.

Additionally, Jeff Prang emphasized the importance of the Assessor's "Homeowner Alert" program. This e-notification system is designed to protect property owners from real estate fraud and scams, which often increase in the aftermath of disasters when people are most vulnerable. The program alerts homeowners to any recorded changes in their property title, helping prevent unauthorized transfers or fraudulent activity.

On Saturday, March 15th, after returning from out of State the night before, I witnessed another amazing event that reminded me of why I joined the Rotary Club of Altadena!

In an attempt to focus on Fire Survivors from Altadena, this event did NOT have a flyer. The club specifically worked with the following groups to get the word out: 1) Altadena Town Council, 2) Eaton Fire Survivors Network, 3) St. Vincent De Paul St. Elizabeth non-denominational NGO, 4) Altadena Wild, and 5) Nextdoor via Rene Amy. The event did what one of our goals was: to get assistance to those who lived in Altadena. Rotary International has a long-time relationship with ShelterBox USA. They provided about 350 blankets and one thousand Air Purifiers from Intellipure. These were well received by the recipients. We also received, courtesy of Blue Tape Ministry, TEN pallets of new food from COSTCO. Grocery Outlet and Rotary purchased (some donated through vendors) fresh produce, bread, water, more food products, etc. We received new dresses from Nusatara, courtesy of Children of the Earth and other new shoes and clothing from St. Vincent De Paul LA Thrift Store. The Altadena Library Foundation, via the Library District provided another 100 hot spots that included 14 months of unlimited internet services. The LA County Library van was there, sharing information. Target Corporation provided \$2,000 in Gift Cards, the Pasadena Assistance League also contributed Gift Cards. And of course, the assistance of the Altadena Town Council and the wonderful work they have been doing for all of us over the last 9 weeks is appreciated. (Cont'd opposite)
