Starting with job and internship programs for youth ages 14-24 to programs for probationers who can access education and career training, to comprehensive business services providing no cost solutions such as recruitment and placement services, workforce planning, skills development, workers comp workshops and much more more. They provide assistance to employees when a company has gone out of business...a recent example is the closing of the Dollar Stores. AJCC was able to visit each location to provide those employees with assistance.

There are also aids and services available upon request for persons with disabilities.

America's Job Center has their main location in Pomona, where they also have a branch of the EDD on site for seamless integration of services.

Say Farewell to Rotary International Themes



The long history of a Rotary International President launching a theme for their

presidential year is going away in 2025-2026. This decision was made by the RI Board of Directors at their October 2023 Meeting. (Read the details of decisions from that meeting here.) The rationale behind the decision is based on the importance of standardizing branding and communications. The presidential themes were to be used only for internal communications to motivate Rotary members. However, too many clubs and districts used the theme as a logo to promote Rotary projects and events to the public. Additionally, the themes changed every year, and some clubs and districts preferred promoting a past theme over the current theme due to personal preference. This caused confusion with helping the public understand the focus of Rotary and what we stand for.

Free Zoom - Understanding Collective Trauma

The first of three inter-District Zoom "Conversations" entitled "Understanding and Living with Collective Trauma" was held on Sunday February 2nd. The event was co-sponsored by Rotary Districts 5300 (which includes the Altadena Rotary Club), and 5280 (which includes the affected clubs on the Westside). The panelists included Sheila Gutierrez, LMFT (RC of Glendora), Rudy Hayek, LMFT (RC of Glendora), PDG 5280 Dr. Vicki Radel, Ph.D., PDG District 1150 Wales and Past-Chair Rotary Action



The first of three inter-District Zoom "Conversations" entitled "Understanding and Living with Collective Trauma" was held on Sunday February 2nd. The event was co-sponsored by Rotary Districts 5300 (which includes the Altadena Rotary Club), and 5280 (which includes the affected clubs on the Westside). The panelists included Sheila Gutierrez, LMFT (RC of Glendora), Rudy Hayek, LMFT (RC of Glendora), PDG 5280 Dr. Vicki Radel, Ph.D., PDG District 1150 Wales and Past-Chair Rotary Action Group for Peace, Allison Sutherland.

This first event drew 70 attendees from nine nations (USA, England, Iberia, India, Australia, Mexico, Canada, Brazil, Kenya), including representatives from Turkey and their Rotary District, discussing their efforts towards healing by employing "empathy and resilience" meetings following the devastating earthquakes that country suffered recently. A Rotaract member from Brazil discussed his club's efforts putting together trauma relief groups. In the audience was a non-Rotarian couple from Southern California who had lost their home but also wanted to share their gratitude for all the connections and relationships discovered and renewed when people reached out to help them. It was a very touching moment that reflected the purpose of this webinar.

In addition to opportunities for people to share their experiences, thoughts and feelings, the panelists presented valuable information about the acute stress symptoms of trauma and how they affect our physiology and our brains. Sheila introduced self-regulating breathing exercises that can help calm and center individuas who are continuing to experience negative symptoms (i.e. hypervigilance, fear, worry, anger, etc.). Rudy provided resources and referrals that will be posted on the D-5300 and D-5280 websites for extra support and help affected people with their healing and rebuilding process.

It was a very moving and uplifting event. At the regular Glendora Rotary meeting yesterday, there were several Rotarians who attended and shared their positive experiences, one especially touching from Falamak Zaltash. She shared that she found herself very moved by the stories of the survivors. Falamak lost her home at the age of 11 when she had to escape the Iranian revolution and escape to the United States to seek political asylum with her family. This was at the time of the Iran Hostage Crisis so her family arrived to much distrust and dislike of Iranians in addition to he fear of her father having a price on his head.

The next two events will be on February 16 and again on March 2 from 10 am to 11:30 am. Information and ways to sign up will be forthcoming.
