Balance - Literal and Metaphoric

Tom Stricklin, already known to the club for his eloquent and moving invocations and his story-telling skills, demonstrated another unique skill today...his post-retirement hobby of rock balancing.



After a 40-year career as a pastor

followed by a bridge to retirement career selling church furniture, Tom officially retired. Not long after, on a beach, he observed an Englishman balancing rocks on top of one another. Curious, Tom inquired as to the how and the why. The Englishman obliged and a "hobby" was born. You can take the pastor out of the church but you can never take the church out of the pastor, so with this art form, Tom has found a new way to bring life lessons and wisdom to those that seek him out. Folks are naturally curious when they see someone building rock sculptures, sometimes out in the surf up to their waist. Tom says that opportunities for great philosophical discussions are frequent.

Tom constructs his works wherever there are rocks. Some of his favorite haunts are Leo Carillo State Beach, San Celemente beach, Sycamore cove, and Catalina. Like life, a good rock formation must have a solid base and that is just the beginning of the myriad of metaphors found in this art.

Elaine, Tom's wife was an art teacher and is the documentarian of the rock sculptures via her photography. She is also Tom's greatest cheerleader and encouraged him to build higher. One of their Christmas cards was a nativity scene completely of rock; placed by Tom and photographed by Elaine. "It's a hobby that creates conversation", says Tom.

Having seen his work, "art" is a better descriptor than "hobby". In fact, rather than lament that his sculptures rarely last a day, one is reminded of the Japanese concept of Wabi-Sabi - the appreciation of impermanence and transience in life. Like the Ise Temple, which is torn down and rebuilt every 20 years, Tom's sculptures last until the tide pulls them away, or a sea gull lands on top of them or some children take them apart with delight.
