Program: City of Glendora Homeless Resources

Debbie Lopez, Human Services Manager for the City of Glendora, is proud of the city she lives in and works for. She highlights the support the City Council and the City Manager have shown towards the homeless services. They supplied funds to house 68 homeless people for more than a year and a half in local hotels during COVID.

Last year the city received a \$50k grant from the San Gabriel Valley COG, allowing them to provide 70 hotel rooms and facilitate 17 reunifications of homeless persons with their families, no matter where they were. The homeless were provided assistance in obtaining IDs and travel documents and tickets. There was follow-up provided after the reunification to be sure that things were going well for the families and the reunified homeless. This involved a tremendous amount of time and man hours.

Amplified by Erik Deurmeier, Human Services Supervisor, he provides a lot of the administrative and backup support for the homeless outreach programs and the homelessness prevention programs. Erik assists folks with imminent issues like eviction notices and helps them find programs and services. He has access to many programs both in and out of the city as a case manager.



Glendora has also contracted with L.A. CADA (Los Angeles Centers for

Alcohol and Drug Åbuse). Representing them were Aaron Sambrone and Liz. Aaron is also the homeless outreach coordinator and substance abuse counselor. They interface with the Glendora Police and with the schools and with Shepherd's Pantry. They offer interim housing help and assist in getting people into treatment and detox. They build relationships and trust so that the homeless can withstand some of the lengthy timetables required for housing and reunification and treatment.

Most of the Glendora homeless are from Glendora or connected in some way to Glendora. They want to stay in the area so the challenge is to find ways to help them do that if possible.

This team is housed out of the La Fetra Center for easy access. They do go out into the community for direct counseling, even going so far as to hike out into our local mountains to reach the homeless there. "We meet them where they are at" is not just a slogan for this team. The team will take them to medical appointments, help them get services, interim housing, documents, etc.
