# **Program-Matthew Davis, Glendora**



One might have expected the Director of the Glendora Schools Show Choirs to talk mostly about music. But despite his impressive resume, which we absolutely had to include:

Matthew Davis is a conductor, singer, and educator who is quickly making a name for himself in the Southern California region. August of 2021 marks the beginning of his tenure as choir director at Glendora High School, Goddard Middle School, and Sandburg Middle School. At Glendora High School, Mr. Davis is in charge of the school's award winning Show Choirs, the Tartan Silhouettes and the Royal Stewarts.

In addition to being a conductor and educator, Davis is a versatile performer having sung backup for notable singers such as Kathleen Battle, Barry Manilow, and most recently Andrea Bocelli. Davis can be heard on the album "John Williams and Steven Spieldberg: The Ultimate Collection" recorded with Sony Classical. He has performed under the baton of notable conductors such as John Williams, Jeffrey Kahane, Carl St. Clair, John Alexander, James Conlon, Grant Gershon, and others.

As a conductor, Matthew has conducted full performances of many operas, most notably Mozart's "The Magic Flute" and "Cosi fan tutte," both of which were with full orchestra, as well as Ravel's "L'enfant et les sortilèges," which was performed with a chamber orchestra. In summer of 2018, Davis was invited to participate in the Chorus America Conducting Academy as a conducting Fellow.

Matthew holds a Bachelor of Arts in Choral Music from the University of Southern California where he studied conducting under Jo-Michael Scheibe, Cristian Grases, and Don Brinegar. He

has a Masters of Music in Choral Conducting from California State University, Fullerton where he studied with Robert Istad, Christopher Peterson, and Kimo Furumoto.

Mr. Davis did NOT mostly talk about music. What he spoke about was teamwork, community, camaraderie, self-respect, pride, confidence, healthy competition. In short, almost everything except music. In fact, we almost didn't need to hear from him at all because each of the students he brought with him spoke about how their lives had changed as a result of being in his music program. The Glendora Schools music program is building individuals, building teams and building character. One of the nicest things the students do is to take elementary music students on as mentees inspiring them to start young in the music program. An active Instagram page with over 6,700 followers, https://www.instagram.com/royalstewarts/ has also built their community and nationwide recognition.

In addition to choral music, the students have the opportunity to learn professional lighting, sound, stagecraft, etc. There are many professional level mentors that Mr. Davis has assemble for the benefit of his students.

Mr. Davis believes fervently that the community and the camaraderie and good sportsmanship that his program emphasizes is the reason they have been so successful. He says it is more important to him that people are happy to see Glendora Schools at a competition than to win that competition, but win they do. With an attitude like that, they are always winners.

#### **Succession - Rotary Style**

This is the time of year we are highlighting the importance of structure, planning, and leadership transition within Rotary Clubs. It's true that behind-the-scenes work is crucial to ensuring the smooth operation of the club, and our bylaws and governing documents play an essential role in keeping everything organized. The idea of a "past presidents advisory board" is a wonderful one—it provides new leaders with insights and guidance from those who have been in the role before to learn from past successes and especially challenges. It also fosters a sense of continuity, which can be particularly important in maintaining the club's culture and momentum toward achieving its goals.

Each Rotary Club is unique, with its own history, challenges, and strengths; Rudy calls it its own "personality". This means that while following the By-Laws and Constitution is necessary, the ability to adapt and work with the club members by being more open to diverse ideas and suggestions, and consulting with experienced former club leaders, goes a long way in ensuring a more effective and positive leadership succession.

The theme for this year's Conference is Rotary Past, Present and Future - the arc of Rotary. From what we were, to what we are, to what we can be. Your conference team has been hard at work to create a program that will deliver on that theme.

Friday dinner. The conference journey begins on Friday evening with a program that includes the recognition of Major Donors, opening remarks by RI Representative, PDG Dave McCleary, a keynote address by Mattias Sundholm, the Strategic Communications Officer with the United Nations, and recognition of those Rotarians that are no longer with us. It will be a night of laughter, a few tears, and inspiration. In addition, we will get a glimpse into the bond between the United Nations and Rotary International - the only non-profit to be a Charter member with a seat in the United Nations. We will then head off to hospitality where we can mingle, laugh, and enjoy fellowship.

Saturday breakfast. On Saturday, we begin the day with the Four Way Test Speech Contest at Breakfast. We will hear our Hensel Ethics Essay student scholar share their winning essay while we wait for judges to convene. Our keynote speaker, Johrita Solari, will share insight into Rotary's past and what we were - setting the stage for the afternoon. We will conclude with a special presentation by Shelter Box USA CEO, Kerri Murray.

Saturday morning breakout. Immediately following breakfast, attendees are invited to attend the Disney Leadership Institute Presentation for a glimpse into the world-renowned training offered by the Institute. The second portion of the breakout will feature Ramesh Ferris, a polio survivor, Rotarian and Rotary leader. This breakout is where the *Magic of Disney meets the Magic of Rotary*.

Saturday lunch. Saturday Lunch is sure to pull at your heart as it will showcase the impact of Rotary in Action. We begin with the procession of flags by club presidents and club leaders. After lunch, we recognize the work of Rotarians during and after the life-changing fires that scourged southern California. We will hear from our RI Rep, Dave McCleary about Rotary present and where we are today - setting the tone and pace for the future. We will then be uplifted by the Dan Stover Music competition and the Speech Contest winner from District 5180 before heading off to our afternoon breakout sessions.

Saturday afternoon breakout. The afternoon is dedicated to our work to end human trafficking. The session begins with a look at the recent trip to Australia with our Vocational Training Team. While in Australia, they worked with educators, law enforcement, government agencies and other NGOs to discern ways to end trafficking in all forms. The next portion of the session is a panel discussion with local leaders, Rotarians, and a survivor, sharing their experiences and how we can help. We will end the session with a hands-on project - stuffing 200+ backpacks for survivors. It is certain to be an emotionally charged session of passion, hope, and impact.

After the session you will have time to choose your own adventure before heading back to dinner.

Saturday dinner. During the dinner session we will honor those members among us that have served in the Armed Forces. Each veteran will receive a token of our appreciation for their service. In addition, each veteran will receive a gift that could only be approved by a Congressional leader. It's a secret, so we cannot share more. If you are a veteran in the district, we truly hope you can make it to the Conference, where we can thank you properly for your service! Our keynote speaker, Brad Howard, will share Rotary Future and what we can be - bringing the arc of Rotary to life. We will have final remarks by the RI Rep, a Changing of the Guard, and head off to Hospitality.
