Jay Prag is a Clinical Professor of Economics and Finance at the Masatoshi Ito and Peter F. Drucker School of Management, where he has taught since 1986. He previously taught at Harvey Mudd College, Claremont McKenna College, and Pomona College and was Corporate Finance trainer at Edison International for seven years. Over his teaching career, Professor Prag has won 30 teaching awards, and he also served as Academic Director for the Executive MBA and the Financial Engineering Programs at the Drucker School.

Jay is currently chairman of the Board of Directors of LINC Housing, a nonprofit developer of affordable housing headquartered in Long Beach, California. He previously served on the Board of Directors of the Mt. San Antonio Gardens retirement community in Claremont, California.

Jayos latest book, Microeconomic Essentials: Understanding Economics in the News (MIT Press), will be available in October 2020. He is also coauthor of Financial Management for Executives and Macroeconomic Essentials: Understanding Economics in the News (4thEdition). He has also authored several journal articles and individual book chapters as well as a monthly column in the Los Angeles Newspaper Group newspapers.

Jay grew up on the eastern shore of Maryland and has a PhD in Economics from the University of Rochester (1988), an MA in Economics (1981), and a Bachelors in Business Administration (1979) from the University of Florida, He currently resides in Upland, California,

Please let the Rotary office know of any

- The candidates on the ballot are Active members in good standing for 3+ years as of November 1, 2020.
- Previous year's Election Committee members are not eligible.
- Any ballots received after the deadline will be disqualified.
- Ballots with more than 7 votes, fewer than 7 votes or more than 1 vote cast per candidate will be disqualified.

WHAT COMES NEXT:

Following the tally of Ballot #1, you will receive **Ballot #2** via email with the 14 names with the highest votes. You will again vote for ONLY 7, and follow the instructions that will accompany Ballot #2.

THE ELECTION COMMITTEE

Ballots will be counted by three members of the outgoing Election Committee.

The Election Committee serves for one year, Nov. 1 - Oct. 31. The most senior Past President, determined by year of presidency, shall serve as Chair. Should no Past President be elected to the Committee, the longest serving member of Rotary shall serve as Chair. The Chair may relinquish leadership to the next most qualified member. No person shall serve as Election Committee Chair more than twice in a six-year period.

Should any of the 7 elected members desire their name be included in the nominating process for President-designate, they will relinquish their position on the Committee. Any vacated position will then be filled with the Rotarian receiving the next highest votes from the membership.

The newly composed Election Committee (7 Rotarians), plus the President, Immediate Past President, President-elect, President-nominee and Club Administrator will meet to discuss eligible President-designate candidates and related matters. Members of the Election Committee shall not be eligible to be elected as President-designate.

The Election Committee not only selects the President-designate but also approves the proposed directors and officers of the Club for the succeeding fiscal year. Notice of the results of the election of officers and directors by the Election Committee shall not be given to the members until the RCLB annual meeting, customarily the 2nd Wednesday in December, when the President-elect announces the future Board of Directors, concluding with the announcement of the President-designate.
