Program: Irondale MUN (Model United Nations)

Boyana Nikolova and Asmaa Hamimoune, IHS Juniors shared: MUN (Model United Nations) is an educational simulation in which students role-play as delegates representing countries in the UN. Delegates research global issues, engage in debates and work together to pass resolutions addressing problems like climate change, human rights, and peacekeeping. The experience develops skills in public speaking, research, debate and negotiation, critical thinking and team work.

Delegates from more than 50 schools across the state are organized into teams and assigned countries to represent. They work together to draft resolutions and address global issues, negotiate and collaborate to reach consensus.

At the February Board meeting, NBMV Rotary committed \$400 toward tuition for 2 students to attend the conference.

Program: Impacts of mild winter 2023-2024 on Wolf Predation of Deer in the Greater Voyageurs Eco System (GVE)

Maeve Rogers described the Voyageurs Wolf Project, the goal of which is to couple cutting-edge, rigorous wolf research with highly-effective outreach and education. Researchers looked at the effect of snow ground cover on the number of deer killed. Predation was significantly lower when there was less snow and the deer could more easily escape predators. The unusually mild winter left wolves weaker and less healthy going into the summer

season/pup season. Wolves supplement their diet by scavenging when necessary. It is possible to distinguish predation from scavenging because wolves consume the entire animal they kill but leave the bones of scavenged meals

Wolf predation on adult-sized deer primarily occurs during October – April, peaking in February. Predation May – August is rare. Implications for Wildlife management: Wolves do not control deer populations during mild winters; Wolf hunting/trapping not effective for managing deer populations; More research needed to understand wolf-deer dynamics.

Program: Darnell Baker, Executive Director at Quincy House

Darnell Baker, Executive Director of Quincy House, was the speaker. He is a licensed alcohol and drug abuse counselor with extensive experience as a corrections officer - including as case manager, therapist for high-risk teens and adult males, hostage negotiator, and response team member. He played a key role in the development of The New Directions Treatment Curriculum, a cooperative effort by the Minnesota Department of Corrections and Hazeldon-Betty Ford.

Quincy House is dedicated to transforming lives by empowering teens to have hope for their future by providing unconditional love and guidance. It is a place of refuge and peace where youth gather twice a week for mentoring, emotional support and help with cognitive skills. They also send 40 youth to camp each summer.

Darnell works with a number of Irondale students. According to Principal Vichai, Darnell and Irondale staff have a close working relationship, and staff is enthusiastic about his work with youth. Cindy Carlson and Darnell are shown below.
