Numaan (an Oromo word which means "By us)

Aanne Atomssa introduced Numaan, a nonprofit started by her in Ethiopia to equip women and vulnerable youth with resources and support to thrive. Numaan operates on the understanding that the best solutions to the world's toughest problems come from those who live with those challenges every day.

Among Numaan's projects are the sustainable manufacturing of reusable menstrual pads so girls don't need to skip school, economically empowering women by giving them cows and employment, recruiting college students to mentor and tutor younger students, and supporting solar lantern and clean water projects. Numaan's clean water project benefits more than a thousand people. The community provides labor and maintains the well. They built a fence and hired guards to protect the water.

Program: Irondale MUN (Model United Nations)

Boyana Nikolova and Asmaa Hamimoune, IHS Juniors shared: MUN (Model United Nations) is an educational simulation in which students role-play as delegates representing countries in the UN. Delegates research global issues, engage in debates and work together to pass resolutions addressing problems like climate change, human

rights, and peacekeeping. The experience develops skills in public speaking, research, debate and negotiation, critical thinking and team work.

Delegates from more than 50 schools across the state are organized into teams and assigned countries to represent. They work together to draft resolutions and address global issues, negotiate and collaborate to reach consensus.

At the February Board meeting, NBMV Rotary committed \$400 toward tuition for 2 students to attend the conference.

Program: Impacts of mild winter 2023-2024 on Wolf Predation of Deer in the Greater Voyageurs Eco System (GVE)

Maeve Rogers described the Voyageurs Wolf Project, the goal of which is to couple cutting-edge, rigorous wolf research with highly-effective outreach and education. Researchers looked at the effect of snow ground cover on the number of deer killed. Predation was significantly lower when there was less snow and the deer could more easily escape predators. The unusually mild winter left wolves weaker and less healthy going into the summer season/pup season. Wolves supplement their diet by scavenging when necessary. It is possible to distinguish predation from scavenging because wolves consume the entire animal they kill but leave the bones of scavenged meals.

Wolf predation on adult-sized deer primarily occurs during October – April, peaking in February. Predation May – August is rare. Implications for Wildlife management: Wolves do not control deer populations during mild winters; Wolf hunting/trapping not effective for managing deer populations; More research needed to understand wolf-deer dynamics.
