water comes from surface water (lakes, rivers) and the rest from ground water (wells, spring). It is important to protect the land as well as the water. Education and outreach are at the core of their mission. They provide field trips and share resources to provide educational opportunities about the beauty of land and water. Mike shared their 2024 Annual Report and shared opportunities for activities, such as engaging children to fish for the first time. The number of people visiting Valley Water Mill Park has increased to 40K-50K a year. Almost 4,000 students engaged in field trips plus an additional 3,500 outreach participants annually. They actively promote conservation through planting native prairie and water gardens. He shared information on projects to decrease pollution that drains into the water resources. Storm water goes directly into lakes, like Lake Springfield, and water from parking lots, roadways, etc. may include toxins. Because of the amount of pavement, concrete and other hard surfaces, cities have a greater magnitude and frequency of flooding, which impacts the quantity and quality of runoff water. Only Springfield is served by surface water supply. Other communities like Willard, Ozark, etc. are served by public wells for their water supply. To protect our water resources, we must understand where our water comes from, what factors affect our valuable resources, and what actions can be taken.
