- Bequests (\$10,000 or more from your estate), or
- Special Arrangements (i.e. pledged funds with lifetime income)

We are very fortunate to have the advice and counsel of <u>Carl W Davis</u>, CFRE - our Rotary Foundation Major Gift Officer - in determining the best form of benevolence for each Rotarian. Carl has assisted our 20 Legacy Captains with Rotary Club and small group meetings during the past few months. \$1.4 million has already been contributed toward our \$2 million goal for gifts and beguests to The Rotary Foundation.



However, with our campaign ending on March 31, 2025, it is now time for other interested District 6110 Rotarians and friends to make a commitment! We hope that many more of us will choose to Plant a Tree of Stewardship that provides local and international impact.

What is a Passport Rotary Club?

THE IDEA

Rotary Passport Clubs are a new format for Rotary Clubs. The first one was chartered in Sacramento, CA (D5180) in 2015 by District Governor Glenn Fong and Charter President Mike Reneiro. It had 60 members in the beginning, but grew to 90 within one year.

The concept? **Remove barriers** to people who want to become Rotarians by offering greater meeting flexibility and lower costs.

A Passport Rotary Club encourages members to be engaged in service in ways that fit their time, talent and finances; to fit Rotary within their family, work and life commitments. Passport clubs differ from e-clubs in that members **live** within a defined geographical region, so that members can get together occasionally for face-to-face meetings as well as the monthly online meetings.

Rotary Passport Club members are full Rotary members, with the same rights and privileges as Rotarians in traditional clubs.

WHY "PASSPORT"?

Membership in a Rotary Passport Club is a passport...

- into Rotary, for people with busy lives or many other commitments
- into other Rotary Clubs, by encouraging members to visit other Rotary dlubs and take part in their service projects, fundraisers, and activities
- into their community, by becoming ambassadors for Rotary in places in their communities where they already
 volunteer

WHO IS A GOOD FIT FOR PASSPORT CLUBS?

Just as with traditional clubs, the culture of each Passport Club will vary. However, in general, the format of Passport Clubs is intended to be of particular interest to:

- former Rotarians interested in returning
- current or past members of the Rotary family- such as Rotaractors or Alumni
- young people who are early in their careers or who have young families
- retirees who are often traveling but want to give back wherever they are
- anyone else who's looking for a flexible avenue to do good in the world






The **Okmulgee Rotary Club** provided some holiday spirit with a lighted Rotary entry in the city's festival of lights Parade. Another bright idea!



Pittsburg Sunrise Club Delivers Much-Needed Medical Equipment to Kenya with MSNI

Harrison Mwaita is expecting a 'bundle of joy' any day now, but not like the 700+ newborns delivered annually at Kanya's CANA Family Hospital. Harrison already knows his 'little one' will be 480" in length and will weigh in at 15,122 pounds, filled with much-needed medical equipment initiated by Pittsburg KS's Sunrise Rotary Club and facilitated by the Rotary District 6110 Foundation and the District's Medical Supply Network, Inc. (MSNI). The District Foundation paid most of the estimated \$13,000 in shipping, customs duties, and other associated transportation costs, supplemented by local funds and personnel.

Pittsburg Sunrise Rotary president Jay Lotterer befriended Mwaita when he visited the Hospital in July 2023 on a church mission trip. The facility is one that a Rotary Club from Edina, MN helped build a few years ago with the help of a Rotary International Foundation Grant. The Hospital sees 800 clients a month and is located in the Mukuru Slum, home to

more than 500,000 residents on the outskirts of Nairobi, Kenya's capital, which boasts a population of 4.4 million. Club Foundation chair and MSNI Board Member, Douglas Stuckey, helped connect the local

club with Rotary's vast resources to allow the project to proceed. A few months ago, Jay, Douglas and Jonathan Sperry from Covenant Harvest Church in Pittsburg, KS transported gently-used medical equipment and supplies accumulated from Mercy's Orthopedic Hospital in Galena, KS as well as the Girard, KS District Hospital and other medical entities from around the District 6110.

After bundling eight maternal beds and cribs with

other donated equipment and supplies, they shrink-wrapped them into giant mobile pallets, and returned to the Tulsa, OK MSNI warehouse when the ocean-worthy container arrived. It was quickly loaded by church members and Rotarians

from throughout the District, then transported to the port of Houston, TX. Every nook and cranny of the container was stuffed with latex gloves, needles and other usable medical equipment, including scales, wheelchairs, even two dental chairs. The Maersk container is currently headed to the Port of Mombasa and is slated to arrive on December 22.

VJ Lively, Director of Rotary District 6110's Medical Supply Network, said "having Rotarians on the ground at the destination sites provides confidence the goods will get to the intended recipients." Since 1999, MSNI has shipped nearly 300 containers to 46 countries, including Ukraine, the Philippines and Honduras. The 501(c)(3) also delivers requested medical supplies and equipment domestically, including American disaster sites, all coordinated by local Rotary clubs on both ends. All shipments are funded 100% by contributions or sponsors, sometimes

foreign-born doctors supporting their brethren back in their homeland. To learn more about MSNI, visit https://www.msni.org/.

Care and feeding of Your Club's Rotary Logo

More than 12 years ago, Rotary International "retired" the blue wheel logo in favor of several similar but newly restyled elements. Virtually all clubs have now stopped using the blue logo on social media! (YAY!)

BUT there are several areas where we could make our case to the public clearer by consistently following Rotary branding

The easiest is to use your own CLUB'S LOGO, and not the generic Rotary (RI) Logo. When you make a poster, a flyer, a social media post, usually you are promoting something YOUR CLUB is doing. If you use the generic Master Brand, you are in essence promoting the whole 1.2 million member strong organization, **not** your club. You are missing an opportunity to promote your specific Rotary club.

Using your own club logo is easy - you can:
- Go to BrandCenter.Rotary.org and create one for your club, OR


- **Use one(s) I have created for every club!** You can download YOUR OWN CLUB logo from the District Files section of <u>DACdb</u>, OR just go to our website, click the "Documents" button on the left and look for "Club Correct Logos". Click for the <u>WEBSITE HERE.</u> Some clubs use their name both as



"Anytown Rotary Club" and also "Rotary Club of Anytown" and if I saw that on your social media, websites, fliers, etc. I included both. The club logo as designed at the Brand Center has specific fonts, colors and spacing. Don't try to put the pieces together on your own. If you want some other similar name for your club, go to the <u>Brand Center</u> and fix there, or ask me, and I'll do it for you...as long as you use it instead of non-compliant stuff!

Use your **club logo on any promotional material** instead of the generic Master Brand - as that indicates RI, not your local club. And you should use the logo as it comes, do not modify it, change font, use different colors, add things etc. The idea of branding is to make something recognizable worldwide.

Here are some CURRENT mis-uses, non-compliant uses, or missed opportunities. I have marked out most of the names to protect the club, but I bet you can recognize your own, and now you know how to fix it!





But polio is not the only disease or aspect of healthy living on which Rotarians have expended energies. One way in which Rotarians have elected to provide attention to an area of concern is through a **Rotarian Action Group (RAG)**. A Rotary Action Group (RAG) is a voluntary organization that functions independently of Rotary International. Each RAG establishes its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure. RAGs are composed of Rotarians, family members, program participants and alumni who are experts in a particular field. Group members share their expertise by collaborating with clubs and districts on service projects. Click here for a list of



There are more than a dozen Rotarian Action Groups (RAGs) committed to disease prevention and treatment. Here are some of the many RAGs that address health issues: (Click the name for more information)

- · <u>Alzheimer's/Dementia RAG</u>. They provide information and support to Rotarians on dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Members use their knowledge, experience and leadership to fight Alzheimer's disease and dementia.
- RAG for Blindness Prevention. This RAG helps prevent blindness and promotes eye health and vision worldwide.
- <u>RAG for Diabetes</u>. This RAG provides has commitment to education, identification, and treatment of diabetes. They are especially concerned about diabetes among children in developing countries. They work with the International Diabetes Federation.
- · Rotarians for Hearing RAG. These Rotarians promote hearing help for children and adults with hearing loss.

- RAG on Mental Health Initiatives. The mission of RAGMHI is to act as a worldwide resource for Rotarians in the field of mental health and mental illness to promote, protect, restore, and to help re-build the lost human capital to make a happier and healthier world.
- · RAG for Multiple Sclerosis Awareness. These Rotarians work to make people aware of MS and improve the lives of people with MS.

Do you have a passion in one of these areas? Can you contribute your knowledge, skills and expertise to one of these RAGs? Check it out today. This is another way in which we can serve as Rotarians in the focused area of Disease Prevention and Treatment.


